MINUTES

1. Call to Order and Chair's Remarks

The Florida International University Board of Trustees' Finance and Facilities Committee meeting was called to order by Committee Chair Roger Tovar at 10:13 a.m. on Thursday, June 16, 2022.

General Counsel Carlos B. Castillo conducted roll call of the Finance and Facilities Committee members and verified a quorum. Present were Trustees Roger Tovar, *Committee Chair and Board Vice Chair*; Jose J. Armas, *Committee Vice Chair (joined after roll call)*; Cesar L. Alvarez; Dean C. Colson, *Board Chair (via Zoom)*; Natasha Lowell (*via Zoom*); Joerg Reinhold; Chanel T. Rowe (*via Zoom*); and Marc D. Sarnoff.

Trustees Carlos A. Duarte, Donna J. Hrinak, Cristhofer E. Lugo, Gene Prescott, and Carlos Trujillo, and Interim University President Kenneth A. Jessell also were in attendance.

Committee Chair Tovar welcomed all Trustees and members of the University administration. He also welcomed Trustees attending via the virtual environment and the University community and general public accessing the meeting via the University's webcast.

2. Approval of Minutes

Committee Chair Tovar asked if there were any additions or corrections to the minutes of the Finance and Facilities Committee meeting held on April 26, 2022. Hearing none, a motion was made and unanimously passed to approve the minutes of the Finance and Facilities Committee meeting held on April 26, 2022.

Committee Chair Tovar pointed out that Board of Trustees members are thoroughly briefed in anticipation of every Board meeting.

3. Action Items

FF1. Proposed 2022-23 University and DSO Operating Budgets

Interim Chief Financial Officer and Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration Aime Martinez presented, for Committee review, the University and Direct Support Organizations (DSOs) Operating Budgets, totaling \$1.7B. In terms of changes over the prior year, she commented on the \$56M reduction to student financial aid and lower contracts and grants by \$11.9M, primarily the result of reduced Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) funding. She pointed out that the reduction in student loans is the result of additional financial aid provided by HEERF funds. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez commented on the slight reduction in undergraduate

enrollment, which is being offset by an increase in fully online enrolment. She explained that similar enrollment declines are being experienced throughout the State University System. She noted that said reductions are being offset primarily by higher Education and General (E&G) appropriations of \$8.4M. She stated that higher auxiliary enterprises of \$32M are reflective of the growth in continuing education programs, the new Tamiami Hall revenues and MARC building rent.

In response to Trustee Cesar L. Alvarez, Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez indicated that the University has experienced fringe benefit and utility increases. She explained that units have been asked to identify 1.5% in reductions to cover the increased escalations given that the University must continue operations and cannot increase tuition or appropriations.

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez commented on legislative highlights, primarily that FIU was the recipient of \$5M in operational support for rankings, research, and student success initiatives and \$4.8M for the Nursing Education Pipeline. In terms of Fixed Capital Outlay Budget, she pointed out that \$6.2M was approved for Capital Improvement Trust Fund (CITF), \$30.8M was received for deferred maintenance, \$33.5M for the Engineering Building Phase II, and \$0.5M for the Nursing Sexual Assault Exam Center. She remarked on other legislative highlights, namely, that no tuition increases were approved, the current level of Performance Based Funding of \$560M for the State University System was maintained, and the Select STEM Waiver Program was expanded from eight (8) to ten Programs of Strategic Emphasis.

Committee Chair Tovar commented on the importance of engaging with the State's legislature.

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez indicated that Educational and General (E&G) funds are comprised of state appropriations and tuition and fees and that projected E&G expenditures totaled \$546.7M for the University and \$51.6M for the Herbert Wertheim College of Medicine (HWCOM). She remarked on the net reduction in tuition revenue of \$2M, including that the total projected enrollment for fall 2022 is 55,728, which represents a slight decrease when compared to the fall 2021 enrollment of 56,092. She mentioned that HWCOM accepted 120 students from over 7,400 applicants for the class of 2026 with a total projected enrollment of 480 students for fall 2022. She provided an E&G funding summary. She noted that E&G revenues totaled \$546.4M.

In response to Committee Chair Tovar, Interim Provost and Executive Vice President Elizabeth M. Bejar stated that the University has taken a proactive approach and is mitigating the enrollment decline through moving students to other semesters for earlier enrollment. She added that a large percentage of the transfer pipeline is heavily reliant on FIU's largest partner, Miami Dade College, which has experienced, as has been the national trend, over double-digit declines in enrollment. She noted that while the University expects to be in a better position next year, it is responsible to plan for a 4% decline as was experienced in the current year. Responding to Trustee Marc D. Sarnoff, Interim Provost Bejar commented on national trends where more women are enrolling in higher education than men. She added that while this is also the case at FIU, the percentages are not as high as in other states. She stated that the University is examining the issue further to compare male and female graduation rates. Also responding to Trustee Sarnoff, Interim Provost Bejar indicated that there have been no tuition increases at the University for the past 11 years. She added that increased

efficiencies along with entrepreneurial and innovative faculty and staff have helped to offset static tuition and inflationary increases in operational costs.

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez delineated a historical overview of state appropriations and tuition in terms of Full-time Equivalent (FTE) student. She highlighted that current funding per FTE is lower than it was in 2007-08. She remarked that the University's E&G and HWCOM's carryforward balances, less the 7% statutory requirement and the continuation of projects previously approved by the Board of Trustees, are estimated at \$19M and \$17M, respectively. She added that approximately 39,000 students will receive financial aid, including 20,727 Pell recipients. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez stated that HEERF grant awards of \$101M for emergency financial aid grants to students will be fully spent by fiscal year 2021-22. She noted that 36,061 students received an average award of \$2,726. She commented that sponsored research grants revenue is greater than the previous year's budget, \$23.6M, as the Office of Research and Economic Development projects greater federal sponsored and privately funded sponsored research. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez remarked on Athletics and explained that the increase of \$2M in expenditures is primarily due to the resumption of all sports and their related expenses. She added that the \$4.8M fund balance can absorb the increase in expenditures and mentioned that Athletics is developing a plan focused on growing the revenue base.

In response to Trustee Chanel T. Rowe, Interim Provost Bejar commented on the University's efforts aimed at retaining talent. She added that in terms of faculty recruitment, moving into the south Florida area is currently a tenuous situation, particularly for young assistant professors who are at the bottom of the pay scale of faculty professorial. Interim President Kenneth A. Jessell commented that, as is trending nationally, FIU is also experiencing employee turnover, labor shortages, and counteroffers. He stated that the matter will be further examined by University leadership at its upcoming retreat. Interim President Jessell remarked on rising costs, including housing, insurance, and property taxes, noting that said increases pose a challenge in terms of attracting and retaining new talent. He mentioned that the University would like to reward top performing employees appropriately. Committee Chair Tovar requested a follow-up report at the Committee's next regularly scheduled meeting. Committee Vice Chair Jose J. Armas requested that the report include specific data related to the number of resignations, turnover rates, and ability to attract talent.

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez commented on the Technology Fee and noted that the University has factored in the projected 4% decline in enrollment which has resulted in expenditures that exceed the revenues. She added that there are adequate fund balances to absorb the additional expenditures. In terms of the requirements delineated under Florida Statutes Section 1004.28 and FIU Regulation 1502 pertaining to resources and space utilized by the University's DSOs, she indicated that approximately 131.3 FTE of personal services and approximately 14,439 square feet of space, valued at \$414K, are utilized.

A motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend that the Florida International University Board of Trustees (the BOT) approve the FIU 2022-23 University and Direct Support Organizations Operating Budgets and

authorize the University President to amend the budgets consistent with Legislative, Board of Governors and BOT directives and guidelines.

FF2. Proposed 2022-23 Fixed Capital Outlay Budget/Capital Improvement

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented the proposed 2022-23 Fixed Capital Outlay Budget/Capital Improvement for Committee review. She indicated that FIU's request for 2022-23 Public Education Capital Outlay Projects (PECO)/Capital Improvement projects totaled \$64,798,655 for deferred maintenance, \$30,798, 655; Engineering Building Phase II, \$33,500,000; and the Nursing Sexual Assault Exam Center, \$500,000.

A motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend to The Florida International University Board of Trustees (the BOT) approval of Florida International University's 2022-23 Fixed Capital Outlay Budget and authorize the University President to amend the budget as necessary, consistent with Legislative, Florida Board of Governors' and BOT directives and guidelines.

FF3. Request for Approval of Florida International University's 2023-24 Fixed Capital Outlay Legislative Budget Request Consisting of the five-year Capital Improvement Plan

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented FIU's 2023-24 Fixed Capital Outlay FCO Legislative Budget Request consisting of the five-year Capital Improvement Plan for Committee review. She explained that the Florida Board of Governors' (BOG) process has changed. She noted that universities now can only request funding for projects that have already been approved as part of the Educational Plant Survey. She stated that the BOG will only consider for funding those projects that are incomplete PECO projects which received a prior appropriation and requires additional PECO funds to complete; and/or the top two priorities for each university. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez added that FIU's priorities are the Engineering Building Phase II and the Honors College. She mentioned that FIU is presenting a total of five projects to the Board of Trustees, highlighting the remaining three projects, specifically the Science Laboratory Complex, the Academic Health Center Study Complex, and the remodeling/renovation of the Deuxieme Maison building.

A motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend to The Florida International University Board of Trustees (the BOT) approval of FIU's 2023-24 Fixed Capital Outlay Legislative Budget Request, consisting of the five-year Capital Improvement Plan and authorize the University President to amend the Legislative Budget Request as necessary, consistent with Florida Board of Governors and BOT directives and guidelines.

FF4. Proposed Amendments to Regulation FIU-1101 Tuition and Fees Schedule for the 2022-23 academic year

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented the proposed amendments to Regulation FIU-1101 Tuition and Fees Schedule for the 2022-23 academic year for Committee review. She pointed out that FIU charged separate per-credit tuition cost for each component of the Nurse Anesthesiology program and that with the proposed changes to the FIU Tuition and Fee Schedule, the program will change to a new composite tuition based on 110 credits. She indicated that technical revisions

include removing degree-level designations to the Nursing and Health Sciences Practicum/Certification Programs, removing reference to students enrolled before 2006, and aligning the definition of students to whom the Excess Credit surcharge applies with BOG Regulation 7.003.

A motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend that the Florida International University Board of Trustees approve amended Regulation FIU-1101 Tuition and Fees Schedule and delegate authority to the University President to approve any subsequent non-material amendments based on comments to the Regulation received from the Florida Board of Governors and as a result of the regulation-making process.

FF5. Engineering Building Phase I (BT-919) —Third Amendment to Prior Budget Approval

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented, for Committee review, the third amendment to the prior budget approval for the Engineering Building Phase I. She indicated that the architect is Perkins + Will and noted that the building will be located on the northeast corner of the Modesto A. Maidique campus. She pointed out that on December 8, 2021, the FIU Board of Trustees approved an increase in building size to 120,695 gross square feet and a budget increase to \$75.4M. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez stated that due to increases in market construction costs and changes associated with final design, an additional \$4.3M is being requested, increasing the total project cost from \$75.4M to \$79.7M. She delineated the major components related to the increased costs, including construction market cost escalation, \$2.8M; lab exhaust \$353,000; fifth and sixth floor air handlers, \$715,000; and fifth and sixth floor restrooms, \$438,000. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez commented that \$1.7M will come from a reallocation of an E&G Carryforward project (the surplus trailer) that has been postponed due to construction costs escalations that have made the project unfeasible at this time and the remaining shortfall will be funded from an additional \$2.6M in E&G Carryforward.

In response to Committee Chair Tovar, Interim President Jessell stated that the University is in the process of preordering as many materials as possible to mitigate rising costs in construction materials.

A motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend to the Florida International University Board of Trustees approval of the request to expand the size and budget of Engineering Building Phase I from the currently approved budget of \$75.4 million to \$79.7 million to accommodate cost increases in the construction market and refinements in the project's design since December 2021.

FF6. Approval of Amendment No. 5 to the 2010-20 Campus Master Plan for the Engineering Center Campus Redesignating Land Use to Accommodate the Construction of Academic and Research Facilities

There were no questions or comments from the Committee members.

A motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend that the Florida International University Board of Trustees approve

Amendment No. 5 to the Campus Master Plan for the Engineering Center to accommodate the construction of Academic and Research Facilities.

FF7. Approval of Contracts greater than or equal to \$3,000,000:

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented, for Committee review, contracts greater than or equal to \$3M. She commented that the contract with ODP Business Solutions, LLC fka Office Depot Inc. resulted from the ITN for office supplies and products. She indicated that the term of the contract is five (5) years with two (2) additional two (2) year potential renewals at a cost of approximately \$13,500,000. She commented on the requests for renewals: Oracle America Inc. for Oracle applications support and licenses for a total cost of \$3,708,002 for the contract term and Mythics, Inc. for Oracle cloud service subscription for a total cost of \$1,200,450 per year for the three (3) years.

Pursuant to the Delegations of Authority from the Florida International University Board of Trustees to the University President, as reflected in the Resolution on the President's Powers and Duties approved by the Board of Trustees on March 4, 2019, (i) a motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee recommend that the Florida International University Board of Trustees approve the University entering contracts 1-3 as specified in the Board materials and (ii) authorize the University President or his designee to execute, on behalf of the University, the aforementioned contracts and all of the documents, and take all actions, that may be necessary to effectuate the transactions contemplated in the respective contracts.

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented, for Committee review, contracts greater than or equal to \$1M and less than \$3M. She indicated that the marketing and media services ITN provides flexibility to the University as it relates to agencies that can be engaged with, noting that six (6) agencies were awarded for a term of three (3) years with the option to renew for two (2) additional, one (1) year terms. She pointed out that the estimated spend over the life of the contracts is \$1M for Andwell, LLC., Blue Daisy Media, Moore Communications Group, Inc., and Wragg & Casas Public Relations, Inc. Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez noted that the estimated spend over the life of the contracts is \$2M for Stinghouse Advertising LLC. and Z Advertising Group LLC. She mentioned that two (2) agencies were awarded for University signage with an approximate spend of \$1M for two (2) years with option to renew for three (3) additional, one (1) year terms. She mentioned that the contract with Education Advisory Board (EAB) Navigate pertains to the renewal of services to access a comprehensive student success management technology platform for a total cost of \$1,381,858.

Pursuant to the Delegations of Authority from the Florida International University Board of Trustees to the University President, as reflected in the Resolution on the President's Powers and Duties approved by the Board of Trustees on March 4, 2019, (i) a motion was made and unanimously passed that the FIU Board of Trustees Finance and Facilities Committee approve the University entering into the contracts as specified in the Board materials and (ii) authorize the University President or his designee to execute, on behalf of the University, said contracts and all of the documents, and take all actions, that may be necessary to effectuate the transactions contemplated in the respective contracts.

4. Discussion Item

4.1 Financial Performance Review, Third Quarter FY 2021-22

Interim CFO and Sr. VP Martinez presented the University's financial performance review for the third quarter of FY 2021-22. She indicated that operating revenues are above estimates by \$3.1M or 0.3% and that operating expenses are below estimates by \$22.3M or 2.0%, with a net favorable variance of \$25.4M. She pointed out that the University's total investment portfolio returned -3% as of March 31, 2022.

Subject: Approval of 2022-23 Education and General Carryforward Spending Plan, Fixed Capital Outlay Budget, and Related Certification

Proposed Committee Action:

Recommend to The Florida International University Board of Trustees (the BOT) approval of the Florida International University (FIU) Education and General (E&G) expenditure plan for carryforward funds in accordance with State University System of Florida Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 9.007 *State University Operating Budgets* and Florida Statute 1011.45 End of Year Balance of Funds; approval of the FIU Fixed Capital Outlay Budget in accordance with BOG Regulation 14.003; and authorize the University Chief Financial Officer to certify the unexpended amount of funds appropriated to the University from the General Revenue Fund, the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund, and the Education/General Student and Other Fees Trust Fund as of June 30, 2022 and the Fixed Capital Outlay budget; and authorize the University President to amend the BOT carryforward expenditure plan and fixed capital outlay budget as necessary and report to the BOT and the BOG any amendments to the spending plans in a format prescribed by the BOG Office of University Budgets.

Background Information:

Carryforward Spending Plan

Beginning in 1985, State University System (SUS) institutions received statutory authority to carry forward unexpended E&G funds in the current year operating budget and include these funds in the operating budget the following year. Carryforward fund balances are used for activities such as, but not limited to, student success, potential budget reductions, anticipated increases in university operations and prior-year encumbrances. During the 2019 legislative session, Florida Statute 1011.45 was amended to provide greater specificity on allowable expenditures from E&G carryforward fund balances and BOG Regulation 9.007 has been amended to reflect these changes. Authorized expenditures in an E&G Carryforward Spending Plan must include:

- *Maintenance of a minimum carryforward balance of 7 percent (previously 5 percent) of the total E&G operating budget*
- *BOT approval of an expenditure plan for carryforward balances in excess of the 7 percent minimum*
- *BOG review and approval of the BOT carryforward expenditure plan*
- *Authorized expenditures in the E&G carryforward expenditure plan may include:*
 - *Commitment of funds to a PECO project that has received a prior appropriation in order to complete the project*
 - *Completion of a renovation, repair, or maintenance project up to \$5 million per project*
 - *Replacement of a minor facility not exceeding 10,000 square feet up to \$2 million*
 - *Completion of a remodeling or infrastructure project that is survey recommended up to \$10 million*

- *Completion of a repair or replacement project necessary due to damage caused by a natural disaster for buildings*
- *Operating expenditures that support the university mission and that are nonrecurring*
- *Any purpose specified by the Board or in the General Appropriations Act*

The E&G expenditure plan shall include the estimated cost per planned expenditure and a timeline for completion of the expenditure. Additionally, F.S. 1011.45 now requires the Chief Financial Officer of each university to certify annually, by September 30, the unexpended amount of funds appropriated to the university from the General Revenue Fund, the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund, and the Education/General Student and Other Fees Trust Fund as of June 30 of the previous year. F.S. 1011.45 also allows the university to spend the minimum carryforward balance of 7 percent if a demonstrated emergency exists and the plan is approved by the university's Board of Trustees and the Board of Governors. In accordance with F.S. 1011.45 and BOG Regulation 9.007, any amendments to the approved E&G carryforward spending plan during the fiscal year shall be reported to the Board of Governors in a format prescribed by the Board's Office of University Budgets.

The E&G carryforward fund balance as of July 1, 2022, net of accounts receivables, accounts payables, and deferred student tuition and fees, totals \$88,153,683 for the University and \$20,687,332 for the Herbert Wertheim College of Medicine (HWCOM). After the 7 percent statutory reserve of \$39,807,997 for the University and \$3,622,619 for HWCOM, and \$3,479,561 of encumbrances for the University and \$450,202 for HWCOM, the carryforward spending plans total \$44,866,125 for the University and \$16,614,511 for HWCOM.

The 2022-23 Fixed Capital Outlay Budget includes both new projects as well as projects previously approved and authorized by the BOT and BOG where expenditures will take place in 2022-23.

EARLY LEARNING-20 EDUCATION CODE

PLANNING AND BUDGETING

1011.45 End of year balance of funds.—Unexpended amounts in any fund in a university current year operating budget shall be carried forward and included as the balance forward for that fund in the approved operating budget for the following year.

(1) Each university shall maintain a minimum carry forward balance of at least 7 percent of its state operating budget. If a university fails to maintain a 7 percent balance in state operating funds, the university shall submit a plan to the Board of Governors to attain the 7 percent balance of state operating funds within the next fiscal year.

(2) Each university that retains a state operating fund carry forward balance in excess of the 7 percent minimum shall submit a spending plan for its excess carry forward balance. The spending plan shall be submitted to the university's board of trustees for review, approval, or, if necessary, amendment by September 30, 2020, and each September 30 thereafter. The Board of Governors shall review, approve, and amend, if necessary, each university's carry forward spending plan by November 15, 2020, and each November 15 thereafter.

(3) A university's carry forward spending plan shall include the estimated cost per planned expenditure and a timeline for completion of the expenditure. Authorized expenditures in a carry forward spending plan may include:

(a) Commitment of funds to a public education capital outlay project for which an appropriation has previously been provided that requires additional funds for completion and which is included in the list required by s. [1001.706\(12\)\(d\)](#);

(b) Completion of a renovation, repair, or maintenance project that is consistent with the provisions of s. [1013.64\(1\)](#), up to \$5 million per project and replacement of a minor facility that does not exceed 10,000 gross square feet in size up to \$2 million;

(c) Completion of a remodeling or infrastructure project, including a project for a developmental research school, up to \$10 million per project, if such project is survey recommended pursuant to s. [1013.31](#);

(d) Completion of a repair or replacement project necessary due to damage caused by a natural disaster for buildings included in the inventory required pursuant to s. [1013.31](#);

(e) Operating expenditures that support the university mission and that are nonrecurring;

(f) Any purpose specified by the board or in the General Appropriations Act; and

(g) A commitment of funds to a contingency reserve for expenses incurred as a result of a state of emergency declared by the Governor pursuant to s. [252.36](#).

(4) Annually, by September 30, the chief financial officer of each university shall certify the unexpended amount of funds appropriated to the university from the General Revenue Fund, the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund, and the Education/General Student and Other Fees Trust Fund as of June 30 of the previous fiscal year.

(5) A university may spend the minimum carryforward balance of 7 percent if a demonstrated emergency exists and the plan is approved by the university's board of trustees and the Board of Governors.

9.007 State University Operating Budgets and Requests

(1) Each university president shall prepare an operating budget, including an Education & General (E&G) Carryforward Spending Plan, for approval by the university board of trustees in accordance with instructions, guidelines and standard formats provided by the Board of Governors.

(2) Each university board of trustees shall adopt an operating budget, including an E&G Carryforward Spending Plan, for the general operation of the university as prescribed by the regulations of the Board of Governors. The university board of trustees-ratified operating budget and E&G Carryforward Spending Plan must be presented to the Board of Governors for approval by a date established by the Chancellor. Each university president shall implement the operating budget and E&G Carryforward Spending Plan of the university as prescribed by Florida Statutes, regulations of the Board of Governors, policies of the university board of trustees, provisions of the General Appropriations Act, and data reflected within the State University System Allocation Summary and Workpapers publication.

(3) The operating budgets of each state university shall consist of the following budget entities:

(a) Education and General (E&G)– reports actual and estimated fiscal year operating revenues and expenditures for all E&G funds, including: General Revenue, Student and Other Fees Trust Fund, Educational Enhancement Trust Fund (Lottery), and the Phosphate Research Trust Fund.. In addition, expenditures from university E&G carryforward funds (unexpended balances from all prior-period E&G appropriations) shall be included in the actual history fiscal year reporting. University budgeted E&G carryforward funds shall be reported in the E&G Carryforward Spending Plan Report.

1. Otherwise by law, E&G funds are to be used for E&G activities only, such as, but not limited to, general instruction, research, public service, plant operations and maintenance as defined in Board of Governors guidelines, furniture, fixtures, and equipment, student services, libraries, administrative support, minor capital projects not to exceed \$1 million per individual project, and other enrollment-related and stand-alone operations of the universities.
2. Universities shall accumulate ending E&G fund balances for activities such as those outlined in section 3(a)(4). The ending E&G carryforward balances can only be used for nonrecurring expenditures. At any time the unencumbered available balance in the E&G fund of the university board of trustees approved operating budget falls below seven (7)

percent of the approved total, the university shall provide a written notification and plan to the Board of Governors to attain a seven (7) percent balance of state operating funds within the next fiscal year.

3. Each university that retains a state operating fund carryforward balance in excess of the seven (7) percent minimum shall submit an E&G Carryforward Spending Plan for its excess carryforward balance. The Carryforward Spending Plan shall be submitted to the university's board of trustees for review, approval, or if necessary, amendment by September 30, 2020, and each September 30 thereafter. The Board of Governors shall review, approve, and amend, if necessary, each university's E&G Carryforward Spending Plan by November 15, 2020, and each November 15 thereafter.
4. A university's E&G Carryforward Spending Plan shall include the estimated cost per planned expenditure and a projected timeline for completion of the expenditure. Authorized expenditures in an E&G Carryforward Spending Plan may include:
 - a. Commitment of funds to a public education capital outlay project for which an appropriation has previously been provided that requires additional funds for completion and which is included in the list required by section 1001.706(12)(d), Florida Statutes;
 - b. Completion of a renovation, repair, or maintenance project (as defined in Board Regulation 14.001) that is consistent with the provisions of section 1013.64(1), Florida Statutes, up to \$5 million per project and replacement of a minor facility that does not exceed 10,000 gross square feet in size up to \$2 million;
 - c. Completion of a remodeling or infrastructure project (as defined in Board Regulation 14.001), including a project for a developmental research school, up to \$10 million per project, if such project is survey recommended pursuant to section 1013.31, Florida Statutes;
 - d. Completion of a repair or replacement project necessary due to damage caused by a natural disaster for buildings included in the inventory required pursuant to section 1013.31, Florida Statutes;
 - e. Operating expenditures that support the university mission and that are nonrecurring;
 - f. Any purpose specified by the university board of trustees or in the General Appropriations Act; and
 - g. A commitment of funds to a contingency reserve for expenses incurred as a result of a state of emergency declared by the Governor pursuant to s. 252.36, Florida Statutes.
5. Annually, by September 30, the chief financial officer of each university shall certify the unexpended amount of funds appropriated to the university from the General Revenue Fund, the Educational

Enhancement Trust Fund, and the Student and Other Fees Trust Fund as of June 30 of the previous fiscal year.

6. A University may spend the minimum carryforward balance of seven (7) percent if a demonstrated emergency exists and the plan is approved by the university's board of trustees and the Board of Governors.
 7. Expenditures from any source of funds by any university shall not exceed the funds available. No expenditure of funds, contract, or agreement of any nature shall be made that requires additional appropriation of state funds by the Legislature unless specifically authorized in advance by law or the General Appropriations Act.
 8. The following units are required to report under this budget entity:
 - State Universities
 - UF - Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences
 - UF Health Science Center
 - USF Medical Center
 - FSU Medical School
 - UCF Medical School
 - FIU Medical School
 - FAU Medical School
 - FAMU-FSU College of Engineering
 - Florida Postsecondary Comprehensive Transition Program (UCF)
 - Enterprise Cybersecurity Resiliency (USF)
- (b) Contracts and Grants – reports actual and estimated year revenues, expenditures, and positions for university functions which are supported by foundations, various state and federal agencies, local units of governments, businesses, and industries. Universities shall comply with all applicable federal, state, local, and university regulations and guidelines as they relate to grants, contracts, and sponsored research programs.
- (c) Auxiliary Enterprises – reports actual and estimated year revenues, expenditures, and positions for self-supporting functions such as, but not limited to, parking services, housing, bookstore operations, and food services.
- (d) Local Funds – reports actual and estimated year revenues, expenditures, and positions for the following specific areas:
1. Student Activities – revenues generated primarily from the activity and service fee each university is authorized to charge its students as a component of the mandatory fee schedule. Activities commonly

supported by these revenues include student government, cultural events, student organizations, and intramural/club events.

2. Intercollegiate Athletics – revenues generated from the student athletic fee that each university is authorized to collect as a component of the mandatory fee schedule, and from other sources including ticket sales, radio/TV, bowl games, and tournament revenues.
 3. Concession Fund – revenues generated from various vending activities located around the campuses. The university's budget must reflect the various departments/activities on each campus which benefit from receipt of these funds.
 4. Student Financial Aid – revenues received by the university for loans, grants, scholarships, and other student financial aid. Expenditures of these funds must be reported by activities such as externally-funded loans, student scholarships, need-based financial aid, academic-based financial aid, and athletic grants/scholarships.
 5. Technology Fee – revenues generated from the technology fee that a university is authorized to charge its students as a component of the mandatory fee schedule. Proceeds from this fee shall be used to enhance instructional technology resources for students and faculty.
 6. Board-Approved Fees – student fees presented to the Board of Governors for approval by a university board of trustees that is intended to address a student need not currently being met through existing university services, operations, or another fee.
 7. Self-Insurance Programs – revenues received by the university from entities and individuals protected by the self-insurance programs. This budget must reflect expenditures related to the administration of the self-insurance programs and the judgments or claims arising out of activities for which the self-insurance program was created.
- (e) Faculty Practice Plan – related to the activities for the state universities' medical schools and health centers. This budget must be designed to report the monetary level of clinical activity regarding the training of students, post-graduate health professionals, and medical faculty.
- (4) The operating budgets of each university shall represent the following:
- (a) The university's plan for utilizing the resources available through direct or continuing appropriations by the Legislature, allocation amendments, or from local sources including student tuition and fees. The provisions of the General Appropriations Act and the State University System Allocation Summary and Workpapers publication will be taken into consideration in the development and preparation of the E&G data.
 - (b) Actual prior-year revenues, expenditures (including E&G carryforward amounts expended), and positions, as well as current-year estimated

- revenues, expenditures, and positions. University E&G carryforward funds shall be budgeted in the E&G Carryforward Spending Plan.
- (c) Assurance that the universities are in compliance with general legislative intent for expenditure of the appropriated state funds and with the Board of Governors' regulations, guidelines and priorities for all funding sources

(5) Any earnings (interest, investment, or other) resulting from the investment of current-year E&G appropriations are considered to be of the same nature as the original appropriations, and are subject to the same expenditure regulations as the original appropriations. E&G earnings are not to be utilized for non-E&G related activities or for fixed capital outlay activities except as provided by law. Earnings resulting from invested E&G carryforward funds are considered to be additions to the university's E&G carryforward balance and shall be expended in accordance with section (3)(a) of this regulation.

Anticipated earnings for the estimated year from invested E&G funds should not be included when building the detailed operating budget schedules. Estimated-year E&G earnings and planned expenditures of these funds should only be reported on the manually-prepared E&G Schedule I and Summary Schedule I reports.

(6) Any unexpended E&G appropriation carried forward to the fund balance in a new fiscal year shall be utilized in support of nonrecurring E&G activities only unless otherwise provided by law.

(7) E&G non-recurring is defined as an expenditure that is not expected to be needed or available after a point in time. Non-recurring expenditures have distinct elements:

- (a) Time limited in nature, where an end date to a given contract or activity is known,
- (b) There is no promise or guarantee of future funding,
- (c) May cross multiple years, but the above two provisions apply,
- (d) May address financial challenges resulting from external factors (examples could include, but are not limited to, federal government shutdown, drop in state revenue resulting in a mid-year reduction)

(8) Any amendments to the approved E&G Carryforward Spending Plan during the fiscal year shall be reported to the Board of Governors for a time period and in a format as prescribed by the Chancellor.

(9) Each university board of trustees may submit to the Chancellor's Office annually a Legislative Budget Request for operations. Such requests shall be

made in accordance with the fiscal policy guidelines, formats, instructions, and schedule provided by the Chancellor.

14.003 Fixed Capital Outlay Projects – University Budgeting Procedures

(1) Each university will prepare an annual Fixed Capital Outlay (FCO) Budget for all Fixed Capital Outlay (FCO) Projects in accordance with the instructions, guidelines, and standard formats provided by the Chancellor for those FCO Projects as defined in Board Regulation 14.001. The FCO Budget must be approved by both the university board of trustees and the Board of Governors. Such approval remains in effect for the life of the FCO Projects. The annual FCO Budget must include all FCO Projects, including previously approved projects that have not yet been completed.

(2) FCO Projects shall be listed by category or categories in the University FCO Budget as follows:

FCO Budget Categories

a. Education & General (E&G) Operating Projects – This category is consolidated, and includes all FCO Projects, as defined in Board Regulation 14.001, funded from current year E&G operating funds. No individual project in this category funded in whole or in part with E&G operating funds shall exceed \$1,000,000, pursuant to Board Regulation 9.007(3)(a)1.

Boards of Trustees may adopt policies requiring more detailed line item budgeting at the local level.

b. Carryforward (CF) - Small Projects – This category is consolidated and includes all FCO Projects with a total cost up to \$2 million funded in whole or in part from CF funds. No individual FCO project in this category shall exceed \$2,000,000. Allowable uses include maintenance, repair, renovation, remodeling, and demolition of existing educational facilities and existing general site improvements (E&G campus real property improvements), as well as replacement of facilities less than 10,000 gross square feet. This category must be budgeted as a single identical line in both the carry forward spending plan and FCO Budget. This may also be reflected as one of multiple funding sources under categories State Appropriated Projects and Non-Appropriated Projects.

c. Carryforward (CF) – Large Projects – This category includes- FCO Projects funded in whole or in part from CF funds, where the total project cost is greater than \$2 million. This may also be reflected as one of multiple funding sources under categories State Appropriated Projects and Non-Appropriated Projects. Allowable uses include the following:

- i. Completion of a Public Education Capital Outlay (PECO) project that has received a state appropriation and is included on the Board's incomplete project list.
- ii. A renovation, repair, or maintenance project where the total CF expenditure on the project is up to \$5 million.

- iii. A remodeling or infrastructure project, including a developmental research school, where the total CF expenditure is up to \$10 million.
- iv. Repair or replacement of facilities due to damage caused by a natural disaster.

d. State Appropriated Projects includes all FCO Projects using funds originally appropriated as FCO funds by the State of Florida, notwithstanding the criteria provided in Board Regulation 14.001. These funds should never be included in the university operating budget. Examples include PECO and Capital Improvement Trust Fund (CITF).

e. Non-Appropriated Projects includes all FCO Projects that have not directly or indirectly used funds appropriated by the State. Examples of such funding sources would include housing revenue bonds, parking revenue bonds, private donations, federal grants, insurance proceeds, and athletic revenues.

(3) For the purpose of this regulation, Fixed Capital Outlay (FCO) Projects do not apply to those projects acquired, constructed, and owned by a Direct Support Organization or under a Public Private Partnership; the requirements for those projects are addressed in either the Debt Management Guidelines or the Public Private Partnership Guidelines.

(4) The FCO Budget may be amended, subject to use of only the categories authorized in section (2), as follows:

- a. E&G Operating Projects - must be approved by the board of trustees or designee.
- b. CF Small Projects – Individual new projects up to \$2 million, as well as increases up to \$2 million on individual existing projects, must be approved by the board of trustees or designee.
- c. CF Large Projects – Individual new projects added to the FCO Budget, as well as increases greater than \$2 million in CF expenditures on individual existing projects, require Board of Trustees and Board of Governors approval.
- d. State Appropriated Projects – Individual new projects greater than \$5 million, as well as increases over \$5 million to existing individual projects, require Board of Trustees and Board of Governors approval.
- e. Non-Appropriated Projects – All new projects greater than \$5 million, as well as increases over \$5 million to existing projects, require Board of Trustees and Board of Governors approval.

(5) FCO Project spending may be reported annually at the end of the fiscal year at the project detail level, in a format specified by the Chancellor.



Subject: Authorization to Increase Project Budget for the Trish and Dan Bell Chapel and East Loop Road Realignment from \$15.44M to \$28.55M

Proposed Committee Action:

Recommend to the Florida International University Board of Trustees authorization to increase the project budget for the Trish and Dan Bell Chapel and East Loop Road Realignment (“Project”) from \$15,444,286 to \$28,545,645.

Background Information

On December 3, 2020, the FIU Board of Trustees (BOT) approved the naming of The Trish and Dan Bell Chapel (“Chapel”), the design of the Chapel, the design of the roadway improvements on the east side of the FIU Modesto A. Maidique Campus (MMC) to accommodate the construction of the Chapel and the future expansion of the Graham Center, and an amendment to the 2010-20 University MMC Campus Master Plan to include the Chapel and roadway improvements as contemplated in the proposed 2015-30 University MMC Campus Master Plan.

On December 8, 2021 the FIU Board of Trustees authorized the selection of a Construction Manager (CM) and delegated to the President the authority to negotiate and enter into a contract with the selected CM. The University conducted a qualifications based competitive selection process resulting in the selection of Moss Construction. The President finalized the contract with Moss on February 2, 2022 and Moss initiated pre-construction services.

The previously approved project budget is \$15,444,286. Trish and Dan Bell, as the principal donors, have actively participated in the design process with the Architect/Engineer (A/E), Gurri-Matute. At the advanced schematic design (ASD) stage, Moss provided a construction cost estimate which results in a project cost estimate of \$28,545,645-- \$13,101,359 above the previously approved project cost of \$15,444,286. In response, the Bell’s doubled their donation from \$7M to \$14M, and the University received a legislative appropriation of \$3,519,655 in Deferred Maintenance/Infrastructure funding that can be added to the road realignment for the extension of chilled water lines. While that still leaves a shortfall of \$2,581,704, FIU Foundation has committed to covering the gap with additional philanthropic fundraising. In order to ensure that the project will be completely timely, Unrestricted Treasury Auxiliary funds will be the backup and bridge the gap until the additional philanthropic funds are raised.

The proposed funding sources for the increased budget follows:

Unrestricted Treasury Auxiliary Fund Balances and CITF Appropriations are currently available for use. Private Funding in the amount of \$2,815,300 has been received to date and is immediately available for use. As reflected in the December 3, 2020 BOT approval, the FIU Foundation will advance to the University the full amount of private funding for the Project from unrestricted Foundation Fund balances. On October 22, 2021, the FIU Foundation formally authorized and approved the advance of up to \$7,706,700, from the Foundation's General Reserve toward the construction of the Chapel. In October 2022 the FIU Foundation will formally review the proposal to advance up to another \$5,478,000 toward the construction of the Chapel.

**SUBJECT: ADVANCEMENT OF FUNDING TOWARDS CONSTRUCTION OF THE TRISH

I. PROPOSED BOARD ACTION:

Authorize and approve the advancement by the FIU Foundation (the "Foundation"), to Florida International University (the "University"), of an amount up to \$7,706,700, payable from the Foundation's General Reserve, towards the construction of The Trish and Dan Bell Chapel.

II. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Foundation Board of Directors and the University Board of Trustees have previously approved the construction and naming of the Trish and Dan Bell Chapel (the "Chapel"). Mr. and Mrs. Bell also previously announced (i) an initial gift of \$5 million to the FIU Foundation towards the design and construction by the University of the Chapel, and (ii) a subsequent gift of another \$2 million as part of a one-for-one challenge match program. With the original gift and the challenge gifts, it is anticipated that up to \$9 million in private funding will be ultimately available for the construction of the Chapel.

Currently, the Foundation has \$1,293,300 in immediately available funds to reimburse the University for construction costs (the "Paid Chapel Funds").

The University and the Foundation acknowledge that construction costs above and beyond the Paid Chapel Funds will be incurred prior to the receipt by the Foundation of the full amount of the original gift, the challenge gifts and any other

private funding. The difference between the expected costs of construction and the Paid Chapel Funds equals \$7,706,700 (the “Chapel Construction Balance”).

The Foundation will reimburse the University for construction costs as they are expended. Furthermore, the Foundation proposes to first utilize the Paid Chapel Funds for reimbursements to the University. Thereafter, following depletion of the Paid Chapel Funds, the Foundation proposes to advance, from its General Reserve Account, an amount equal to the Chapel Construction Balance, which, pursuant to Foundation policy, requires the approval of the Foundation’s Board of Directors.

III. PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The Board authorizes and approves, following the depletion of the Paid Chapel Funds, the advancement to the University of an amount not to exceed the Chapel Construction Balance, to be used by the University towards construction costs and fees actually expended by the University for the Chapel.
2. The Chapel Construction Balance shall be disbursed from time to time by the Foundation to the University, from the Foundation’s General Reserve, as such costs are actually expended by, and upon request of, the University.
3. Following the disbursement of any amounts from the General Reserve as set forth above, all gift installments paid by Mr. and Mrs. Bell and/or other private funding sources to the Foundation towards the construction of the Chapel, shall be promptly allocated into the Foundation’s General Reserve, on a dollar-for-dollar basis.



Anthony Travel LLC shall provide travel management services for Athletics. The proposed contract covers:

- **Cost:** \$557,954 total including renewal terms

In 2014, FIU joined a consortium of other State University System (SUS) schools, which includes University of South Florida, University of Central Florida, Florida Gulf Coast University, and University of Northern Florida, for an insurance broker, Gallagher Student Health & Special Risk (“Gallagher”), to provide student health insurance. This process requires that each university sign individual policyholder agreements with the selected insurance company. The consortium was put together then and now to enable the SUS to have greater buying power with a larger participant base to provide students health insurance. Each year Gallagher solicits plans from the current and other vendors that meet federal requirements and state coverage/limit requirements and serves as the intermediary in terms of plan selection, student enrollment in plan, plan administration, claim analysis and advises the consortium of changes in law that may impact student health insurance.

The contract with Arthur J. Gallagher Risk Management is being requested by the Office of Research and Economic Development to provide voluntary and hard waiver insurance coverage to FIU enrolled students, including international students, student athletes, graduate assistants, and

students on FIU fellowships. The procurement method for this purchase is Exceptional Purchase per BOG Procurement Regulation 18.001(4)(c) – Purchase of Insurance.







RECITALS





RECITALS



TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. Effective Date.** The “Effective Date” of this Agreement shall be the date upon which the last party to execute this Agreement has done so, as evidenced by the date noted below its signature.
- 2. Term.** This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall continue until June 30, 2027 (the “Initial Term”). The Agreement may be renewed two (2) times for a period of five (5) years each (each, a “Renewal Term”). The Initial Term and any Renewal Term(s) shall be known, collectively, as the “Term.”
- 3. Payment.** FIU shall pay Contractor pursuant to Exhibit IV.
- 4. Payment Terms.** Contractor shall submit invoices for fees or other compensation for services or expenses in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit. FIU will make payment in accordance with FIU Regulation FIU-2202, which states the Contractor’s rights as a vendor and FIU’s responsibilities concerning interest penalties and time limits for payment of invoices. Upon receipt, FIU has five (5) business days to inspect and approve the goods or services. If a payment is not issued within **forty (40) days of receipt** of a proper invoice and receipt and inspection and approval of the goods and services, FIU will pay to the Contractor, in addition to the amount of the invoice, an interest penalty at the rate established pursuant to Florida Statutes §55.03(1), provided the interest penalty is in excess of one dollar (\$1.00). A Vendor Ombudsman has been established within the Office of Business and Finance. The duties of this individual include acting as an advocate for vendors who may be experiencing problems in obtaining timely payment from FIU. The Vendor Ombudsman may be contacted at (305) 348-2101. The Contractor shall cooperate with FIU and provide specific records and/or access to all of the Contractor’s records related to this Agreement for purposes of conducting an audit or investigation. FIU will provide Contractor with reasonable notice of the need for such records or access.
- 5. Beneficiary.** The parties agree that all obligations of Contractor under the Contract, and all benefits provided therein by Contractor pursuant to the Solicitation and the contract resulting therefrom, shall inure to the benefit of FIU, and, as applicable, Florida International University, the FIU Board of Trustees, the Florida Board of Governors, the State of Florida and their respective trustees, officers, agents, employees, successors and assigns, pursuant to this Agreement.
- 6. No Guarantees.** Contractor acknowledges that this Agreement is not a guarantee of any work.
- 7. Insurance.** Contractor shall, at minimum, have and maintain the types and amounts of insurance outlined in the Solicitation, in addition to that which is necessary to protect both Contractor and FIU against all liabilities, losses, damages, claims, settlements, expenses, and legal fees arising out of or resulting from performance of the Agreement, in any and all forms. Contractor shall name and shall require all providers, partners, suppliers, subcontractors and anyone else providing services relating to this Agreement to name, as appropriate, The Florida International University Board of Trustees, Florida International University, the State of Florida, The Florida Board of Governors, and their respective trustees, directors, officers, employees and agents, as additional insureds. The policies of the Contractor, its providers, partners, suppliers and subcontractors and anyone else providing services to the University shall be primary and any insurance carried by FIU shall be noncontributing with respect thereto. FIU, as a public body corporate entity, is self-insured, and will provide its Certificate of Insurance upon request; FIU will not purchase additional insurance coverage for this Agreement. FIU is not liable for the acts of third parties or the consequences of the acts of third parties.
- 8. Relationship of the Parties.** The Contractor is an independent contractor, and neither the Contractor nor the Contractor’s employees, agents, or other representatives shall be considered FIU’s employees or agents. Contractor represents that Contractor and Contractor’s spouse or child are not employees of the University, and Contractor does not have an employment or contractual relationship with an employee of the University pursuant to [FIU Policy 140.105](#). The Contractor shall not use FIU’s name, trademarks, logos, or marks without FIU’s prior written approval. The Contractor represents and warrants that it is not on the Convicted Vendor List (see Fla. Stat. § 287.133(2)(a)). Each party hereby assumes any and all risk of personal injury and property damage attributable to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of that party and the officers, employees, and agents thereof. The Contractor also assumes such risk with respect to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of the Contractor’s subcontractors or persons otherwise acting or engaged to act at the instance of the Contractor in furtherance of the Contractor fulfilling the Contractor’s obligations under this Agreement.

10. Annual Appropriations. FIU's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is subject to and contingent upon the availability of funds appropriated by the Florida Legislature or otherwise lawfully expendable for the purposes of such Contract for the current and future periods. FIU will give notice to the Contractor of the non-availability of funds when FIU has knowledge thereof. Upon receipt of such notice by Contractor, Contractor is entitled to payment only for those services performed and accepted by FIU prior to the date such notice is received.

11. Taxes. FIU is a tax immune sovereign and exempt from the payment of sales, use or excise taxes. The Contractor shall pay all personal property taxes on leased equipment and all taxes based upon net income.

12. Travel Expenses. Contractor shall not charge FIU for any travel expenses, meals, and lodging unless otherwise provided in this Agreement and FIU's prior written approval of the expenses has been obtained. Under such circumstances, Contractor is authorized to incur the agreed to travel expenses which will be payable by FIU, but only to the extent permitted in Florida Statutes § 112.061 and the [FIU Policy 1110.060 Travel: University Travel Expense Policy](#). Contractor is responsible for any expenses in excess of these prescribed amounts.

13. Force Majeure. No default, delay or failure to perform on the part of the either party shall be considered a default, delay or failure to perform otherwise chargeable, hereunder, if such default, delay or failure to perform is due to causes beyond either party's reasonable control including, but not limited to, strikes, lockouts or inactions of governmental authorities; epidemics; acts of terrorism; war; embargoes; fire; earthquakes; hurricanes; acts of God; or default of common carrier. In the event of such default, delay or failure to perform, any date or times by which either party is otherwise scheduled to perform shall be extended automatically for a period of time equal in duration to the time lost by reason of the excused default, delay or failure to perform.

14. Sovereign Immunity. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as an indemnification of the Contractor by FIU or as a waiver of sovereign immunity beyond that provided in Florida Statutes §768.28.

15. Indemnification. The Contractor is responsible for its performance under this Agreement. The Contractor will indemnify and hold harmless, assume liability for and defend, the State of Florida, the Florida Board of Governors, FIU and their officers, employees, and agents, from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertions of liability, losses, costs and expenses, which may arise in any manner or are alleged to have arisen, from the acts, omissions or wrongful conduct of Contractor or Contractor's officers, employees, agents, guests, patrons, licenses, invitees or subcontractors in connection with or related to their operations, activities, and/or occupancy or use of the FIU premises in performance of this Agreement. This provision shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

16. Trademark or Copyright Infringement. Contractor will, at its expense, defend any suit brought against FIU and will indemnify FIU against an award of damages and costs made against FIU by settlement or final judgment of a court that is based on a claim that the use of the Contractor's product infringes a trademark or copyright of a third party; provided that FIU notifies Contractor in writing of the suit or any claim of infringement within thirty (30) days after receiving notice thereof, and further provided that Contractor is permitted to control the defense in any litigation or settlement of the suit. FIU will provide reasonable cooperation in the defense of the suit at Contractor's expense.

Such defense and indemnity shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

17. Compliance with Laws. In the performance of the Agreement, Contractor shall, at its own expense, at all times during the term of the Agreement: (A) comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances and all other governmental requirements as applicable and required within Contractor's industry standard, as well as all applicable FIU regulations; and (B) have all applicable governmental permits, licenses, consents, and approvals necessary to perform its obligations under the Agreement. This obligation shall specifically include, but is not limited to, Contractor's compliance with applicable export control laws, including the International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR), the Export Administration Regulations (EAR), and the Office of Foreign Assets Control Regulations (OFAC).

18. Privacy. Contractor shall, at its own expense, at all times during the term of the Agreement, comply with any and all applicable state and federal laws and FIU policies and procedures governing the use and/or safe-keeping of confidential, highly sensitive, personally identifiable and/or protected health information ("PHI") (as the terms may be defined by state or federal law), including, but not limited to, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), the Gramm-Leach Bliley Act, the Federal Trade Commission's Red Flags Rule (which implements Section 114 of the Fair and Accurate Credit Transactions Act of 2003), [FIU Policy 1110.032](#) – Preventing Identity Theft on Covered Accounts, and [FIU Procedure 1930.021](#) – Data Stewardship (collectively, "Privacy Laws"). Contractor shall obtain in advance all necessary permissions and consents, as applicable, in regards to its collection/receipt of any such information. Further, if Contractor is assuming duties that would otherwise be provided by FIU and will have access to student data, Contractor shall notify FIU's Office of the General Counsel and receive appointment to receive such information, in writing, prior to accessing any such student data. In the event that FIU will share with or provide access to Contractor of any PHI, FIU and Contractor shall, pursuant to [FIU Policy 1660.015](#), enter into a separate business associate agreement which will govern the use of the PHI (in lieu of this provision). Contractor agrees to include all of such terms and conditions contained in any subcontractor or agency contracts providing services on behalf of Contractor

19. Compliance with Public Records Law. FIU is subject to applicable public records laws as provided by provisions of Florida Statutes Chapter 119, and FIU will respond to such public records request without any duty to give the Contractor prior notice. If Contractor is a "contractor" as defined under Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes, Contractor shall comply with all applicable public records laws. Specifically, Contractor shall: (1) keep and maintain public records required by FIU to perform the service; (2) upon request from FIU's custodian of public records, provide FIU with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided under that section, or as otherwise provide by law; (3) ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the contract if Contractor does not transfer the records to FIU; and (4) upon completion of the contract, transfer, at no cost, to FIU all public records in possession of Contractor or keep and maintain public records required by FIU to perform the Service. If Contractor transfers all public records to FIU upon completion of the contract, Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the contract, Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to FIU, upon request by FIU's public records custodian, in a format that is compatible with FIU's information technology systems. If FIU receives a request for public records, and FIU does not possess such records, FIU shall immediately notify Contractor of such request, and Contractor must provide them to FIU or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time. If Contractor does not comply with the request for records, FIU shall enforce the terms of the contract, and Contractor may be subject to civil action under Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes, and the penalties outlined under Section 119.10, Florida Statutes. FIU may unilaterally cancel the Agreement for Contractor's refusal to allow public access to all public records that were made or received in conjunction with the Agreement. This provision shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of the Agreement. **IF THE CONTRACTOR HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO THE CONTRACTOR'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, CONTACT THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT (305) 348-1377, BY E-MAIL AT recordsmanagement@fiu.edu, OR BY MAIL at 11200 SW 8 ST., GL 460, MIAMI, FLORIDA 33199.**

20. Third Party Beneficiaries. The Agreement does not and is not intended to confer any rights or remedies upon any person other than the parties to the Agreement.

21. Confidentiality of Information. The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that (a) all documents, studies, materials and information furnished to the Contractor by FIU or FIU's affiliates in connection with this Agreement and (b) all reports, studies, plans, deliverables, strategies, materials and other documents and information developed or prepared for FIU in connection with this Agreement or which reflect any of the documents, studies, materials or information furnished to the Contractor by FIU (the materials described in (a) and (b) are collectively referred to as the "Information") are and shall remain at all times confidential, proprietary, and the sole property of FIU. The Contractor agrees that it shall not use the Information and will not share the Information with its employees, except as necessary to the Contractor's performance under this Agreement, and the Contractor shall at all times comply with all state and federal laws governing the use and/or safe-keeping of confidential and/or personally identifiable information. The Contractor shall not disclose Information to third parties unless it obtains FIU's written consent to such disclosure.

In the event the Contractor required by subpoena or other judicial or administrative process or by law to disclose such records, the Contractor shall (i) provide FIU with prompt notice thereof; (ii) consult with FIU on the advisability of taking steps to resist or narrow such disclosure; (iii) furnish only that portion of the information that is responsive to the request; (iv) comply with the requirements of all state and federal privacy laws applicable to the Information, which may include but is not be limited, to Florida Public Records laws, FERPA, the Gramm-Leach Bliley Act, the Federal Trade Commission's Red Flags Rule (which implements Section 114 of the Fair and Accurate Credit Transactions Act of 2003); and (v) reasonably cooperate with FIU in any attempt that FIU may make to obtain an order or other reliable assurance that confidential treatment will be accorded the records. Upon termination of this Agreement or upon request by FIU, the Contractor shall promptly return the Information to FIU. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if FIU will share or provide access to protected health information or "PHI" to FIU for the Contractor to perform this Agreement, FIU and the Contractor will enter into a separate business associate agreement which will govern the confidentiality and non-use obligations of this Agreement regarding the PHI (in lieu of this provision). In the event that FIU will share with or provide access to Contractor of any protected health information ("PHI"), as that term is or may be defined by state or federal law, FIU and Contractor shall, pursuant to [FIU Policy 1660.015](#), enter into a separate business associate agreement which will govern the use of the PHI (in lieu of this provision). Contractor agrees to include all of such terms and conditions contained in any subcontractor or agency contracts providing services on behalf of Contractor. This provision shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

22. Lobbying. Contractor is prohibited from using funds provided under this Agreement for the purpose of lobbying the Legislature or any official, officer, commission, board, authority, council, committee, or department of the executive branch or the judicial branch of state government.

23. Federal Funds. If FIU has entered into an agreement with the United States of America, or any Department thereof, and this Agreement is entered into with Contractor to further the performance of the work required in such federal agreement, Contractor shall comply with the terms contained in FIU's Federally Funded Projects Addendum found at <https://generalcounsel.fiu.edu/contracts-forms/>, herein incorporated by reference.

24. Section 889 Compliance Certification. Contractor certifies its compliance with § 889 of the McCain National Defense Authorization Act (prohibition against use of covered telecommunications equipment).

25. Termination for Cause. Either party may terminate this Agreement for cause by giving the other party thirty (30) calendar-days written notice setting forth with specificity the basis for the termination of this Agreement for cause. For purposes of this Agreement, "cause" shall mean the failure by either party to: (i) provide the goods or perform the services within the time specified in this Agreement; or (ii) adhere to any terms of this Agreement.

26. Termination without Cause. FIU may terminate this Agreement by giving Contractor at least ninety (90) days prior written notice of termination. FIU shall only be liable for payment of goods received and/or services rendered and accepted by FIU prior to the effective date of termination.

27. Information Technology. If Contractor has access to FIU's information technology infrastructure, or will be providing such infrastructure to FIU, Contractor agrees at all times to maintain network security that, at a minimum, includes: network firewall provisioning, intrusion detection, and regular third party penetration testing. Contractor further agrees to:

- a. Network Standards: to use at least those standards that FIU applies to its own network, pursuant to [FIU Policy 1910.010 - University Wireless Network Infrastructure](#);
- b. Data Security: to protect and maintain the security of FIU data with protection that is at least as good as or better than that maintained by FIU. These security measures include maintaining secure environments that are patched and up-to-date with all appropriate security updates pursuant to [FIU Policy 1930.020 - Information Technology Security](#);
- c. Data Transmission: that any and all transmission or exchange of system application data with FIU and/or any other parties expressly designated by FIU, shall take place via secure means, e.g., HTTPS or FTPS;
- d. Data Storage: that any and all FIU data will be stored, processed, and maintained solely on designated target servers and that no FIU data at any time will be processed on or transferred to any portable or laptop computing device or any portable storage medium, unless medium is in part of the Contractor's designated backup and recovery process;
- e. Domain Encryption: that any websites hosted by Contractor on behalf of FIU shall be on an encrypted domain in compliance with the minimum security standards pursuant to [FIU Policy 175.150 - Digital Communications Standards Policy](#);
- f. Data Encryption: to store any FIU backup data as part of its designated backup and recovery process in encrypted form, using no less than 128 bit key;
- g. Password Protection: that any portable or laptop computer that resides at any FIU facility, has access to a FIU network, or stores any non-public FIU data is equipped with strong and secure password protection;
- h. Data Re-Use: that all data exchanged shall be used expressly and solely for the purpose enumerated in the Agreement. Data shall not be distributed, repurposed or shaped across other applications, environments, or business units of Contractor. Contractor further agrees that no FIU data of any kind shall be transmitted, exchanged or otherwise passed to other vendors or interested parties except on a case-by-case basis as specifically agreed to in writing by FIU;
- i. Data Destruction: that, upon termination of the Agreement, it shall erase, destroy, and render unreadable all FIU data from all computer systems and backups, and certify in writing that these actions have been completed within thirty (30) days of the termination of the Agreement or within seven (7) days of the request of an agent of FIU, whichever shall come first; and
- j. Notification and Data Breaches: to comply with all applicable laws that require the notification of individuals in the event of unauthorized release of personally identifiable information or other event requiring notification in accordance therewith. In the event of a data breach of any Contractor's security obligations or other event requiring notification under applicable law (a "Notification Event"), Contractor agrees to assume responsibility for informing all such individuals in accordance with applicable laws and to indemnify, hold harmless and defend FIU against any claims, damages, or other harm related to such Notification Event.

28. PCI DSS. If Contractor's provision of services involve the acceptance of funds on behalf of the University or involve credit card services, Contractor agrees to comply with those terms contained in [FIU Policy 1110.025 - Payment Card Processing](#) reference. Further, Contractor shall be responsible for the security of all FIU customer cardholder data in its possession. Contractor represents and warrants that for the life of the Agreement and/or while Contractor has involvement with FIU customer cardholder data, the software and services used for processing transactions shall be compliant with standards established by the Payment Card Industry Security Standards Council (<https://www.pcisecuritystandards.org/>). Contractor shall, upon written request, furnish proof of compliance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard (PCI DSS) within 10 business days of the request. Contractor agrees to provide to FIU a current and complete copy of their Attestation of Compliance (AOC). Further, Contractor agrees to provide to FIU a proof of a recent (no more than 3 months old) passing quarterly external vulnerability scan as submitted by an Approved Scanning Vendor (ASV).

29. E-Verify: All terms defined in §448.095, Fla. Stat., are adopted and incorporated into this provision. Pursuant to §448.095, Fla. Stat., Contractor certifies that it is registered with and uses the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by the Contractor during the term of this Agreement. If Contractor enters into a contract with a subcontractor to perform work or provide services pursuant to this Agreement, Contractor shall likewise require the subcontractor to comply with the requirements of §448.095, Fla. Stat., and the subcontractor shall provide to Contractor an affidavit stating that the subcontractor does not employ, contract with or subcontract with an unauthorized alien. Contractor shall maintain a copy of such affidavit for the duration of the contract. FIU may terminate this Agreement immediately upon notice to Contractor for any violation of this provision.

30. Deletion. Any term and/or condition in the Exhibits on the following subject matters are hereby deleted in their entirety and declared null and void: (a) Grants of exclusivity by FIU to Contractor; (b) Restrictions on the hiring

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of Contractor's employees; (c) FIU's responsibility to pay intangible taxes, property taxes, or sales taxes; (d) FIU's tort liability; (e) Automatic renewals of the term of the Agreement; (f) Limitation of time to bring suit; (g) Limitation of Contractor's liability; (h) that FIU performs reporting functions and/or maintains certain types of operations (i) Granting Contractor any right to audit FIU; (j) Attorneys' or collection fees provisions; (k) Arbitration and mediation clauses; and (l) Indemnification of Contractor by FIU.

31. No counterparts; facsimile signatures allowed. This Agreement may not be executed in counterparts. The Agreement, along with any and all Exhibits, may be executed and delivered by facsimile signature by any of the parties to the other parties; to the extent permissible under Florida law, a facsimiles signature shall have the same legal force and effect as an original signature and the receiving party may rely on the receipt of such document so executed and delivered by facsimile signature as if the original had been received.

32. Assignment/Modification of Contract. This Agreement may not be assigned or modified by either party except as agreed to in writing and signed by both parties. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties' successors and assigns.

33. Governing Law; Venue. This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of Florida and exclusive venue of any actions arising out of this Agreement shall be in the courts in Miami-Dade County, Florida.

34. Entire Agreement. This Agreement, along with the Exhibits and any other appendices, addenda, schedules, and amendments hereto, encompasses the entire agreement of the parties, and supersedes all previous understandings and agreements between the parties, whether oral or written. The parties hereby acknowledge and represent that said parties have not relied on any representation, assertion, guarantee, warranty, collateral contract or other assurance, except those set out in this Agreement, made by or on behalf of any other party or any other person or entity whatsoever, prior to the execution of this Agreement.

Prime Vendor Designation

WHEREAS, the University of Florida (“UF”) and Fisher Scientific Company L.L.C. (the “Contractor”) are parties to that Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for Laboratory Supplies ITN22JL-106 dated June 28, 2022 (the “Agreement”), which was awarded as a result of competitive solicitation for Research Laboratory Supplies, Equipment and Services ITN22JL-106 (the Solicitation), under which government institutions within the State of Florida and other universities within and outside of the State of Florida that recognize Contractor as its prime supplier of laboratory supplies and execute the Piggyback Agreement and sign this Prime Vendor Designation may purchase products or services from Contractor.

WHEREAS, The Florida International University Board of Trustees (“FIU”) and Contractor is entering into the Piggyback Agreement that will allow FIU to purchase products or services from Contractor under the terms and conditions of the Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto do hereby agree as follows:

Date:

1. Upon execution of the Piggyback Agreement by both FIU and Contractor, FIU may purchase products and services under the Agreement, subject to the terms and conditions of the Agreement, including, without limitation, the pricing set forth in Exhibits A and C of the Agreement.
2. FIU hereby acknowledges and agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions of the Agreement, which are specifically incorporated herein by reference. However, in the event of any conflicts between the terms in Piggyback Agreement and the Agreement and/or Competitive Solicitation ITN22JL-106 documents (to the extent applicable), the following is the order of precedence: (1) this Agreement; (2) Prime Vendor Designation; (3) the Price Sheet (Exhibit IV); (4) the Contract (Exhibit III); (5) the Solicitation (Exhibit I); and (6) the Response (Exhibit II).
3. FIU agrees to designate Contractor as its sole prime supplier of research laboratory supplies, equipment, and services available from Contractor as catalog products. FIU shall cooperate with Contractor in encouraging its users and purchasing personnel to order catalog products from Contractor:
 - FIU agrees to work with the non-prime supplier and remove “duplicated products” (to exclude like part numbers, like suppliers, and private label brand products) in any form of electronic catalog or campus marketplace resulting in exclusive products only.
4. As a result, by designating the Contractor as FIU’s Prime Vendor for research laboratory supplies, equipment, and services available from Contractor under the Agreement, FIU shall receive the following benefits:
 - Access to exceptional Discounts benchmarked for Academic/Medical Research. Institutions with laboratory supplies and equipment spend greater than \$32-\$45M.
 - Access to item Hotlist representing ~25% of the high-volume items on the UF campus.
 - Institutions participating under this agreement as a prime agreement may opt to customize the hotlist for their institution’s product mix.
 - A full-time employee (“Site Specialist”) will be assigned to work at the participant’s location. The Site Specialist will manage day to day operations at the Research Lab Supply Store and manage SOW responsibilities for chemical tagging across Participant’s multiple campuses. Among other duties, the Site Specialist will customer service support, sales representative support and mutually agreed changes in the scope of work.
 - State University System Shared Internship Program.
 - 0.65% annual rebate for spend excluding Life Technologies and 3P capital > \$75k under the prime contract paid back to the Participant, if their annual spend excluding Life Technologies and 3P Capital > \$75k meets or exceeds prior year sales. Participant may opt to take the 0.65% rebate in the form of a lump sum payment, product price reduction or cost reduction at the Participants choosing.
 - Hazardous fees, ice and blue ices fees, fuel surcharges are waived.
 - Transportation charges for contract and third-party items are waived. Any Participant requested expedited freight will be the responsibility of the Participant.

- The Participant shall have the right to return any product not excluded, per Tab 14, section 1.2.4 “Restocking policy” for a full refund within 30 days of ordering. No restocking fees apply.
- Committed to the project of stock room at Port St Lucie Campus
- FIU Procurement will receive a signing bonus of \$90,000.00





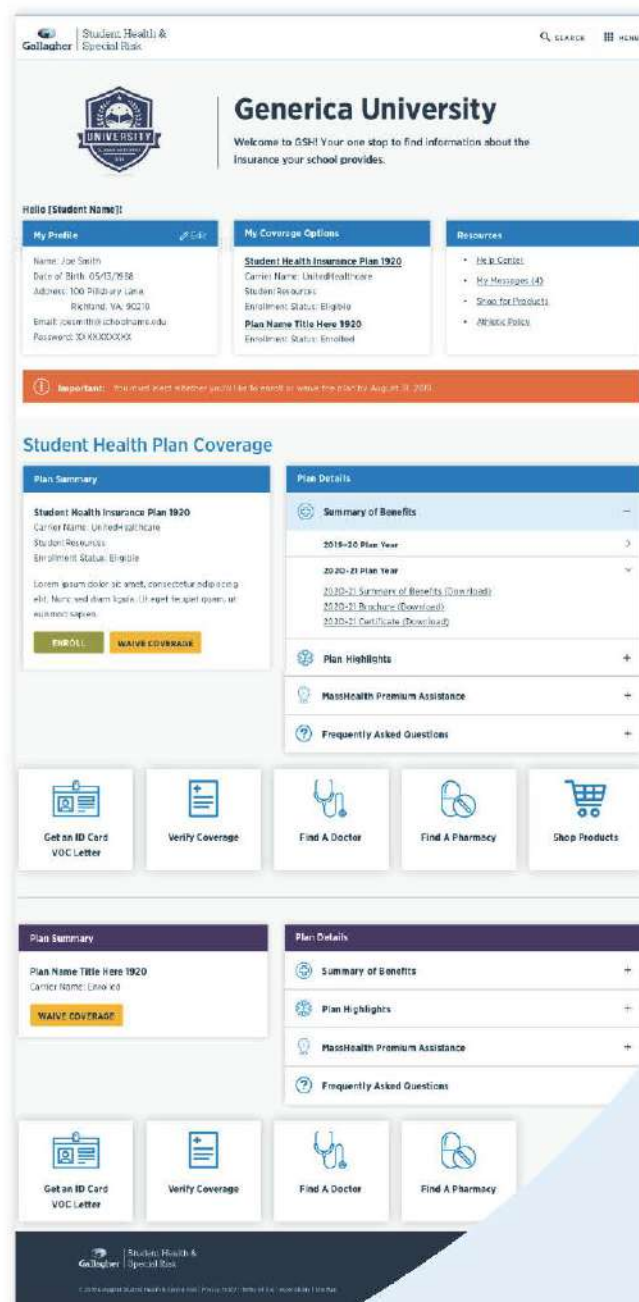

It is important that we clearly outline the nature of our mutual relationship. The following terms and conditions (these "Terms") govern your relationship with Gallagher unless you have separately entered into a written services agreement with Gallagher relative to the policies and services outlined in this Proposal, in which case that services agreement will govern and control with respect to any conflicts with these Terms. These Terms will become effective upon your execution of the Client Authorization to Bind Coverage (the "**CAB**") included in this Proposal and shall survive for the duration of your relationship with Gallagher relative to the policies placed pursuant to the CAB or otherwise at your request.

Services

Gallagher will represent and assist you in all discussions and transactions with insurance companies relating to the lines of insurance coverage set forth in the CAB and any other lines of insurance coverage with which you request Gallagher's assistance. Gallagher will consult with you regarding any matters involving these or other coverages for which you have engaged Gallagher. You have the sole discretion for approving any insurance policies placed, as well as all other material decisions involving your risk management, risk transfer and/or loss prevention needs.

Although you are responsible for notifying applicable insurance companies directly in connection with any claims, demands, suits, notices of potential claims or any other matters as required by the terms and conditions of your policies, Gallagher will assist you in determining applicable claim reporting requirements.

Treatment of Information

Gallagher understands the need to protect the confidentiality and security of your confidential and sensitive information and strives to comply with applicable data privacy and security laws. Your confidential and sensitive information will be protected by Gallagher and only used to perform services for you; provided that Gallagher may disclose and transfer your information to our affiliates, agents or vendors that have a need to know such information in connection with the provision of such services (including insurance markets, as necessary, for marketing, quoting, placing and/or servicing insurance coverages). We may also disclose such information as required by applicable data protection laws or the order of any court or tribunal, subject to our providing you with prior notice as permitted by law.

Gallagher may update its Privacy Policy from time to time and any updates will be posted to such site.

Dispute Resolution

Gallagher does not expect that it will ever have a formal dispute with any of its clients. However, in the event that one should arise, we should each strive to achieve a fair, expedient and efficient resolution and we'd like to clearly outline the resolution process.

- A. If the parties have a dispute regarding Gallagher's services or the relationship governed by this Proposal ("**Dispute**"), each party agrees to resolve that Dispute by mediation. If mediation fails to resolve the Dispute, you and Gallagher agree to binding arbitration. Each party waives all rights to commence litigation in court to resolve a Dispute, and specifically waives all rights to pursue relief by class action or mass action in court or through arbitration. However, the parties do not waive the ability to seek a court order of injunction in aid of the mediation and arbitration required by these Terms.
- B. The party asserting a Dispute must provide a written notice ("**Notice**") of the claim to the other party and to the American Arbitration Association ("**AAA**") in accordance with its Commercial Arbitration Rules and Mediation Procedures. All Dispute resolutions will take place in Chicago, IL, unless you and Gallagher agree to another location. The parties will equally divide all costs of the mediation and arbitration proceedings and will each pay their own attorneys' fees. All matters will be before a neutral, impartial and disinterested mediator or arbitrator(s) that have at least 20 years' experience in commercial and insurance coverage disputes.
- C. Mediation will occur within sixty (60) days of filing the Notice with the AAA. Mediation results will be reduced to a memorandum of understanding signed by you, Gallagher and the mediator. A Dispute that is not resolved in mediation will commence to binding arbitration. For Disputes in excess of \$500,000, either party may elect to have the Dispute heard by a panel of three (3) arbitrators. The award of the arbitrator(s) must be accompanied by a reasoned opinion prepared and signed by the arbitrator(s). Except

as may be required by law, neither you, Gallagher, nor a mediator or arbitrator may disclose the existence, content or results of any Dispute or its dispute resolution proceeding without the prior written consent of both you and Gallagher.

Electronic Delivery

In lieu of receiving documents in paper format, you agree, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to accept electronic delivery of any documents that Gallagher may be required to deliver to you (including, but not limited to, insurance policies and endorsements, account statements and all other agreements, forms and communications) in connection with services provided by Gallagher. Electronic delivery of a document to you may be made via electronic mail or by other electronic means, including posting documents to a secure website.

Miscellaneous Terms

Gallagher is engaged to perform services as an independent contractor and not as your employee or agent, and Gallagher will not be operating in a fiduciary capacity.

Where applicable, insurance coverage placements and other services may require the payment of federal excise taxes, surplus lines taxes, stamping or other fees to the Internal Revenue Service, various State(s) departments of revenue, state regulators, boards or associations. In such cases, you will be responsible for the payment of the taxes and/or fees, which Gallagher will separately identify on related invoices.

1. **Incorporation by Reference.** The Florida International University Board of Trustees ("FIU") and the undersigned ("Vendor") hereby incorporate this Supplemental Addendum - General ("Addendum") into the agreement between FIU and Vendor (the "Agreement"). If this Addendum conflicts with the Agreement terms, this Addendum shall control.

2. **Payment.** Vendor shall submit bills for compensation for goods, services and/or expenses in detail sufficient for a pre-and post-audit; invoice requirements are available on FIU's Office of the Controller's Payment Services [website](#). FIU shall make payment in accordance with [FIU-2202 – Prompt Payment](#). If FIU does not issue payment within forty (40) days of receipt of a proper invoice, FIU may pay Vendor an interest penalty at the rate established pursuant to § 55.03(1), F.S., if the interest exceeds one dollar. Vendors experiencing payment problems may contact Accounts Payable at (305) 348-3889. FIU's performance and obligation to pay is contingent upon the legislature's annual appropriation; FIU will give notice to Vendor of the non-availability of funds when FIU has knowledge thereof. FIU will be responsible for paying only for any goods/services it receives; Vendor must refund any payment for goods/services that are unused upon the termination of the Agreement. FIU is a tax immune sovereign and exempt from the payment of sales, use or excise taxes. Vendor is responsible for and shall pay any taxes due under the Agreement. FIU may require Vendor to accept payments via FIU's EFT/ACH payment process. If Vendor is making any payment to FIU, Vendor shall pay timely and not offset any amounts. FIU shall not make any deposits or prepay any amounts; any deposits are refundable.

3. **Relationship of the Parties.** Each of the parties is an independent contractor and nothing in the Agreement shall designate any of the employees or agents of one party as employees or agents of the other. Vendor represents and warrants that it is not on the Convicted Vendor List (see § 287.133, F.S.). Vendor hereby assumes all risks attributable to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of Vendor and its officers, employees, agents and subcontractors or persons otherwise acting at the instance of Vendor, in furtherance of fulfilling Vendor's obligations.

4. **Information.** Vendor acknowledges that all documents, materials and information furnished to or learned by Vendor in connection with the Agreement (the "Information") are and shall remain at all times proprietary and the sole property of FIU. Vendor shall not disclose Information to third parties unless it obtains FIU's prior written consent. All Information shall be stored in the United States or other jurisdictions approved by FIU in writing and shall not be transferred to any other countries or jurisdictions without the prior written consent of FIU. Vendor acknowledges and agrees that it is responsible for the security of all Information in its possession. Vendor represents and warrants that for the life of the Agreement and/or while Vendor is involved with Information, the software and services used for processing the Information shall be compliant with current regulatory standards. Vendor shall, upon written request, furnish proof of compliance within 10 business days of the request. Vendor will inform FIU's Chief Information Security Officer within 24 hours if it has knowledge of, or can reasonably expect that, a security breach of Information has occurred. Vendor shall provide appropriate level of detail regarding the breach including, but not limited to, start and end dates, system(s) impacted, estimated number of users impacted, and remediation plans and timeline. Vendor, upon termination of the Agreement, it shall erase, destroy, and render un-readable all FIU data from all computer systems and backups, and certify in writing that these actions have been completed within thirty (30) days of the termination of the Agreement or within seven (7) days of the request of an agent of FIU, whichever shall come first.

5. **Public Records.** FIU is subject to Chapter 119 of Florida Statutes, the Florida Public Records Law. The Agreement, this Addendum and any related documents and/or correspondence shall also become a public record subject to the Public Records Law, regardless of any confidentiality provision outlined in the Agreement. FIU may respond to public records requests without providing Vendor any notice. FIU may unilaterally cancel the Agreement for Vendor's refusal to allow public access to public records related to the Agreement. Additionally, Vendor shall comply with all applicable requirements of the Public Records Laws, particularly if Vendor is a "Contractor" as defined under § 119.0701, F.S. This provision shall survive the expiration or termination of the Agreement. **IF VENDOR HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICABILITY OF CHAPTER 119 TO VENDOR'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS, VENDOR MAY CONTACT THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT (305) 348-1377, recordsmanagement@fiu.edu, OR BY MAIL AT 11200 S.W. 8th ST., GL 460, MIAMI, FLORIDA 33199.**

6. **Indemnity.** Vendor will indemnify, defend and hold harmless FIU, the FIU Board of Trustees, the State of Florida, the Florida Board of Governors, and their officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertions of liability, losses, costs and expenses, which may arise in any

manner or are alleged to have arisen, from: (i) the acts, omissions, negligence or misconduct of Vendor or its officers, employees, agents, representatives or subcontractors in connection with or related to (a) Vendor's operations, activities, business and/or services or (b) Vendor's occupancy or use of the FIU premises; or (ii) that Vendor's products and/or services (collectively, the IP") infringes upon or violates any proprietary right of any third party. FIU will provide reasonable co-operation in the defense of the suit at Vendor's expense. Vendor's indemnification obligations shall not be limited by any limitation of liability outlined in the Agreement. Such defense and indemnity shall survive termination or expiration of the Agreement. **Nothing in the Agreement shall be construed as a waiver of sovereign immunity nor as an indemnification of Vendor by FIU, and then such indemnification is limited to the express terms of §768.28, F.S.**

7. **Compliance.** In its performance, Vendor shall, at its own expense, at all times in the term:

a. **Permits:** have all applicable permits, licenses, consents, and approvals necessary;

b. **General:** comply with all applicable federal, state, local and FIU laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances and all other governmental requirements;

c. **Privacy:** comply with all applicable state and federal laws and FIU policies and procedures governing the use and/or safe-keeping of confidential, highly sensitive, and/or personally identifiable or protected health information (as may be defined by state or federal law), including, but not limited to, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), the Gramm-Leach Bliley Act, and the Federal Trade Commission's Red Flags Rule (which implements Section 114 of the Fair and Accurate Credit Transactions Act of 2003). Vendor shall obtain, in advance, all necessary permissions and consents required in regards to its collection and/or receipt of any such information. In the event that FIU will share with or provide access to Vendor of any protected health information ("PHI"), as may be defined by state or federal law, FIU and Vendor enter into a separate business associate agreement which will govern the use of the PHI (in lieu of this provision). Vendor agrees to include all such terms and conditions contained in any subcontractor or agency contracts providing services on behalf of Vendor;

d. **Federal Funds.** If FIU has entered into an agreement with the United States of America, or any Department thereof, and the Agreement is in furtherance of the commitments and/or requirements of such federal agreement or funds, Vendor agrees to comply with the terms contained in FIU's **Federally Funded Projects Addendum**, found at <https://generalcounsel.fiu.edu/contract-forms/>, herein incorporated by this reference; and

e. **E-Verify.** All terms defined in §448.095, Fla. Stat., are adopted and incorporated into this provision. Pursuant to §448.095, Fla. Stat., Vendor certifies that it is registered with and uses the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by the Vendor during the term of this Agreement. If Vendor enters into a contract with a subcontractor to perform work or provide services pursuant to this Agreement, Vendor shall likewise require the subcontractor to comply with the requirements of §448.095, Fla. Stat., and the subcontractor shall provide to Vendor an affidavit stating that the subcontractor does not employ, contract with or subcontract with an unauthorized alien. Vendor shall maintain a copy of such affidavit for the duration of the contract. FIU may terminate this Agreement immediately upon notice to Vendor for any violation of this provision.

8. **General Provisions.**

a. **Warranties.** Vendor, at a minimum, warrants that the IP, the goods, and/or services to be provided by Vendor will be free of any material defects and will operate and conform to the specifications provided in all material aspects throughout the term of the Agreement. This warranty shall be in addition to any warranties provided in the Agreement.

b. **Publicity.** Vendor shall not make any announcements relating to the Agreement, nor shall Vendor use FIU's name, trademarks, logos or marks, without the prior written approval from FIU's External Relations department in each instance.

c. **Insurance.** FIU, as a public body corporate entity, warrants and represents that it is self-funded for liability insurance, with said protection being applicable to officers, employees, servants, and agents while acting within the scope of their employment by FIU. Any provision requiring FIU to provide or acquire insurance coverage other than such self-insurance shall not be effective. Vendor shall have and maintain the types and amounts of insurance that, at minimum, will cover Vendor's (or subcontractor's) exposure in performing the Agreement and name FIU as additional insured and be primary and non-contributory on Vendor's policies (except for workers' compensation & professional liability). All policies shall be in a form and with deductible limits reasonably satisfactory to FIU, with insurance companies reasonably approved by FIU and authorized to do business in the State of Florida. Certificates of all insurance shall be deposited with FIU prior to the

date of the Agreement. All insurance policies and certificates shall contain a provision that it will not be cancelled without giving FIU thirty (30) days' written notice prior to the effective date of cancellation. Timely renewal certificates will be provided to FIU as coverage renews. Vendor, for and on behalf of itself and each of its insurers, hereby waives any and all rights of subrogation against FIU for any loss or damage arising from any cause covered by any insurance required to be carried under the Agreement by any other insurance actually carried by Vendor. Vendor shall provide copies of any insurance policies upon request by FIU. If the professional liability coverage is provided on a claims-made basis, then such insurance shall continue for three (3) years following the expiration or termination of the Agreement. The insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement by the effective date of the Agreement. If the coverage is canceled or non-renewed and not replaced with another similar claims-made policy form, the Vendor must purchase Extended Reporting ("Tail") coverage for a minimum of three (3) years following the expiration or termination of the Agreement.

d. **Third Parties.** FIU is not liable for the acts of third parties or the consequences of the acts of third parties. There shall be no third party beneficiary to the Agreement.

e. **Governing Law.** The Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of Florida, without regards to its conflicts of law principles. Exclusive venue of any actions shall be in Miami-Dade County, Florida. FIU is entitled to the benefits of sovereign immunity.

f. **Travel Expenses.** If FIU is responsible for reimbursing Vendor for travel expenses pursuant to the Agreement, bills shall be subject to, and shall be submitted by Vendor in accordance with, § 112.061, F.S. and [FIU Policy 1110.060 – Travel: University Travel Expense Policy](#). FIU reserves the right not to pay travel expenses unless FIU approves such expenses in advance, in writing. FIU has the right to make travel arrangements for Vendor.

g. **Lobbying.** Vendor is prohibited from using funds provided under the Agreement to lobby the Legislature or any official, officer, commission, board, authority, council, committee, or department of the executive branch or the judicial branch of state government.

h. **Conflicts.** Vendor represents that it is aware of the requirements of Chapter 112, Florida Statutes and in compliance with the requirements thereof, and other laws and regulations concerning conflicts of interests in dealing with entities of the State of Florida. Vendor certifies that its directors and/or principal officers are not employed and/or affiliated with FIU unless a current Conflict of Interest (Report of Outside Activity/Employment) form has been completed, executed by such director or officer and approved in accordance with applicable University policies or rules. Violation of this section shall be grounds for termination of the Agreement.

i. **Termination.** Upon giving at least thirty (30) days' written notice to Vendor, FIU may terminate the Agreement, at any time, with no further obligation to Vendor, other than to pay for any goods received or services rendered in compliance with the Agreement prior to the effective date of termination. FIU shall not be liable for any early termination charges.

j. **Records.** Vendor agrees to keep and maintain, separate and independent records, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, devoted exclusively to its obligations and activities under the Agreement. Such records (including books, ledgers, journals, and accounts) shall contain all entries reflecting the business operations under the Agreement. FIU or its authorized agent shall have the right to audit and inspect such records from time to time during the term of the Agreement, upon reasonable notice to Vendor.

k. **PCI-DSS:** as may be applicable, deliver all services in full compliance with the most recent version of the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard (PCI-DSS) in effect at the time of service delivery. Vendor will treat all FIU provided infrastructure and resources as public and non-secure, regardless of measures FIU may choose to put in place. Vendor will also maintain all required qualifications and periodically furnish proof of ongoing compliance in the form of an Attestation of Compliance to demonstrate to FIU that Vendor is continuously operating in full compliance with PCI-DSS and is not relying on FIU for any aspect of that compliance. If Vendor loses any required certification or the certification lapses, Vendor shall immediately notify FIU, and FIU will have an option to terminate this contract and receive a refund for un-rendered services.

l. **Force Majeure.** Neither party shall be deemed to be in default of its obligations hereunder if and so long as it is prevented from performing such obligations by due to conditions beyond its reasonable control including but not limited to: an act of war, hostile foreign action, labor strike, epidemics, pandemics, quarantines, national or regional emergency, public health emergency, changes in laws and governmental policies, nuclear explosion, earthquake, hurricane, tornado, or other catastrophic natural event or act of God. Either party shall provide the other party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of

force majeure. The parties shall mutually seek a resolution of the delay or the failure to perform as noted above.

m. **Section 889 Compliance Certification.** Vendor certifies its compliance with § 889 of the McCain National Defense Authorization Act (prohibition against use of covered telecommunications equipment).

n. **Deletion.** Any term and/or condition in the Agreement on the following subject matters are hereby deleted in their entirety and declared null and void: (a) Grants of exclusivity by FIU to Vendor; (b) Restrictions on the hiring of Vendor's employees; (c) FIU's responsibility to pay intangible taxes, property taxes, or sales taxes; (d) FIU's tort liability; (e) Automatic renewals of the term of the Agreement; (f) Limitation of time to bring suit; (g) Limitation of Vendor's liability; (h) that FIU performs reporting functions and/or maintains certain types of operations (i) Granting Vendor any right to audit FIU; (j) Attorneys' or collection fees provisions; (k) Arbitration and mediation clauses; and (l) Indemnification of Vendor by FIU.

o. **Assignment.** Vendor shall not assign, transfer, delegate, subcontract, or otherwise dispose of, whether voluntarily, involuntarily, or by operation of law, any right or obligation under the Agreement without the prior written consent of FIU, not to be unreasonably withheld. Any such unapproved assignment, subcontracting or transfer is void. No subcontracting or delegation shall in any event relieve Vendor of any obligation or liability under the Agreement.

9. **No counterparts; Signatures.** The Agreement may not be executed in counterparts. It may be signed electronically and such electronic signatures shall constitute an original for all purposes. The parties represent and warrant that any person signing the Agreement has the authority to do so and that such signature shall be sufficient to bind Vendor. This Agreement shall be considered signed if/when a party's signature is delivered by facsimile or e-mail transmission of a ".pdf" format date file, including via DocuSign. Such signature via DocuSign shall be treated in all respects as having the same force and effect as an original signature.

By signing below, Vendor's authorized representative agrees to incorporate this Addendum into the Agreement, and hereby executes this Addendum as of the date set forth below.





Proposed Committee Action:

Pursuant to the Delegations of Authority from the Florida International University Board of Trustees to the University President, as reflected in the Resolution on the President's Powers and Duties approved by the Board of Trustees on March 4, 2019, (i) approve, as listed and described below, the University entering into the contracts and purchase orders and/or change orders to the purchase orders and (ii) authorize the University President or his designee to execute, on behalf of the University, the aforementioned contracts and/or purchase orders.

Background Information:

1. Purchase Orders 244246 and 244638, Google and Purchase Orders 244231 and 244633, Facebook/Instagram, also known as Meta, have been issued for the College of Business for advertising services. Purchase orders and change orders are being requested not to exceed \$1.4M per fiscal year. The purchase orders serve as the contract for Google and Facebook/Instagram. The services are exempted under Florida Board of Governors Regulation 18.001(6)(d)(11) – Advertising, except for media placement services.

The Alvah H. Chapman, Jr. Graduate School of Business (“Chapman”) offers more than 25 graduate programs, including MBAs, specialized masters, and graduate certificates. Since nearly all the programs are a mix of market-rate and self-supporting, the marketing of these programs falls under the responsibility of the College of Business (“College”) and Chapman.

Over the past years, the College has made substantial investments in building an infrastructure to attract and retain top students in its graduate programs. Significant investment has been made in developing targeted marketing campaigns across various marketing platforms to promote the graduate programs to prospective students. These platforms include Google, Facebook, Instagram, and LinkedIn. The marketing strategy for these platforms is built around each individual program, with consideration of the target audience, positioning statement, budget, and other recruitment metrics.

Despite the increase in competition and advertising costs and a decrease in access to third party data that allowed more data-driven targeting, the College has continued to achieve enrollment goals and quality of students. These results are accomplished by complementing paid ads with high-quality

organic content that helps prospective students research, compare, and decide the best graduate program for their education and career goals. Paid ads remain a crucial element of the College's marketing mix and have proven to be the primary generator of prospective students.

The Board of Trustees approved the same request for the College in fiscal years 2020-21 and 2021-22.

- **Term:** Annually
- **Cost:** Not to exceed \$1.4M annually per Supplier



WHEREAS, Licensor and University of Florida wish to establish a framework under which the institutions of the State University System of Florida ("SUS"), and the institutions of the Florida College System ("FCS"), directly or through their fiscal agent the Florida Virtual Campus ("FLVC"), as listed in Attachment 1 ("Licensees") may license certain online Products from Licensor for use by the Licensee only, without individually negotiating the respective economic and legal conditions in each case a Licensee wishes to use a Product from Licensor;

WHEREAS, Licensor is willing to provide such framework to University of Florida and the institutions of the State University System of Florida, the Florida College System, and the Independent Colleges and Universities of Florida and;

WHEREAS, University of Florida intends to provide this Master License Agreement to the Licensees and FLVC so that the Licensees and FLVC can enter into separate license agreements with Licensor.

NOW, THEREFORE, Licensor and University of Florida (the "Parties") agree as follows:

1. **Master License Agreement** – This Master License Agreement does not create any rights and obligations with respect to the Content or any right or obligation to enter into a license agreement with respect to the Content. It is within the discretion of Licensor and any potential Licensee, including FLVC acting on behalf of the Licensees in the Florida College System, to enter into a license agreement.

1.1 Any rights and obligations with respect to the Content shall be subject to license agreements between Licensor and Licensees in the form provided in Schedules A, B and C (Attachment 4), which either Licensees or FLVC will be required to sign, depending upon which entity is responsible for remittance of the License Fee to Licensor. No Licensee is responsible for any other Licensee's obligations or entitled to any other Licensee's rights under this Agreement. When executed by the relevant parties, the Individual License Agreements and FLVC License agreement shall be deemed effective for each Licensee on the earlier of: (i) the earliest Commencement Date for any Product licensed therein, and (ii) the last date of signature by the parties.

1.2 This Master License Agreement shall solely facilitate a more streamlined order procedure for the benefit of the Licensees identified in Attachment 1 Table 1-A and Table 1-B to enter into Individual License

Agreements with Licensor and for FLVC to enter a FLVC License Agreement on behalf of Licensees identified in Attachment 1-B.

2. **Termination** - The parties acknowledge that FLVC licenses the Springer journals identified in Attachment 1, Table 1-B for the use of the institutions of the Florida College System (FCS) at their request. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance to FLVC that the FCS institutions continue to value the Springer journals and support their continued availability. FLVC will monitor aggregated year-over-year usage within the FCS during the contract period and annually survey the FCS to assess their desire for FLVC to continue licensing the Springer journals. 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Attachment 2

General Terms and Conditions for Products

These General Terms and Conditions are part of and incorporated into the Master License Agreement by and between Licensors and the University of Florida and are also part of and incorporated into the Individual License Agreements for Licensees identified in Attachment 1-A and the FLVC Licensee Agreement on behalf of the Licensees identified in Attachment 1-B.

1. Definitions

1.1 **"Affiliate"** means a party controlling, controlled by, or under common control with another party, where "control", as to Licensor, means the direct or indirect ownership of at least fifty percent (50%) of the stock or other equity interest of a party and, as to Licensee, having the power to direct management and policies of a party.

1.2 **"Access Only"** means Licensee's access to Content is limited to the Term, subject always to all provisions of this Master License Agreement.

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1.4 **"Authorized Users"** means Licensee's full- and part-time faculty members, students, staff, researchers, contractors (provided that use by a contractor of Licensee is authorized solely to the extent it is for the benefit of Licensee, and not for the benefit of the contractor or any third party), regardless of their physical location but subject to applicable law and the terms of Licensee's License Agreement, and Walk-in Users.

1.5 **"Commencement Date"** means the date from which Licensee is granted access to the Content under individual Product Terms with respect to the Content identified in such Product Terms.

1.6 **"Content"** means the journals, books, archives, databases and all other materials identified in the Product Terms that are licensed to Licensee under this Master License Agreement.

1.7 **"Continuing Access"** means Licensee's ongoing access to the Content after the Term, subject always to all provisions of this Master License Agreement, excluding, however, the obligation to pay License Fees.

1.8 **"Discovery Service Systems"** are defined as user interface and search systems for discovering and displaying content from local, database and web-based sources.

1.9 **"FLVC License Agreement"** means the license agreement between the Licensor and Florida Virtual Campus (FLVC), acting on behalf of the Licensees identified in Attachment 1 Table 1-B.

1.10 **"Individual License Agreement"** means the License Agreement between the Licensor and a Licensee identified in Attachment 1 Table 1-A.

1.11 **"License Fee"** means the fees set forth in the Individual License Agreements or FLVC License Agreement. All references to Licensee Fees will be in US dollars.

1.12 **"Licensee"** means each of the parties identified as "Licensee" in the License Details.

1.13 **"Licensor"** means Springer Nature Customer Service Center, LLC, acting on its own behalf and/or on behalf of its Affiliates.

1.14 **"Platforms"** means Licensor's websites and other content delivery systems used by Licensee and Authorized Users to access Licensor's Content pursuant to this Master License Agreement.

1.15 **"Product"** means the specific category of Content identified in individual Product Terms.

1.16 **"Product Terms"** mean the terms and conditions applicable to specific categories of Content.

1.17 **Intentionally Deleted**

1.18 “**SUSHI Protocol**” means the Standardized Usage Harvesting Initiative (SUSHI) Protocol standard (ANSI/NISO Z39.93-2007) which defines an automated request and response model for the harvesting of electronic resource usage data utilizing a Web services framework.

1.19 “**Term**” means the effective period of an Individual License Agreement or FLVC License Agreement for an individual Product, as set forth in the Product Terms, including any renewal term.

1.20 “**Walk-in Users**” means individuals permitted by a Licensee to access the Content using computer terminals at sites owned or leased by the Licensee. Walk-In Users are not entitled to access the Content using remote access.

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5.2 Licensee shall promptly inform Licensor if it becomes aware of any breaches in security in Licensee's network or its accounts that may result in unauthorized access to the Content.

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6.3 The License Fee, or any portion thereof, may be invoiced by a Licensors Affiliate, or by an agent designated by Licensors in consultation with Licensee. Payment will be deemed made when received (i) by Licensors, (ii) a Licensors Affiliate, (iii) an agent designated by Licensors, or, (iv) with Licensors's prior written consent, an agent designated by Licensee.

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7.1 Either Licensors or Licensee may terminate the Individual License Agreement or FLVC License Agreement immediately upon written notice to the other party if the other party materially breaches the respective agreement and fails to cure such breach within thirty (30) days after written notice from the non-breaching party specifying the breach in reasonable detail. In the event Licensee terminates upon written notice to Licensors pursuant to this Section 7.1, Licensee shall be entitled, at its discretion, to a pro-rata credit or refund of the License Fees paid for any Product in advance, based on the number of full or partial calendar months remaining in the Term for such Product.

7.2 Either Licensors or Licensees may terminate the Individual License Agreement or FLVC License Agreement immediately upon written notice to the other party if (a) a petition in bankruptcy or for a reorganization or arrangement pursuant to the bankruptcy laws is filed by the other party, or (b) a petition in bankruptcy or for reorganization or arrangement pursuant to the bankruptcy laws is filed against the other party and such petition is not dismissed within 90 days, or (c) an order is entered directing the liquidation of the other party, or (d) the other party becomes insolvent, or (e) the other party assigns all or substantially all its assets for the benefit of creditors, or (f) the other party shall apply for, or consent to, the appointment of a receiver, trustee or liquidator for all, or a substantial part, of its assets, or (g) the other party ceases paying its debts on a regular basis, unless prohibited by applicable law.

7.3 In the event a Licensee fails to pay the License Fee for Content provided under one or more Product Terms, and fails to cure such non-payment within 30 calendar days following notice from Licensors, Licensors may, in its sole discretion, either with respect to the individual Licensee (a) immediately and without further notice suspend access to the Content licensed under such Product Terms or (b) terminate the Individual License Agreement or FLVC License Agreement pursuant to Section 7.1, either in its entirety, or solely with respect to the Content licensed under such Product Terms.

7.4 Licensors may temporarily suspend the provision of the Content to a Licensee with immediate effect on written notice, if Licensors has reasonable grounds to believe that Content is being used by Licensee in a manner contrary to the material terms of this Master License Agreement, which poses a material risk to Licensors or its licensees, without prejudice to any other rights Licensors may have at law or in equity. When Licensors is reasonably satisfied that the material risk has ended, Licensors shall resume provision of Content to Licensee as soon as reasonably possible, unless this License Agreement is earlier terminated pursuant to Section 7.1.

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9.5 Each Licensee and FLVC on behalf of the Florida College System represents and warrants that (a) it has the requisite authority to enter into this Master License Agreement on its own behalf.

9.6 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Master License Agreement, Licensee shall not be liable for an Authorized User's or unauthorized person's unauthorized use of the Content, (i) if Licensee takes reasonable measures to prevent unauthorized use or access to the Content, (ii) if Licensee takes reasonable measures to ensure that Authorized Users have knowledge of the use restrictions concerning the Content contained in this Agreement, and (iii) if Licensee does not intentionally assist in or encourage unauthorized use of the Content.

10. General

10.1 Licensor may assign its rights or delegate its obligations, or any part thereof under the Master License Agreement, or use subcontractors without the prior consent of Licensees. Licensor will require any such party to comply with Licensor's obligations under this Master License Agreement. No Licensee may assign its rights or delegate its obligations or any part thereof under this Master License Agreement without the prior written consent of Licensor. Any attempt by a Licensee to assign or delegate any rights or obligations set forth in this Master License Agreement without Licensor's prior written consent shall be null and void. Licensor remains liable for the actions of its assignees, subcontractors, and agents.

10.2 Neither party's delay or failure to perform any term or condition of this Master License Agreement as a result of conditions beyond its control, such as, but not limited to, wars, invasions, hostilities (whether war is declared or not), terrorist threats or acts, epidemics, strikes, fires, floods, earthquakes, explosions, acts of God, governmental restrictions, market manipulations, actions, orders or laws, embargos or blockades in effect on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement, national or regional emergencies, power failures, or damage or destruction of any network facilities or servers, shall be deemed a breach of this Master License Agreement or a basis for liability, provided that the nonperforming party uses commercially reasonable efforts to avoid or remove those causes of nonperformance and continues performance under this Agreement with reasonable dispatch whenever the causes are removed.

10.3 If any covenant or other provision of this Master License Agreement is invalid, illegal or incapable of being enforced, by reason of any rule of law or public policy, all other covenants and provisions shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect.

10.4 Entire Agreement; Modification: This Master License Agreement supersedes and replaces all prior agreements and understandings, whether written or oral, between the Parties concerning the subject matter hereof. This Master License Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties concerning its subject matter and cannot be modified, nor may any of its provisions be waived, except in a writing signed by both Parties. Failure or delay of either party to enforce any of its rights under this Master License Agreement is not deemed a modification or a waiver by such party of any of its rights hereunder. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Continuing Access to the Content granted to Licensee under prior agreements with Licensor and rights to Archive Content licensed to Licensee under prior agreements with Licensor shall not be modified, amended or otherwise affected by this Master License Agreement, except as expressly agreed to in writing by the Parties.

10.5 In case of a conflict or ambiguity between these General Terms and Conditions and the Product Terms, the Product Terms shall prevail. In the event this Master License Agreement is translated into a language other than English, the English-language version of this Master License Agreement shall prevail in the event of any conflict between the English-language version and the translated version.

10.6 This Master License Agreement and the rights and obligations of the Parties hereto shall be construed, interpreted and determined in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida without reference to the choice-of-laws principles of this state or any other jurisdiction and without the aid of any rule, custom or canon requiring construction or interpretation of this Master License Agreement against the draftsmen. The Parties may only bring actions relating to this License Agreement in courts of competent jurisdiction located in the county in which the Licensee's main campus is located.

10.7 Intentionally Deleted

10.8 All notices given pursuant to this Master License Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed given (a) if by hand delivery, upon receipt thereof; or (b) if internationally recognized courier service upon confirmed delivery, or (c) if by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, upon the earlier of receipt or three (3) days after posting. Notice to Licensor shall be to the then-current licensing manager at the address set forth above with a copy to Springer Nature, Licensing Control, Van Godewijckstraat 30, 3311 GX, P.O. Box 17, 3300 AA Dordrecht, The Netherlands, with a copy to Legal Department, Springer Nature, 1 New York Plaza, Suite 4600, New York, New York, 10004-1562, United States of America. Notice to Licensees identified in Attachment 1-A shall be to the addresses set forth in Table 1-A and notices to Licensees identified in Attachment 1-B shall be to FLVC except when FCS institutions license additional content independent of FLVC.

10.9 This contract is solely for Licensor's and Licensees' benefit. It is not for the benefit of any other person, except for permitted successors and assigns under this contract.

1. Term and Access Rights

- 1.1 The Term shall begin on January 1st, 2022 (the “Commencement Date”) and shall end on December 31st, 2025.
- 1.2 Continuing Access journals: During the Term, Licensee shall have access to the Continuing Access journals listed in Section 3.1 published during the Term. After the Term, Licensee shall have Continuing Access to the Continuing Access journals published during the Term and in the 12-month period immediately preceding the Term, subject to all the terms and conditions of this License Agreement.
- 1.3 Backfile Access During the Term: In addition, during the Term only, Licensee will be granted access to the Content of titles listed in Section 3.1 published beginning the later of (a) 1997 (b) the first date of publication or (c), the date on which Licensors first acquired publication rights.

2. Cessation of Publication / Transfers

- 2.1 Cessation of Publication of Continuing Access journals During the Term If Licensors cease to publish new Content for 3% or more of the Continuing Access journals during any calendar year of the Term, whether because Licensors cease to have publishing rights or because Licensors cease to publish those Continuing Access journals, upon Licensee’s written request, Licensors will, at Licensors’ sole option, offer to Licensee:
- (1) access to additional Content not presently licensed to Licensee with an approximate value equal to or greater than the value at the date of cessation of the Content associated with the discontinued Continuing Access journals that was to be published from the date of cessation of publication through the end of the Term, or
 - (2) a credit toward any future acquisition of a Product in the same value as that mentioned in part (1) above.

The value to be applied for additional Content or a credit will be determined by Licensors in good faith, taking into account factors which may include, without limitation, number of articles, number of pages, impact factor, usage factor, and list price of the Content in question, or any other formula including any or all such factors that allows Licensors to calculate the value of the lost Content as a percentage of the Continuing Access journals under the License.

- 2.2 Transfer of Publishing Rights to Continuing Access journals** If Licensors’ publishing rights to a Continuing Access journal are transferred to another publisher or entity at any time during or after the Term, Licensors will use reasonable efforts to provide Licensee with Continuing Access to the Content of that Continuing Access journal published by Licensors during the Term, either (a) online on the Platform, (b) online on the new publisher’s website, or (c) offline by providing the same on a digital storage medium. In case of (c) above, use of the Continuing Access Journal shall be subject to the terms of this License Agreement, except for Sections 4.3 and 4.4 of the General Terms and Conditions.

- 2.3 The SUS institutions identified in Attachment 1 Table 1-A have elected to license the Content set forth in these Product Terms under the “All Plus” model. In each year of the Term, the list of [Continuing Access journals] set forth in Section 3.1 below will be automatically updated to include all new start and takeover

journal titles to be published during such year. The SUS institutions will be notified of such additional journal titles in a manner reasonably determined by Licensor after the title list is updated by Licensor. For purposes of this Section 2.3, notification by email to Licensee's email address set forth in Table 1-A will be deemed sufficient.

2. Content

3. TDM License

3.1. Definitions

- 3.1.1. **"Text and Data Mining" ("TDM")** means (i) performing automated searches, selection of content, and structured analyses of content including data embodied therein, (ii) the automated sorting, parsing, addition or removal of linguistic structures, and the selection and inclusion of discrete parts of content into another form for purposes of classification or recognition of relations, patterns, and associations, and (iii) the automated extraction, alternative representation or translation, expression or discussion of any extracts from mined content, whether in the form of a direct extraction or a representation in any form.

Online Authorization Amendment to the Apple Authorized Campus Reseller Agreement

1. Background

This Amendment authorizes Campus Reseller to offer, distribute and sell certain Apple Products through its Authorized Web Locations (as defined below) for delivery to Eligible Individual Purchasers in the United States. In addition to the Agreement, the following terms apply to the marketing and sales of Apple Products via Authorized Web Locations.

2. Interpretation

Capitalized terms used and not defined in this Amendment shall have the meaning given to such terms in the Agreement.

In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Amendment and the Agreement, the terms of this Amendment will prevail.

The parties hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

3. Definitions

"Authorized App" means and is limited to Campus Reseller's iOS, Mac, or other mobile applications, localized for and directed to Eligible Individual Purchasers, on which Campus Reseller is authorized by Apple in writing to maintain an Electronic Catalog for the purpose of sale and shipment of products to Eligible Individual Purchasers for their use, subject to the terms of the Agreement and Amendment.

"Authorized Web Location" means and is limited to Campus Reseller's website and Authorized App, localized for and directed to Eligible Individual Purchasers, on which Campus Reseller is authorized by Apple in writing to maintain an Electronic Catalog for the purpose of sale and shipment of Products to Eligible Individual Purchasers for their own use, subject to the terms of the Agreement and Amendment.

"Authorized Web Products" means Apple Products that Campus Reseller is authorized to resell and specifically set forth in the attached Authorized Web Product Exhibit.

"Effective Date" means the date upon which an authorized representative of Apple signs this Amendment.

"Electronic Catalog" means an online database that is accessible by consumers via a website or application and that features high quality color images of Products along with relevant information about Products and accessories, possible configurations or options, specifications, and all other related information necessary for an Eligible Individual Purchaser to make an informed decision about the purchase of the Products, in such a manner that is equivalent to the Eligible Individual Purchaser buying experience in a brick-and-mortar retail store directed to serving walk-in Eligible Individual Purchaser traffic.

"Pickup at Store" means providing Authorized Web Products from Campus Reseller for pick up at the Campus Reseller's physical retail location by Eligible Individual Purchasers who purchased the products through the Authorized Web Locations.

"Ship to EIP" means the shipment of Authorized Web Products from Campus Reseller directly to Eligible Individual Purchasers who purchased the products through the Authorized Web Locations.

"Web Sales" means and is limited to the offering and sale of Authorized Web Products by Campus Reseller, as featured in the Electronic Catalog, to Eligible Individual Purchasers via electronic or telephone orders placed through the Authorized Web Locations, along with the fulfillment of such orders by shipping to Eligible Individual Purchasers at a designated ship-to within the United States for their use and not for resale.

4. Appointment

Apple appoints Campus Reseller as a limited and nonexclusive Apple Authorized Campus Store to conduct Web Sales of Authorized Web Products to Eligible Individual Purchasers for end use in the United States, from Authorized Web Locations, for so long as Campus Reseller continuously complies with and satisfies its obligations under this Amendment and the Agreement. For the avoidance of doubt, Campus Reseller may not engage third parties to market or solicit sales of Authorized Web Products unless expressly authorized by Apple in writing to do so.



5. Scope of Authorization

Campus Reseller will sell and ship Authorized Web Products featured in the Electronic Catalog to Eligible Individual Purchasers located only in the United States via the Authorized Web Locations, at prices determined solely by Campus Reseller. Campus Reseller is permitted to sell Authorized Web Products only to EIPs of Campus Reseller Institution and is responsible for ensuring that security measures are taken to prohibit unauthorized purchasers from purchasing Authorized Web Products from an Authorized Web Location. Apple may audit compliance with this provision at any time and failure to comply may result in termination of this Amendment. The attached Authorized Web Products Exhibit identifies the method of shipment allowed and any additional requirements unique for such Authorized Web Product. Except as expressly authorized in the Appointment, no other sales or distribution of Products or Services is authorized. Campus Reseller is expressly prohibited from promoting or selling Authorized Web Products through mobile applications or social media sites, unless otherwise expressly authorized by Apple and subject to Campus Reseller's compliance with applicable Apple policies and guidelines relating to such promotion and/or sales. Apple reserves the right to remove certain Apple Products from the Electronic Catalog and change the scope of Campus Reseller's authorization, at any time and without prior notice. If Campus Reseller fails to comply with the scope of authorization, Apple may immediately terminate this Amendment in accordance with the provisions of this Amendment.

6. Authorized Web Location Requirements

All Authorized Web Locations must:

- (i) Require faculty and student ID authentication and password validation prior to purchase of any Authorized Web Products;
- (ii) Have a mechanism in place which prevents the fulfillment of an order that exceeds the EIP quantity limitations for an academic year as follows: Desktop: Three (3). Mac mini: Three (3). Notebook: Three (3). iPad Three (3). Display: Two (2);
- (iii) Clearly display the returns process and policy for Authorized Web Products on a page where it will be viewed by all EIPs prior to completing a purchase;
- (iv) Create a virtual "in store" experience with a searchable catalog, high-quality presentation of products and fast, easy navigation;
- (v) Include a "store-within-a-store" section where only Apple Products appear and that clearly differentiates Apple Products from other brands or vendors;
- (vi) Present a full range of prominently displayed Authorized Web Products, with full color photographs, detailed and accurate product descriptions, specifications, features, and benefits using assets provided by Apple, including the iPad Online Marketing Guidelines, the iPad Channel Asset Kit and the Apple Identity Guidelines (these items available for download on ASW);
- (vii) Provide extended product information such as detailed product specifications, Apple Product comparison charts, and product reviews; and
- (viii) Have a search function designed such that when Apple trademarks are used in keyword searches only Apple Products will appear in the search results.

7. Campus Reseller's Additional Obligations

7.1 Campus Reseller must demonstrate and comply with the following obligations at all times:

- (a) Provide centralized management, with single points of contact for ordering, inventory, merchandising, advertising, returns, product service and repair, reporting and accounting;
- (b) Provide weekly Web Sales reporting separate from its brick and mortar reporting, in the formats as communicated by Apple;
- (c) Obtain Apple's prior written approval before releasing, placing, or distributing any advertisements or distributing marketing material that relates to Authorized Web Products, or includes an image of any Authorized Web Product. Campus Reseller agrees to submit all such communications and materials to Apple in time for review and approval;
- (d) Provide an annual sales and marketing plan for Campus Reseller's online business, that shall be subject to modification solely upon Apple's request, but not otherwise;
- (e) Ensure that Apple always has Campus Reseller's current email address;
- (f) Allow Eligible Individual Purchasers to order and complete the purchase transaction for Authorized Web Products from the Authorized Web Location seven days a week, twenty-four hours a day;
- (g) Maintain a product fulfillment infrastructure with back-end systems for order fulfillment via distribution center or virtual warehouse;
- (h) Maintain an electronic commerce infrastructure to satisfy Eligible Individual Purchasers support requirements including, but not limited to:
 - Ability to accept multiple payment methods;
 - Eligible individual Purchasers notifications;
 - Order and shipment status;



- Proper sales tax calculation, collection and remittance;
- Product reservations (for product not in stock);
- Purchase order processing;
- Up-sell and cross-sell capability;
- Business-class data security and network security regarding Eligible Individual Purchasers payment and contact information;
- PCI compliance;
- FTC compliance policies and practices adopted as to Campus Reseller's electronic commerce activities;
- Help and support resources for Eligible Individual Purchasers about their orders; and
- A clearly stated returns protocol that is properly staffed to manage Eligible Individual Purchasers returns.

7.2 Without limitation and throughout the Term, Campus Reseller will, at its own expense: (i) ensure that the Authorized Web Locations, along with Campus Reseller's marketing, sales and refund policies and practices, are compliant with all laws and regulations pertaining to the advertising, sale, shipment and return of goods and services to consumers; (ii) ensure that it is fully compliant with all data protection and privacy laws pertaining to any and all Eligible Individual Purchasers information collected, processed or managed on or through the Authorized Web Locations, whether in connection with Eligible Individual Purchasers transactions and returns or otherwise; (iii) ensure that Eligible Individual Purchasers have the right to elect to opt-out with respect to any non-transactional communications of any kind from Campus Reseller or its partners or in connection with their activities on or through the Authorized Web Locations; (iv) ensure that no Authorized Web Locations solicits or collects any information from children age 13 or under in a manner which is not fully compliant with any and all applicable online child protection and privacy laws, including but not limited to requirements for parental consents where applicable; (v) ensure that any promotions running on any Authorized Web Locations are fully compliant with all applicable laws, including but not limited to those pertaining to advertising, email solicitations, and rebates; (vi) ensure that all aspects of Eligible Individual Purchasers transactions occurring on or through the Authorized Web Locations, including order placement, order acknowledgment, payment processing, shipments to Eligible Individual Purchasers returns are managed in a manner that complies with all laws; (vii) not promote or sell any Authorized Web Products on the Authorized Web Locations to the extent prohibited under applicable laws and regulations; and (viii) not promote or sell any Products on the Authorized Web Locations except as expressly authorized herein. Apple will not be liable for any security breach that results in the unauthorized disclosure of Eligible Individual Purchaser information such as identification numbers, passwords, or payment information. It is the sole responsibility of Campus Reseller to ensure that proper security measures are taken by Campus Reseller, its agents and employees to prevent the disclosure of Eligible Individual Purchaser information to any unauthorized third party. Apple will determine in its sole discretion whether Campus Reseller's noncompliance with any provision of the Agreement and Amendment will result in forfeiture or suspension of any available promotional allowances or funding from Apple.

7.3 Campus Reseller acknowledges that Apple has established policies with respect to online "marketplaces". Campus Reseller may not permit third parties to offer Products for sale through the Authorized Web Location unless expressly authorized by Apple in writing to do so. In addition, Campus Reseller may not offer Authorized Web Products for sale on marketplaces operated by third parties, unless expressly authorized by Apple in writing to do so.

7.4 Campus Reseller will assume full responsibility for and maintain compliance with all applicable laws and regulations regarding shipping and delivery practices for consumer online purchases. Campus Reseller agrees to ship product only to locations in the United States. Campus Reseller will provide Eligible Individual Purchasers with estimated shipping and delivery dates prior to the Eligible Individual Purchaser's confirmation of their order from Campus Reseller. Immediately upon the sale of Authorized Web Product to an Eligible Individual Purchaser, Campus Reseller will provide the Eligible Individual Purchaser with an online order acknowledgment identifying, at a minimum the Eligible Individual Purchaser's name, the ship-to address, itemized detail about the Products being purchased including quantity, per unit price, applicable sales tax on the order, environmental fees, recycling fees, shipping and handling charges, the total cost of the order and any other special terms. In addition, Campus Reseller will provide each Eligible Individual Purchaser with a shipping notification when their order has shipped to their designated ship-to address, along with tracking information that the Eligible Individual Purchaser may use to track the status of their shipment.

7.5 Campus Reseller will maintain online help pages at the Authorized Web Location which must include Eligible Individual Purchasers support telephone numbers, and online chat and/or email addresses, and Campus Reseller will make such information available to Eligible Individual Purchaser on their order acknowledgment and shipment notifications. Campus Reseller will promptly process all Eligible Individual Purchaser returns and do so in a manner that is in accordance with applicable law and Campus Reseller's own stated return policies. Campus Reseller will ensure that its stated return policies are available and visible to Eligible Individual Purchasers at the Authorized Web Locations and, preferably, prior to a Eligible Individual Purchaser's purchase of any Authorized Web Products. If Campus Reseller does not ordinarily include serial numbers on online order acknowledgments provided to Eligible Individual Purchasers, then Campus Reseller agrees that it will use commercially reasonable efforts to enable the inclusion of serial numbers on online order acknowledgments or shipping notifications provided to Eligible Individual Purchasers, if applicable system is updated at any time during the Term.

7.6 Campus Reseller must notify Apple at least thirty (30) days in advance of any of the following changes, subject to Apple's prior written approval: (i) changing the universal resource locator web (URL) of any Authorized Web Location or redirecting any Authorized Web Location to a web URL other than the one originally approved by Apple; (ii) closing or deactivating an Authorized Web Location; or (iii) adding a new Authorized Web Location.



7.7 Campus Reseller will comply with applicable Apple policies and marketing guidelines relating to Web Sales at all times, including but not limited to, any Apple digital asset kit(s) currently available on ASW.

8. Product Distribution and Allocation

Campus Reseller's Appointment is made at Apple's sole discretion and is made on a non-exclusive basis. Apple is free to establish new domain names, keyword searches and additional websites, web-based (whether electronic commerce or mobile commerce) stores and apps, without notice to Campus Reseller.

9. Term and Termination

9.1 The term of this Amendment will begin on the Effective Date and continue until the Agreement expires or is terminated.

9.2 This Amendment or any Authorized Web Location may be terminated by either Party at any time without cause (i.e., for any or no reason), on thirty (30) days' written notice to the other Party.

9.3 Apple may terminate this Amendment or any Authorized Web Location immediately without any period to remedy if (i) Campus Reseller fails to fully perform any obligation under the Agreement or this Amendment; or (ii) Campus Reseller closes down or deactivates all Authorized Web Locations.

10. Variation

Apple shall be entitled in its absolute discretion to make variations and amendments to this Amendment without notice to Campus Reseller, and such variations or amendments will be immediately binding on Campus Reseller upon Apple's posting of any varied or amended version(s) on ASW or otherwise communicating such varied or amended version(s) in writing.







INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT – General

Contractor: AGENCY 21 CONSULTING, LLC (also known throughout this Agreement as "A21" or "Agency 21")
 Address: 1428 Brickell Avenue, Suite 303, Miami, Florida 33131

This Independent Contractor Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into by and between Contractor and The Florida International University Board of Trustees, a charitable governmental unit qualifying for Federal tax exemption pursuant to Internal Revenue Code ("I.R.C.") section 115(1) ("FIU") as administrator and co-producer of the Food Network & Cooking Channel South Beach Wine & Food Festival presented by Capital One (collectively, the "Festival").

WHEREAS, Contractor has offered to provide the Services (defined below) with respect to the 2021 - 2023 Festivals, to be held on February 25 – 28, 2021, February 24-27, 2022 and February 23 – 26, 2023;

WHEREAS, the parties hereto desire to reduce the terms of their agreement to writing.

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties hereby do mutually agree as follows:

1. **Recitals.** The above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by this reference.
2. **Services.** Contractor agrees to perform and provide to the Festival the services described in the document attached hereto as **Exhibit "A"** (the "Services"), hereby incorporated into the Agreement by this reference.
3. **Benefits.** In consideration of providing the Services, Contractor shall receive those Festival benefits outlined in the document attached hereto as **Exhibit "B"** (collectively, the "Benefits"), hereby incorporated into the Agreement by this reference.
4. **Key Personnel.** Contractor's individual designated as key personnel for the purposes of this Agreement is **Brett Friedman** ("Key Personnel"). Contractor shall not substitute Key Personnel assigned to the performance of the Services without prior written approval by the Festival. Festival Key Personnel shall be defined as Lee Brian Schrager, Kristen Sofge and Ashley Shapiro.
5. **Term.** The Agreement shall be effective as of the Effective Date (defined below) and shall continue unless otherwise terminated or provided pursuant to the terms hereof, through April 30, 2023 (the "Term").
6. **Fee for Services.** As full compensation for the Services to be provided by Contractor hereunder, the Festival agrees to pay Contractor a total fee of the agreed upon amounts below (the "Fee"), subject to the terms of paragraph 8 (Payment Terms) below.

(a) Revenue.

- i. Fifteen percent (15%) of the sponsorship revenue (in the form of cash) received by FIU from all A21 Sponsors (as further defined in Exhibit A) secured and managed by Agency 21.
- ii. Ten percent (10%) of the wholesale value of sponsorship revenue consisting of in-kind products or services that are budget-cost-relieving and approved of by the Festival in advance received by FIU from all A21 Sponsors secured and managed by Agency 21.

The parties agree that Contractor is entitled to the Fee for in-kind products or services (as provided in Section 6(a)(ii) of the Agreement) only if Contractor additionally submits detailed records regarding such in-kind products or services, such as, for example, a bill of lading, a delivery slip or other evidence of shipment so long as the documentation displays quantities, unit prices and price extensions, or any other reasonable documentation from sponsor which confirms the value of the donated items that were shipped to the Festival, as requested by the Festival."

- iii. Ten percent (10%) of the total sponsorship revenue (in the form of cash and budget-cost-relieving in-kind) for those Festival sponsors not solicited by Agency 21 but for whom FIU and Festival management assign to Agency 21 for fulfillment management of sponsor's executed contract. Budget-cost-relieving in-kind shall be defined as items that directly relieve a line item in the operating budget.
- iv. Fifteen percent (15%) of the exhibitor revenue received by FIU from all A21 Exhibitors secured and managed by Agency 21.
- v. Fifteen percent (15%) of the cash sponsorship revenue received by FIU from all A21 Sponsors secured and managed by Agency 21 for Festival Special Projects or Fund-Raising Efforts.
 - i. Ten percent (10%) of the cash revenue received by FIU from all A21 sponsors or entities secured and managed by Agency 21 for buyouts of specific sessions related to Festival Special Projects or Fund-Raising Efforts.
- (b) Ticket Sales. Commissions may only be paid on ticket deals from A21 Confirmed Partners which are at or above the full ticket value. Fifteen percent (15%) of any premium received by FIU above the ticket price on ticket deals from all A21 Confirmed Partners. Any straight ticket purchases that do not include premiums shall be commissioned at ten percent (10%) of ticket value (less processing and handling fees) and will be approved on a case-by-case basis and shall be subject to additional restrictions. Festival must approve in advance of any ticket package being offered to any Prospects (as defined in Exhibit A). Such restrictions may include, but not be limited to the following:
 - i. Ticket purchases shall be considered to be bulk with a quantity greater than 50 and shall only be approved at events that are deemed to be slow moving or hard to sell. Festival shall grant approval or disapproval on a case by case basis. Full price ticket purchases in this category shall be commissioned at a 15% rate. Discounted ticket purchases in this category shall be commissioned at a 10% rate.
 - ii. Any seated events or dinner buyouts must have a premium attached and must be pre-approved of in advance by the Festival before being offered to any Prospects.
 - iii. Any ticket orders submitted to the Festival by a confirmed sponsor are excluded from any commission.
- (c) Retainer. In addition to the performance based fees outlined above, FIU shall also pay Agency 21 a monthly sales retainer fee of two thousand eight hundred eighty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$2,887.50) on the 15th day of each month over the 36-month period (beginning in May 2020 and ending April 30, 2023) for a total retainer fee of one hundred three thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars \$103,950).
- (d) Advance. Agency 21 will also be advanced a \$1,500 monthly draw against commission beginning in May 2020 and ending in March 2023.
- (e) Ticket Credit. Agency 21 will be provided with a \$600 ticket credit for events that are listed on the committee ticket order form. Agency 21 will be provided with a 10% discount on orders for events that are not included on the committee ticket order form. Once tickets are purchased by Agency 21, there shall be no returns made without exception.

Festival shall provide Agency 21 staff with four (4) double occupancy staff rooms for three (3) nights each in a Festival-selected hotel. Best efforts shall be made to provide these accommodations in the Festival Host Hotel, Loews Miami Beach.

7. Reimbursement. From time to time, the Festival may direct or require Contractor to undertake certain expenses not contemplated within the Fee set forth above. In such circumstances, the Festival shall reimburse Contractor for all business expenses pre-approved in writing by the Festival and actually paid or incurred by Contractor in the course of performing the Services. Contractor shall account for and submit reasonable supporting documentation (along with proof of the pre-approval) to the Festival in relation to any expense reimbursement hereunder and shall be reimbursed in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, specifically including paragraph 8 (Payment Terms).

8. Payment Terms. Contractor agrees to submit invoices made out to "Florida International University" in accordance with Minimum Invoice Requirements as posted on FIU's website at http://finance.fiu.edu/controller/QL_AccountsP.html, in detail sufficient for a proper pre-and post-audit. Upon receipt of a proper invoice, the Festival will make payment in accordance with FIU Regulation FIU-2202, entitled "Prompt Payment." If the Festival does not issue payment within forty (40) days of receipt of the proper invoice, the Festival may pay to Contractor an interest penalty at the rate established pursuant to §55.03(1) Fla. Stat. if the interest exceeds one dollar (\$1.00). Contractor is responsible for any taxes due under this Agreement. Contractors experiencing payment problems may contact the Ombudsman at (305) 627-1266.

Commission payments to Agency 21 (net of the \$18,000 annual value of the \$1,500 monthly advance provided in Section 6(d) above) shall be payable within forty (40) days of receipt of the sponsorship revenue by FIU (or receipt of appropriate documentation as to the wholesale value of any cost-relieving in-kind contributions for which Agency 21 is entitled to receive a commission), along with receipt of an invoice from Agency 21.

9. Termination. This Agreement may be terminated for any reason by either party at any time, upon ten (10) days written notice to the other party, however Contractor shall only be permitted to terminate provided such notice is received by the Festival prior to **Friday, December 15, 2020**. Notwithstanding else contained herein, this Agreement may immediately be terminated by either party for Cause. For purposes of this Agreement, "Cause" is defined as a material failure to perform the Services as specified herein or failure to adhere to any material terms of this Agreement. If this Agreement is terminated, the Festival shall only be liable for payment of goods received and services rendered and accepted by the Festival prior to the date of termination.

10. Force Majeure. Neither party shall be liable or responsible to the other, nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Agreement, for any delays, suspensions, damages, or failure to fulfill or perform any of the terms or obligations under this Agreement when and to the extent such failure or delay is caused by or results from the force majeure events, as defined herein ("Force Majeure Events"). Force Majeure Events shall mean any circumstance or event beyond the reasonable control of the party unable to perform and which could not have been prevented or avoided by the exercise of due diligence, prudence, or the adoption of reasonable precautions, such as, including but not limited to: (a) acts of God; (b) flood, fire, earthquake or explosion; (c) war, invasion, hostilities (whether war is declared or not), terrorist threats or acts, riot or other civil unrest; (d) any federal, state or local government law, order, or regulation, order of any court or jurisdiction, (e) actions, embargoes or blockades in effect on or after the date of this Agreement; (f) action by any governmental authority; (g) national or regional emergency; (h) strikes, labor stoppages or slowdowns or other industrial disturbances; and (i) public health emergencies, including, but not limited to, as a result of epidemics and pandemics; and (j) other events beyond the reasonable control of the party impacted by the Force Majeure Event (the "Impacted Party"). The Impacted Party shall give a written notice of such Force Majeure Event to the other party. The Impacted Party shall use diligent efforts to end the failure or delay and ensure the effects of such Force Majeure Event are minimized. The Impacted Party shall resume the performance of its obligations as soon as reasonably practicable after the removal of the cause. In the event that the Impacted Party's failure or delay remains uncured after Force Majeure Event has ended or cannot be cured for a period of ten (10) days following written notice given by it under this Section 10, either party may thereafter terminate this Agreement upon written notice to the other party. If this Agreement is terminated by the Festival or the Services are cancelled by the Festival pursuant to this provision, the Festival shall reimburse Contractor for all pre-approved out of pocket expenses actually incurred by Contractor in preparation for performing the Services, if any.

11. Compliance with Laws. Contractor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, codes, rules, regulations, and licensing requirements that are applicable to the conduct of its business, including those of Federal, State, and local agencies having jurisdiction and/or authority over it. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that Contractor has and will at all times during the Term maintain all applicable governmental permits, licenses, consents, and approvals necessary to perform its obligations under this Agreement.

12. Ownership of Work Product. All right, title and interest in and to any invention, work product, idea or creation conceived, developed or produced during the performance of services under this Agreement (including but not limited to creative, copy, scripts, story boards, writing, copyrights, trademarks, art, music, software and documentation, business systems or ideas, and research projects) shall be property of the Festival whether created individually by the Contractor or jointly with the Festival.

13. Festival's Right to Inspect. The work contemplated herein must meet the Festival's standards and approval and shall be subject to the Festival's general right of inspection to secure the satisfactory completion thereof.

14. Insurance. Contractor shall provide and keep in full force and effect during the term of Contract, at the Contractor's own cost and expense, the following insurance policies for the joint benefit of the Contractor and the Festival: (i) Commercial General Liability which includes coverage for bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, and contractual liability in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate. (ii) Workers Compensation – Coverage shall be maintained in an amount equal to or greater than the statutory limits required by the laws of the State of Florida. If applicable to the type of service being provided; (iii) Liquor Liability in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Contractor shall deliver to the Festival true and correct certificates of such insurance upon the Festival's request. The certificates shall indicate that the Commercial General Liability policy carries an endorsement (no more restrictive than CG 20 10) which names ***The Florida International University Board of Trustees, Florida International University, the State of Florida, The Florida Board of Governors, and their respective trustees, directors, officers, employees and agents, as additional insureds.*** The Contractor may carry, at his own expense, such additional insurance, as Contractor deems necessary. All insurance coverages shall be written through a reputable and responsible company licensed to do business in the State of Florida and acceptable to the Festival. The Contractor's policy shall be primary and any insurance carried by the Festival shall be noncontributing with respect thereto. The Certificate of Insurance shall contain a statement that the policies will not be modified or canceled without thirty (30) days advance written notice to the Festival.

Contractor shall do nothing that will adversely affect the Festival, in any way, including increasing risks, insurance premiums or liability. In addition to the insurance required to be obtained and maintained by the Contractor, if the Contractor assigns any portion of the duties under the Contract in accordance with the terms thereof, each subcontractor or assignee is required to purchase and maintain insurance coverage that adequately covers each subcontractor's or assignee's exposure based on the type of services they are providing in connection with this Contract. The Festival reserves the right to terminate this Agreement if Contractor fails to supply and/or maintain the required coverage. Contractor's procuring of the required insurance shall not relieve the Contractor of any obligation or liability assumed under the Contract, including specifically the indemnity obligations. The Festival recommends that the Contractor obtain and maintain a policy of business interruption insurance. The Contractor shall assist and cooperate in every manner possible in connection with the adjustment of all claims arising out of Contractor's operations within the scope provided for under the Contract, and shall cooperate in all litigated claims and demands, arising from said operations, which its insurance carrier or carriers are requested to respond.

15. Relationship of the Parties. Contractor's relationship to the Festival shall be and at all times shall remain that of an independent contractor. The parties hereby agree and stipulate that no language or provision in this Agreement or course of conduct between the parties will be interpreted, construed, or given the effect of creating any relationship other than that of independent contractor. In accordance with Contractor's status as an independent contractor, Contractor will not be entitled to benefit from or participate in any of the Festival's employment benefits, insurance programs, fringe benefits, worker's compensation insurance, retirement plans, or any other employee benefit plan. Contractor shall be solely responsible for reporting or paying any employment taxes, income taxes, or other similar obligations as may be required by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service or any other similar state, local or federal agency. Contractor warrants and represents that it is not on the convicted vendor list (see Fla. Stat., 287.133(2)(a)).

16. Prohibitions. Unless expressly and specifically authorized in writing by the Festival in advance, Contractor shall be prohibited from engaging in any of the following:

- (a) Incurring any debt or obligation on behalf of the Festival;
- (b) Entering into any contract, arrangement, or transaction which binds the Festival to any extent or creates any obligation on the Festival; and/or
- (c) Utilizing the Festival's name, credit, reputation, goodwill, resources, and/or assets for any purpose without prior and explicit written approval of the Festival.

17. Indemnification. Contractor and its officers, employees and agents, jointly and severally agree to release, indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Festival, FIU, the FIU Board of Trustees, the Florida Board of Governors, the State of Florida and their respective trustees, officers, employees and agents of and from any and all liability, fines, royalties, fees, taxes, suits, claims, demands and actions, costs, attorney's fees and expenses of any kind or nature whatsoever for any loss of life, personal, bodily or economic injury or damage or loss to property which may be sustained by reason of, based upon, or in any way arising out of the performance of the Services or any other obligations of Contractor set forth in this Agreement, and from and against any orders, judgments or decrees which may be entered pursuant thereto arising from Contractor's negligence or willful misconduct. This obligation shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

18. Confidentiality & Non-Compete. Contractor agrees that, during the term of this Agreement and thereafter, it shall not, directly or indirectly, disclose to anyone outside of the Festival any trade secrets, proprietary information of the Festival, or other data or information not generally known outside of the Festival, whether prepared or developed by or for the Festival or received by the Festival from any outside source, including but not limited to any existing and prospective sponsor files or information, customer lists, marketing/media plans, event/site layout and design plans, invoices and vendor contracts. Contractor shall not directly contract with or invoice any existing client, sponsor or vendor of the Festival for any Festival-related services without express written permission and full disclosure by and to the Festival. Additionally, Contractor shall not sell sponsorships on behalf of any other competing wine, spirits and/or food festivals, unless approved in advance by the Festival Director.

19. Loss/Theft. Contractor is solely responsible for the security of all goods, property, equipment, materials, product or any other items that it or its contractors, agents, or other representatives bring to the Festival. The Festival shall have no obligation or liability whatsoever for any loss, misplacement or theft of Contractor's property unless such loss, misplacement or theft directly arises from the Festival's willful misconduct.

20. Intellectual Property. If applicable, Contractor represents and warrants that any intellectual property furnished by Contractor to the Festival will not infringe upon or violate any patent, copyright, trademark, trade secret, or any other proprietary right of any third party. Contractor will, at its sole expense, defend any suit brought against the Festival and will indemnify the Festival pursuant to the terms of this Agreement against an award of damages and costs made against the Festival by settlement or final judgment of a court that is based on a claim that Contractor's product(s) and/or service(s), as applicable, infringe the intellectual property right of a third party. The Festival will provide reasonable cooperation in the defense of the suit at Contractor's expense. These defense and indemnity obligations shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of the Agreement.

21. Notices. Any notices to be made under this Agreement shall be in writing and sufficient if mailed or e-mailed to the address indicated below. Notice shall be effective upon receipt.

22. Miscellaneous.

(a) **Public Records.** The Festival is subject to applicable public records laws as provided by Chapter 119 of the Florida Statutes, and the Festival will respond to such public records requests as required by the law. This provision shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

(b) **General.** Nothing in the Agreement shall be construed as a waiver of sovereign immunity beyond that provided in § 768.28, Florida Statutes. Each party hereby assumes any and all risk of personal injury and property damage attributable to the negligent acts or omissions of that party and the officers, employees, and agents thereof. Contractor also assumes such risk with respect to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of Contractor's subcontractors or persons otherwise acting or engaged to act at the instance of Contractor in furtherance of Contractor fulfilling Contractor's obligations under the Agreement.

(c) **Conflicts of Interest.** Contractor represents that Contractor is not an employee of FIU or the State of Florida. Additionally, Contractor represents that no member of Contractor's immediate family are employees of FIU or the Festival.

(d) **No Third Party Rights.** This Agreement does not and is not intended to confer any rights or remedies to any party other than the parties to this Agreement. Contractor acknowledges that no branding or benefits relating to the Festival shall be made available to any entity other than Contractor, except upon the Festival's advance written approval.

(e) Travel. If applicable, and the Festival is specifically responsible for reimbursing Contractor for travel expenses, such expenses shall only be paid to the extent permitted by Florida Statutes §112.061 and FIU Policy 1110.060 – "Travel: University Travel Expense," and then only when substantiated by receipts and submitted on the proper forms.

(f) Drafting. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against any party on the basis that such party was the draftsman of such provision, and no presumption or burden of proof shall arise favoring or disfavoring any party by virtue of the authorship of any provision of this Agreement.

(g) Binding Effect/Amendments/Assignment/Waiver. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective permitted successors and assigns and may be amended only by written amendments duly executed by the parties hereto. This Agreement may not be assigned (whether by operation of law or otherwise) by any party to any person without the prior written consent of the other party. The waiver by either party of a breach of a violation of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate as or be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach thereof.

(h) Severability. In the event that any provision contained in this Agreement or the application thereto to any circumstance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be ineffective to the minimum extent of such invalidity or unenforceability and the remainder of this Agreement will remain valid and enforceable according to its terms with respect to all other circumstances.

(i) Governing Law. This Agreement shall be construed, interpreted, enforced and governed by and under the laws of State of Florida. Exclusive jurisdiction and venue of any actions arising out of, or relating to or in any way connected with this Agreement shall be in Miami-Dade County, Florida.

(j) No Counterparts/Facsimile Signatures. This Agreement may not be executed in counterparts. The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that this Agreement may be signed electronically and that such electronic signatures shall be deemed an original for all purposes. The parties represent and warrant that any person signing this Agreement electronically or causing this Agreement to be signed electronically has the authority to do so and that such electronic signature shall be sufficient to bind the respective party under this Agreement. This Agreement shall be considered signed when a party's signature is delivered by facsimile or e-mail transmission of a ".pdf" format data file via DocuSign. Such signature via DocuSign shall be treated in all respects as having the same force and effect as an original signature.

(k) Authority. Contractor represents and warrants that the Agreement has been duly authorized, executed and delivered by and on behalf of the Contractor and constitutes the valid, binding and enforceable agreement in accordance with the terms hereof. If the Agreement is signed by the Contractor's representative or agent, such representative or agent represents and warrants that: (1) it is duly authorized to act for and on behalf of the Contractor, (2) that it is authorized to enter into the Agreement, and (3) that it shall be jointly and severally liable for any breach of the Agreement.

(l) Entire Agreement. This Agreement, along with any and all exhibits and appendices attached hereto, sets forth the entire understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements, arrangements, and communications, whether oral or written, with respect to the subject matter hereof. No other agreements, representations, warranties or other matters, whether written or oral, shall be deemed to bind the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. Contractor acknowledges that it is entering into this Agreement solely on the basis of the agreements and representations contained herein.

Exhibit "A"
Services

I. Agency 21 will be known as "Exclusive External Sponsorship Agency of the Food Network & Cooking Channel South Beach Wine & Food Festival." As the Exclusive External Sponsorship Agency, A21 will be promoted and listed on the Festival's official website as the Festival's external sponsor agency of record, along with contact information for A21's Key Personnel. Agency 21 personnel will refer to themselves as employees of Agency 21, Exclusive External Sponsorship Agency of the Food Network & Cooking Channel South Beach Wine & Food Festival. In addition, for the duration of this Agreement, Brett Friedman will be given the title of Director of Sales, Food Network South Beach Wine & Food Festival.

II. Agency 21 agrees to perform the following Services:

i. Agency 21 shall serve as the exclusive external sponsorship agency for the Food Network & Cooking Channel South Beach Wine & Food Festival for years 2021 - 2023. As such, Festival will not retain any other external sponsorship agency to sell sponsorships for its events, and Agency 21 shall not sell sponsorships on behalf of any other competing wine, spirits and/or food festivals, unless approved in advance by the Festival Director.

ii. The South Beach Wine & Food Festival and Florida International University shall refer, at its discretion all relevant, independent prospective corporate leads to Agency 21 and Agency 21 will solicit specific prospective sponsors as requested by FIU and Festival management. Prospective leads/sponsors may be referred to herein as "Prospects." The Festival retains the right to explore prospective leads with Festival Key Personnel at its sole discretion.

iii. Agency 21 will also solicit prospective sponsors (on its own) for the Festivals, subject to FIU's prior written approval of such sponsors.

iv. Unless otherwise specified by the Festival, Southern Glazers Wine & Spirits ("SGWS") suppliers and sponsors that come through the Food Network, People Magazine, Food Network Magazine, Wine Spectator Magazine, and directly contacted by Lee Brian Schrager (at his discretion) etc., will continue to be managed by Festival staff directly. However, if any confirmed corporate sponsor of the Festival expresses an interest, in writing or verbally, of working directly with Festival staff and not Agency 21; then, that sponsor will have the right to work with Festival staff directly.

v. Agency 21 will manage the fulfillment of the Sponsors solicited and negotiated by Agency 21 on behalf of the Festival and Florida International University. Agency 21 agrees to communicate and secure the cooperation of all A21 Sponsors to meet all Festival-established and contracted deadlines for information, materials, payments and other deliverables of all aspects of activation of A21 Sponsor relationships

vi. Upon request of Festival management, Agency 21 will assist FIU in servicing and maintaining FIU's relationship with pre-existing sponsors for the Festivals.

vii. Agency 21 shall actively promote and develop new relationships and opportunities for the Festival and FIU.

III. Agency 21 will be responsible for pitching renewals for all Agency 21-managed prospects from the 2020 Festival, and securing commitments for the 2021-2023 Festivals. Agency 21 will also be responsible for pitching new prospects (including those identified by Agency 21 as well as those referred to Agency 21 by the Festival) and securing sponsorship sales for the 2021- 2023 Festivals. Agency 21 will take point on negotiating deal points, including fee pricing, for all Agency 21-managed prospects from the 2020 Festival as well as all potential new sponsors (collectively, the "A21 Prospects") for the Festival within the guidelines and approvals procedure established by the Festival's Key Personnel. **All deal points shall be subject to the approval of the Festival Key Personnel. Festival Key Personnel welcomes the ideas and creative input of Agency 21 personnel in reviewing proposed deal points on a case-by-case basis.**

IV. The following procedures shall apply to all A21 Prospects:

a. Agency 21 will establish sales calls with renewable and new prospects and shall extend invitations to and include the Festival Key Personnel on all calls and live in person meetings **without exception**. Agency 21 shall provide appropriate advance notice of all calls and meetings to permit the participation of Festival Key Personnel.

b. Agency 21 will draft formal written proposals (from templates provided by the Festival) outlining Festival benefits and commitments, customized to each individual sponsor's interests. **Before formally submitting proposals to any potential prospect, Agency 21 shall submit all proposals to designated Festival Key Personnel for review and approval, and Festival personnel shall respond with requests for changes and/or approval within 48 business hours.** It is agreed that opportunities are extended on a first-come first served basis, and that the Festival shall be under no obligation to honor a proposed deal if another competing sponsor is willing to commit to the same deal points and the Festival, in its discretion,

determines that it is in its best interests to proceed with any one sponsor over another. Festival shall have final approval as to all sponsorship-related decisions.

c. Once Prospects confirm participation, Festival Key Personnel will be responsible for negotiating formal contracts between Prospect and FIU to execution, and Agency 21 agrees to participate and review contract drafts during the process of negotiation. Agency 21 and/or its Key Personnel shall provide feedback for all draft contracts within 48 hours of receipt of draft from Festival Key Personnel. Agency 21 will assist in securing A21 Prospects' signatures on final contract in a timely fashion. When a contract has been finalized, that Prospect shall then be considered an "A21 Sponsor" or "A21 Exhibitor," as appropriate, as well as, collectively, a "Confirmed Partner."

V. Agency 21 agrees that the Festival shall have no obligation whatsoever to extend any benefits to any A21 Prospects until a fully executed contract for the Festival is in place.

VI. Agency 21 agrees that no third-party entity may be leveraged to underwrite A21 Prospect's sponsorship fees or to share in any of A21 Prospect's benefits without the prior written consent of Festival.

VII. Agency 21 agrees to regularly meet with and engage in regular conference calls with Festival Key Personnel to discuss and review strategic direction and status updates of all A21 Prospects and secured A21 Sponsors for the Festival. If requested by FIU, Agency 21 shall meet with designated individuals at Festival headquarters from time-to-time. Agency 21 shall submit bi-weekly tracking grids to Festival key personnel of the status of all pitches to A21 Prospects. This tracking grid shall include all pertinent information relating to the A21 Prospect including but not limited to status, contact info, dollars pitched, level of participation, key activation elements and proposed inclusion at Festival events. A21 shall submit the first of these grids beginning on **August 1, 2020** and every two weeks thereafter.

VIII. Agency 21 and Agency 21 personnel working on the Festival will be required to submit short, email recaps after all activation calls with sponsors to Key Festival Personnel. FIU shall withhold final payment to Contractor pending timely submission of recaps in a form and content acceptable to the Festival.

IX. Agency 21 agrees to work closely with any other appropriate Festival personnel or third party or agency engaged by FIU to assist with the 2021 to 2023 Festivals, including, without limitation, Event Managers, Exhibitor Coordinators, Public Relations Consultants, Media Managers, Logistics suppliers, Inventory Managers or any and all such personnel involved in the coordination and management of any Festival deliverables.

X. Agency 21 will work closely with A21 Sponsors to encourage A21 Sponsors to use their own corporate resources to actively promote their participation with the Festival (such as direct consumer promotions), and to track and monitor to the best of Agency 21's ability the amount of media impressions generated for the Festival through A21 Sponsor corporate media resources, for reporting to the relevant Festival personnel.

XI. Agency 21 agrees to use all resources at its disposal to assist A21 Sponsors in securing outside vendors that will provide quality services at competitive pricing for Sponsors' various activation needs, giving first preference to FIU/Festival Preferred Vendors for catering, décor, hotel/travel services and rentals.

XII. Agency 21 agrees to be available on-site and/or have representative personnel, upon request of A21 Sponsors and/or Festival Key Personnel, at every Festival event where A21 Sponsors will be activating, from set-up, load-in, event, and break-down/load out phases, to monitor and ensure a successful and high-quality activation of A21 Sponsor experiences.

XIII. Agency 21 will document the A21 Sponsors' activation throughout the Festival days.

XIV. Agency 21 will make all reasonable efforts to coordinate and work with FIU staff to assist and ensure that sponsorship wrap-up packages and official Festival photographs for A21 Sponsors are created and disseminated with superior quality and in a timely fashion, within 30 days of the wrap up of the event.

XV. Agency 21 shall make all reasonable efforts to organize, schedule, and participate in a formal thank-you wrap up call with A21 Sponsors within 45 days of the completion of the Festival. Festival Key Personnel must be invited to and included on all Agency 21 recap calls without exception.

XVI. Agency 21 will make all reasonable efforts to perform any other duties as may be requested by the Festival Director, and/or perform any other work, as directed by Festival staff, that may be ancillary or necessary to completion of the Services hereunder.

XVII. All Agency 21 personnel working on the Festival shall comply at all times with Festival Rules and Regulations.

XVIII. Any and all references that Agency 21 makes regarding the Festival shall include the Festival's title and presenting sponsors. The FIU Hospitality School shall be referenced for all purposes in Agency 21 communications as the FIU Chaplin School of Hospitality Management and Tourism Management.

Description for Use of Honorlock

- On March 12, 2020 Florida International University switched all in-person and hybrid classes to an emergency “remote” modality as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic
- The remote modality required that all learning and assessments be conducted in a virtual environment
- In order to maintain academic integrity of assessments and minimize cheating, remote proctoring services were needed
- An evaluation was conducted by the Academic Continuity team of Remote Proctoring Services that were available, affordable and able to be integrated into the university’s LMS – CANVAS:
 - Both Honorlock and ProctorU remote proctoring services were evaluated
 - Honorlock had 3 times as much usage university-wide than Proctor U (6,846 vs 2,121 for Spring 2020)
 - Honorlock has two rates \$4.45/student/exam for automated pop in and \$12/hour/student/exam for a proctor to review the recording after the exam. FIU disabled the more expensive proctor review option, to keep the cost lower for the university while still protecting the integrity of our exams
 - ProctorU’s cost varied but started at \$16/hour/student/exam for live pro
 - Difference in automated pop in vs. Live proctoring:
 - Automated Pop-in utilizes artificial intelligence to watch a test taker through a web camera and sends an automated message alerting the student and flagging the test when cheating is suspected
 - Live proctoring has a real person watching the test taker through a web camera and so is charged hourly to compensate the person observing the test. The person flags the test for the faculty when cheating is suspected
 - Center for the Advancement of Teaching (CAT) recommended that 4 proctored exams per class be offered
 - Office of General Counsel review the usage agreement for Honorlock
 - At the time, March 2020, there were 202,000 instances of enrollment (both grad and undergrad), so the intention was to determine how many of these will indeed want to use the service
 - A survey was sent to all faculty to gauge the need for remote proctoring and estimate the usage on 3/18/2020
- In order to minimize the financial burden to students that were previously in-person or hybrid and who were now switched to remote learning, the additional cost of remote proctoring was absorbed by the university
- Faculty who were teaching remotely were allowed to administer up to 4 exams per student per course utilizing Honorlock and the cost of these exams would be paid for by the university
- Since the start of remote operation, the university has administered 358,684 exams totaling \$1,596,147.50 that covers Spring 2020 - Fall 2020, Spring 2021- Fall 2021, and Spring 2022. The amount was covered through funds from the CARES project, but going forward it will be funded from FIU Online distance learning fee (see table below):

WHEREAS, FIU desires to obtain the Services contemplated in the Solicitation.



TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. **Effective Date.** The "Effective Date" of this Agreement shall be the date upon which the last party to execute this Agreement has done so, as evidenced by the date noted below its signature.
2. **Term.** This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall continue until December 11, 2021, (the "Initial Term"). The Agreement may be renewed two (2) times for a period of one (1) year each (each, a "Renewal Term"). The Initial Term and any Renewal Term(s) shall be known, collectively, as the "Term."
3. **Payment.** FIU shall pay Contractor pursuant to the order forms issued, and pricing will be per Solicitation.
4. **Payment Terms.** Contractor shall submit invoices for fees or other compensation for services or expenses in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit. FIU will make payment in accordance with FIU Regulation FIU-2202, which states the Contractor's rights as a vendor and FIU's responsibilities concerning interest penalties and time limits for payment of invoices. Upon receipt, FIU has five (5) business days to inspect and approve the goods or services. If a payment is not issued within **forty (40) days of receipt** of a proper invoice and receipt and inspection and approval of the goods and services, FIU will pay to the Contractor, in addition to the amount of the invoice, an interest penalty at the rate established pursuant to Florida Statutes §55.03(1), provided the interest penalty is in excess of one dollar (\$1.00). A Vendor Ombudsman has been established within the Office of Business and Finance. The duties of this individual include acting as an advocate for vendors who may be experiencing problems in obtaining timely payment from FIU. The Vendor Ombudsman may be contacted at (305) 348-2101. The Contractor shall cooperate with FIU and provide specific records and/or access to all of the Contractor's records related to this Agreement for purposes of conducting an audit or investigation. FIU will provide Contractor with reasonable notice of the need for such records or access.
5. **Beneficiary.** The parties agree that all obligations of Contractor under the Contract, and all benefits provided therein by Contractor pursuant to the Solicitation and the contract resulting therefrom, shall inure to the benefit of FIU, and, as applicable, Florida International University, the FIU Board of Trustees, the Florida Board of Governors, the State of Florida and their respective trustees, officers, agents, employees, successors and assigns, pursuant to this Agreement.
6. **No Guarantees.** Contractor acknowledges that this Agreement is not a guarantee of any work.
7. **Insurance.** Contractor shall, at minimum, have and maintain the types and amounts of insurance outlined in the Solicitation, in addition to that which is necessary to protect both Contractor and FIU against all liabilities, losses, damages, claims, settlements, expenses, and legal fees arising out of or resulting from performance of the Agreement, in any and all forms. Contractor shall name and shall require all providers, partners, suppliers, subcontractors and anyone else providing services relating to this Agreement to name, as appropriate, The Florida International University Board of Trustees, Florida International University, the State of Florida, The Florida Board of Governors, and their respective trustees, directors, officers, employees and agents, as additional insureds. The policies of the Contractor, its providers, partners, suppliers and subcontractors and anyone else providing services to the University shall be primary and any insurance carried by FIU shall be noncontributing with respect thereto. FIU, as a public body corporate entity, is self-insured, and will provide its Certificate of Insurance upon request; FIU will not purchase additional insurance coverage for this Agreement. FIU is not liable for the acts of third parties or the consequences of the acts of third parties.
8. **Relationship of the Parties.** The Contractor is an independent contractor, and neither the Contractor nor the Contractor's employees, agents, or other representatives shall be considered FIU's employees or agents. Contractor represents that Contractor and Contractor's spouse or child are not employees of the University, and Contractor does not have an employment or contractual relationship with an employee of the University pursuant to [FIU Policy 140.105](#). The Contractor shall not use FIU's name, trademarks, logos, or marks without FIU's prior written approval. The Contractor represents and warrants that it is not on the Convicted Vendor List (see Fla. Stat. § 287.133(2)(a)). Each party hereby assumes any and all risk of personal injury and property damage attributable to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of that party and the officers, employees, and agents thereof. The Contractor also assumes such risk with respect to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of the Contractor's subcontractors or persons otherwise acting or engaged to act at the instance of the Contractor in furtherance of the Contractor fulfilling the

Contractor's obligations under this Agreement.

10. **Sovereign Immunity.** Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as an indemnification of the Contractor by FIU or as a waiver of sovereign immunity beyond that provided in Florida Statutes §768.28.

11. **Lobbying.** Contractor is prohibited from using funds provided under this Agreement for the purpose of lobbying the Legislature or any official, officer, commission, board, authority, council, committee, or department of the executive branch or the judicial branch of state government.

12. **Federal Funds.** If FIU has entered into an agreement with the United States of America, or any Department thereof, and this Agreement is entered into with Contractor to further the performance of the work required in such federal agreement, Contractor shall comply with the terms contained in FIU's Federally Funded Projects Addendum found at <https://generalcounsel.fiu.edu>, herein incorporated by reference.

13. **Information Technology.** If Contractor has access to FIU's information technology infrastructure, or will be providing such infrastructure to FIU, Contractor agrees at all times to maintain network security that, at a minimum, includes: network firewall provisioning, intrusion detection, and regular third party penetration testing. Contractor further agrees to:

- a. **Network Standards:** to use at least those standards that FIU applies to its own network, pursuant to [FIU Policy 1910.010 - University Wireless Network Infrastructure](#);
- b. **Data Security:** to protect and maintain the security of FIU data with protection that is at least as good as or better than that maintained by FIU. These security measures include maintaining secure environments that are patched and up-to-date with all appropriate security updates pursuant to [FIU Policy 1930.020 - Information Technology Security](#);
- c. **Data Transmission:** that any and all transmission or exchange of system application data with FIU and/or any other parties expressly designated by FIU, shall take place via secure means, e.g., HTTPS or FTPS;

- d. Data Storage: that any and all FIU data will be stored, processed, and maintained solely on designated target servers and that no FIU data at any time will be processed on or transferred to any portable or laptop computing device or any portable storage medium, unless medium is in part of the Contractor's designated backup and recovery process;
- e. Domain Encryption: that any websites hosted by Contractor on behalf of FIU shall be on an encrypted domain in compliance with the minimum security standards pursuant to [FIU Policy 175.150 - Digital Communications Standards Policy](#);
- f. Data Encryption: to store any FIU backup data as part of its designated backup and recovery process in encrypted form, using no less than 128 bit key;
- g. Password Protection: that any portable or laptop computer that resides at any FIU facility, has access to a FIU network, or stores any non-public FIU data is equipped with strong and secure password protection;
- h. Data Re-Use: that all data exchanged shall be used expressly and solely for the purpose enumerated in the Agreement. Data shall not be distributed, repurposed or shared across other applications, environments, or business units of Contractor. Contractor further agrees that no FIU data of any kind shall be transmitted, exchanged or otherwise passed to other vendors or interested parties except on a case-by-case basis as specifically agreed to in writing by FIU;
- i. Data Destruction: that, upon termination of the Agreement, it shall erase, destroy, and render unreadable all FIU data from all computer systems and backups, and certify in writing that these actions have been completed within thirty (30) days of the termination of the Agreement or within seven (7) days of the request of an agent of FIU, whichever shall come first; and
- j. Notification and Data Breaches: to comply with all applicable laws that require the notification of individuals in the event of unauthorized release of personally identifiable information or other event requiring notification in accordance therewith. In the event of a data breach of any Contractor's security obligations or other event requiring notification under applicable law (a "Notification Event"), Contractor agrees to assume responsibility for informing all such individuals in accordance with applicable laws and to indemnify, hold harmless and defend FIU against any claims, damages, or other harm related to such Notification Event.

14. PCI DSS. If Contractor's provision of services involve the acceptance of funds on behalf of the University or involve credit card services, Contractor agrees to comply with those terms contained in [FIU Policy 1110.025](#) – Payment Card Processing reference. Further, Contractor shall be responsible for the security of all FIU customer cardholder data in its possession. Contractor represents and warrants that for the life of the Agreement and/or while Contractor has involvement with FIU customer cardholder data, the software and services used for processing transactions shall be compliant with standards established by the Payment Card Industry Security Standards Council (<https://www.pcisecuritystandards.org/>). Contractor shall, upon written request, furnish proof of compliance with the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard (PCI DSS) within 10 business days of the request. Contractor agrees to provide to FIU a current and complete copy of their Attestation of Compliance (AOC). Further, Contractor agrees to provide to FIU a proof of a recent (no more than 3 months old) passing quarterly external vulnerability scan as submitted by an Approved Scanning Vendor (ASV).

15. No counterparts; facsimile signatures allowed. This Agreement may not be executed in counterparts. The Agreement, along with any and all Exhibits, may be executed and delivered by facsimile signature by any of the parties to the other parties; to the extent permissible under Florida law, a facsimile signature shall have the same legal force and effect as an original signature and the receiving party may rely on the receipt of such document so executed and delivered by facsimile signature as if the original had been received.

16. Assignment/Modification of Contract. This Agreement may not be assigned or modified by either party except as agreed to in writing and signed by both parties. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties' successors and assigns.

17. Governing Law; Venue. This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of Florida and exclusive venue of any actions arising out of this Agreement shall be in the courts in Miami-Dade County, Florida.

18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement, along with the Exhibits and any other appendices, addenda, schedules, and amendments hereto, encompasses the entire agreement of the parties, and supersedes all previous understandings and agreements between the parties, whether oral or written. The parties hereby acknowledge and represent that said parties have not relied on any representation, assertion, guarantee, warranty, collateral contract or other assurance,

except those set out in this Agreement, made by or on behalf of any other party or any other person or entity whatsoever, prior to the execution of this Agreement.

Subject: Approval of Contract for Soil Disposal on Doral Property owned by Foundation Enterprise Holdings V, LLC (FEH V), an affiliate of FIU Foundation, Inc.

Proposed Committee Action:

Approve the request from the FIU Foundation, Inc. (the “FIU Foundation”), a direct support organization (a “DSO”) of Florida International University to approve the purchase of services by the FIU Foundation in an amount equal to \$1,240,150, in connection with the removal and disposal of approximately 21,000 cubic yards of soil (the “Soil”) at the real property ultimately owned by the FIU Foundation and located west of the Florida Turnpike and south of N.W. 41st Street in Doral (the “Doral Property”), as required by Section 7(a)(ii) of FIU Regulation 1502, Direct Support Organizations.

Background Information

On October 27, 2017, the FIU Foundation, through a special purpose entity, acquired the Doral Property, comprised of 62.5 acres, from Turnberry/Doral Development, Limited Partnership, for a purchase price of \$1,008,153. In July 2022, Gallaher Valuation conducted an independent property appraisal and determined that the current “as is” market value is \$14.1 million and \$15.6 million once remaining environmental issues have been remediated.

At the time of the acquisition, the Doral Property was subject to a corrective action plan (the “CAP”) issued by Miami-Dade County’s Department of Environmental Resources Management (“DERM”), due to environmental concerns related to unpermitted solid waste and landfill activities that took place decades before the acquisition. In connection with the acquisition, the Foundation secured an unrestricted gift in the amount of \$2,500,000 from a Turnberry affiliate to pay for the environmental remediation.

In January 2020, following the issuance of an Invitation-to-Bid # ITB-2019-00019 “FIU Foundation (FEH#5) Doral Property Soil Remediation – FM 170616”, and approval by the FIU Foundation Board of Directors and the FIU Board of Trustees, the FIU Foundation formally engaged The BG Group, LLC to screen material and remove and dispose solid waste on the Doral Property identified by the CAP.

Following removal and disposal of the solid waste, on December 3, 2020, DERM approved the Certificate of Completion for the CAP, but with the condition that the FIU Foundation agree to a one-year groundwater and surface water monitoring period on 4.7 acres of the Doral Property. The FIU Foundation engaged Langan Engineering and Environmental Services, Inc. to conduct the required testing and monitoring, and subsequent reporting to DERM.

In January 2022, after review of two consecutive quarterly water quality reports, DERM concluded that the testing demonstrated the presence of naturally occurring hazardous material exceeding the

groundwater cleanup target levels provided in Section 24-44(2) of the Miami-Dade County Code and instructed the FIU Foundation to remove and dispose of approximately 21,000 cubic yards of soil (the “Soil”).

As a result of DERM’s directive, and with the assistance of the University’s Facilities Management and Procurement Services teams, on June 15, 2022, an Invitation-to-Bid was issued on behalf of the FIU Foundation (#ITB-2022-00077) to secure a qualified third-party to appropriately remove and dispose of the Soil, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A. The bid process commenced on July 20, 2022, culminating in the review and evaluation of two (2) qualified proposals.

The lowest responsive, responsible bid, based on the total cost of the proposed work, was provided by Diversified Professional Services Corp. (“DPS Corp.”), in an amount equal to \$1,240,150 (the “Soil Removal Expenses”). On August 23, 2022, the Intent to Award the work to DPS Corp. was posted publicly, and the FIU Foundation and DPS Corp. have negotiated, but not executed, a proposed services Contract, [a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B (the “Soil Removal Contract”)], to be executed upon the receipt by the FIU Foundation of all necessary FIU Foundation and University approvals.

Any and all amounts paid pursuant to and in accordance with the Soil Removal Contract shall come from FIU Foundation funds, and in no event shall University funds be used in connection with the Soil removal.

On September 16, 2022, both the Executive Committee and Finance Committee of the FIU Foundation are scheduled to review the request to approve the award of the Soil removal work to DPS Corp., the payment of the Soil Removal Expenses by the FIU Foundation and the execution and delivery of the Soil Removal Contract by the FIU Foundation. In accordance with the FIU Foundation’s bylaws, the foregoing approvals shall be reported to the full FIU Foundation Board of Directors at its next scheduled meeting, to be held on October 22, 2022.

Pursuant to Section 7(a)(ii) of FIU Regulation 1502, Direct Support Organizations, any purchase of goods or services by a DSO (such as the FIU Foundation) with a total value greater than or equal to \$1,000,000, but less than \$3,000,000, shall require the prior approval of the Finance and Facilities Committee of the Board of Trustees, and thereafter reported to the Board of Trustees.

The remediation work is scheduled to begin in late September 2022 and is expected to be completed by December 2022.

CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT (the “Contract”) is made and entered into on _____ (the “Effective Date”), by and between the **FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY FOUNDATION, INC.**, a Florida not for profit corporation (the “**Foundation**”), and **DIVERSIFIED PROFESSIONAL SERVICES CORP.**, a Florida profit corporation, who is authorized to do business in the State of Florida (the “**Contractor**”).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Foundation requested solicitation responses for Competitive Solicitation ITB No. 2022-00077 (“ITB #2022-00077”) to provide the following goods and/or services: removal of approximately 21,000 cubic yards of contaminated soil in six stockpiles for Miami-Dade Folio Number 30-3925-000-0010 located in the vicinity of 11800 NW 41st Street, Doral, Florida (the “Services”);

WHEREAS, the Contractor submitted a solicitation response for ITB #2022-00077 to perform the Services (“Contractor’s Solicitation Response”), which was accepted by the Foundation.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements made herein and intending to be legally bound hereby, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. **Term.** This Contract commences on the Effective Date and will continue for an initial term of one hundred twenty (120) days (the “Term”), as the Term may be extended by the Foundation in its sole discretion, or as the Term may need to be extended for the completion of additional services that may be commissioned by the Foundation pursuant to and in accordance with the terms of ITB #2022-00077.

2. **Contract.** The Contractor will provide to the Foundation the Services pursuant to the terms and conditions described in the following: the Competitive Solicitation for ITB #2022-00077 (including the Price Sheet Bid Form), the General Terms and Conditions – General Contractor, the Division 01 General Requirements, and the Invitation to Bid-Standard Provisions), attached hereto as Exhibit I and incorporated herein by reference; and the Contractor’s Solicitation Response, attached hereto as Exhibit II and incorporated herein by reference (all of which constitute, collectively, part of the Contract). In the event of conflict between or among terms and conditions contained in the foregoing documents with regards to the Services, such documents shall govern in the following order of precedence:

- a. first, this Contract;
- b. second, the Competitive Solicitation for ITB #2022-00077 as well as any attachments and any addenda, it being understood that (i) in the event of any conflict between the provisions of the General Terms and Conditions – General Contractor and the Invitation to Bid- Standard Provisions, the provisions of the General Terms and Conditions shall prevail; and (ii) if the ITB

#2022-00077, or any attachments or addenda thereto, include two provisions addressing the same subject, the provision with the more stringent terms shall take precedence over the more general provision (by way of illustration, if an attachment includes higher insurance limits than those set forth in Section 3.1 of the Invitation to Bid-Standard Provisions, the terms in the attachment shall prevail); and

- c. third, the Contractor's Solicitation Response.

3. **Notice to Proceed.** The Contractor shall commence providing the Services within one (1) day after receipt of a "Notice to Proceed" (reflecting FIU's Project number) from the Foundation or FIU's Facilities Management Division.

4. **Payment.** The Contractor shall provide the Services to FIU pursuant to the pricing set forth in the Price Sheet (Bid Form). The Contractor shall submit invoices for fees or other compensation for services or expenses in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit. The Foundation will make payment in accordance with FIU Regulation FIU-2202, which states the Contractor's rights as a Vendor and FIU's responsibilities concerning interest penalties and time limits for payment of invoices. Upon receipt, the Foundation has five (5) business days to inspect and approve the goods or services. If a payment is not issued within **forty (40) days of receipt** of a proper invoice and receipt and inspection and approval of the goods and services, the Foundation will pay to the Contractor, in addition to the amount of the invoice, an interest penalty at the rate established pursuant to Florida Statutes §55.03(1), provided the interest penalty is in excess of one dollar (\$1.00). A Vendor Ombudsman has been established within the Office of Business and Finance. The duties of this individual include acting as an advocate for Vendors who may be experiencing problems in obtaining timely payment from the Foundation. The Vendor Ombudsman may be contacted at (305) 348-2101.

The Contractor shall cooperate with the Foundation and provide specific records and/or access to all of the Contractor's records related to the Contract for purposes of conducting an audit or investigation. The Foundation will provide Contractor with reasonable notice of the need for such records or access.

5. **Chapter 558, Florida Statutes.** If and as applicable, the parties specifically opt out of the requirements of Chapter 558, Florida Statutes.

6. **Assignment/Modification of Contract.** This Contract may not be assigned or modified by either party except as agreed to in writing and signed by both parties. The Contract shall be binding upon the parties' successors and permitted assigns.

7. **Sovereign Immunity.** Nothing in this Contract shall be construed as an indemnification of the Contractor by FIU or the Foundation or as a waiver of sovereign immunity beyond that provided in Florida Statutes §768.28.

8. **Relationship of the Parties.** The Contractor is an independent contractor, and neither the Contractor nor the Contractor's employees, agents, or other representatives shall be considered FIU's or the Foundation's employees or agents. The Contractor shall not use FIU's name, trademarks, logos, or marks without FIU's prior written approval. The Contractor represents and warrants that it is not on the Convicted Vendor List (see Fla. Stat. § 287.133(2)(a)). Each party hereby assumes any and all risk of personal injury and property damage attributable to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of that party and the officers, employees, and agents thereof. The Contractor also assumes such risk with respect to the willful or negligent acts or omissions of the Contractor's subcontractors or persons otherwise acting or engaged to act at the instance of the Contractor in furtherance of the Contractor fulfilling the Contractor's obligations under the Contract.

9. **Compliance with Public Records Law.** FIU is subject to applicable public records laws as provided by provisions of Florida Statutes Chapter 119, and FIU will respond to such public records request without any duty to give the Contractor prior notice. If Contractor is a "contractor" as defined under Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes, Contractor shall comply with all applicable public records laws. Specifically, Contractor shall: (1) keep and maintain public records required by FIU to perform the service; (2) Upon request from FIU's custodian of public records, provide FIU with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided under that section, or as otherwise provide by law; (3) Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the contract if Contractor does not transfer the records to FIU; and (4) upon completion of the contract, transfer, at no cost, to FIU all public records in possession of Contractor or keep and maintain public records required by FIU to perform the Service. If Contractor transfers all public records to FIU upon completion of the contract, Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the contract, Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to FIU, upon request by FIU's public records custodian, in a format that is compatible with FIU's information technology systems. If FIU receives a request for public records, and FIU does not possess such records, FIU shall immediately notify Contractor of such request, and Contractor must provide them to FIU or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time. If Contractor does not comply with the request for records, FIU shall enforce the terms of the contract, and Contractor may be subject to civil action under Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes, and the penalties outlined under Section 119.10, Florida Statutes. FIU may unilaterally cancel the Agreement for Contractor's refusal to allow public access to all public records that were made or received in conjunction with the Agreement. This provision shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of the Agreement. **IF THE CONTRACTOR HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO THE CONTRACTOR'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS**

10. **Travel Expenses.** Contractor shall not charge the Foundation for any travel expenses, meals, and lodging unless otherwise provided in this Contract and the Foundation's prior written approval of the expenses has been obtained. Under such circumstances, Contractor is authorized to incur the agreed to travel expenses which will be payable by the Foundation, but only to the extent permitted in Florida Statutes § 112.061 and the FIU Policy 1110.060 Travel: University Travel Expense Policy, which is available at <https://policies.fiu.edu/policy/548>. Contractor is responsible for any expenses in excess of these prescribed amounts.

11. **Indemnification.** The Contractor is responsible for its performance under the Contract. The Contractor will indemnify and hold harmless, assume liability for and defend, the State of Florida, the Florida Board of Governors, FIU, the Foundation, and their officers, employees, and agents, from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertions of liability, losses, costs and expenses, which may arise in any manner or are alleged to have arisen, from the acts, omissions or wrongful conduct of Contractor or Contractor's officers, employees, agents, guests, patrons, licenses, invitees or subcontractors in connection with or related to their operations, activities, and/or occupancy or use of the premises in performance of the Contract. This provision shall survive termination or expiration of the Contract.

12. **Trademark or Copyright Infringement.** Contractor will, at its expense, defend any suit brought against FIU or the Foundation and will indemnify FIU and the Foundation against an award of damages and costs made against FIU and/or the Foundation by settlement or final judgment of a court that is based on a claim that the use of the Contractor's product infringes a trademark or copyright of a third party; provided that FIU or the Foundation, as applicable, notifies Contractor in writing of the suit or any claim of infringement within thirty (30) days after receiving notice thereof, and further provided that Contractor is permitted to control the defense in any litigation or settlement of the suit. FIU and the Foundation will provide reasonable cooperation in the defense of the suit at Contractor's expense. Such defense and indemnity shall survive termination or expiration of the Contract.

13. **Confidentiality of Information.** The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that (a) all documents, studies, materials and information furnished to the Contractor by FIU, the Foundation or FIU's affiliates in connection with this Contract and (b) all reports, studies, plans, deliverables, strategies, materials and other documents and information developed or prepared for FIU or the Foundation in connection with this Contract or which reflect any of the documents, studies, materials or information furnished to the Contractor by FIU or the Foundation (the materials described in (a) and (b) are collectively referred to as the "Information") are and shall remain at all times confidential, proprietary, and the sole property of FIU and the Foundation. The Contractor agrees that it shall not use the Information and will not share the Information with its

employees, except as necessary to the Contractor's performance under this Contract, and the Contractor shall at all times comply with all state and federal laws governing the use and/or safe-keeping of confidential and/or personally identifiable information. The Contractor shall not disclose Information to third parties unless it obtains the Foundation's written consent to such disclosure.

In the event the Contractor required by subpoena or other judicial or administrative process or by law to disclose such records, the Contractor shall (i) provide the Foundation with prompt notice thereof; (ii) consult with the Foundation on the advisability of taking steps to resist or narrow such disclosure; (iii) furnish only that portion of the information that is responsive to the request; (iv) comply with the requirements of all state and federal privacy laws applicable to the Information, which may include but is not be limited, to Florida Public Records laws, FERPA, the Gramm-Leach Bliley Act, the Federal Trade Commission's Red Flags Rule (which implements Section 114 of the Fair and Accurate Credit Transactions Act of 2003); and (v) reasonably cooperate with the Foundation in any attempt that the Foundation may make to obtain an order or other reliable assurance that confidential treatment will be accorded the records. Upon termination of this Contract or upon request by the Foundation, the Contractor shall promptly return the Information to the Foundation. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Foundation will share or provide access to protected health information or "PHI" for the Contractor to perform this Contract, the Foundation and the Contractor will enter into a separate business associate agreement which will govern the confidentiality and non-use obligations of the Contract regarding the PHI (in lieu of this provision). This provision shall survive the termination or expiration of this Contract.

14. **Lobbying.** Contractor is prohibited from using funds provided under this Contract for the purpose of lobbying the Legislature or any official, officer, commission, board, authority, council, committee, or department of the executive branch or the judicial branch of state government.

15. **Notice.** Any notices required under this Contract shall be sent via U.S. Mail, return receipt requested, or by nationally recognized overnight courier, to the parties at the following addresses:

16. **No counterparts; facsimile signatures allowed.** This Contract may not be executed in counterparts. The Contract, along with any and all Exhibits, may be executed and delivered by facsimile signature by any of the parties to the other parties; to the extent permissible under Florida law, a facsimile signature shall have the same legal force and effect as an original signature and the receiving party may rely on the receipt of such document so executed and delivered by facsimile signature as if the original had been received.

17. **Entire Agreement.** This Contract, along with the Exhibits and any other appendices, addenda, schedules, and amendments hereto, encompasses the entire agreement of the parties, and supersedes all previous understandings and agreements between the parties, whether oral or written. The parties hereby acknowledge and represent that said parties have not relied on any representation, assertion, guarantee, warranty, collateral contract or other assurance, except those set out in this Contract, made by or on behalf of any other party or any other person or entity whatsoever, prior to the execution of this Contract. In the event that any provision contained in this Contract is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, (i) such portion or provision shall be deemed separate and independent, (ii) the parties shall negotiate in good faith to restore insofar as practicable the benefits to each party that were affected by such ruling, and (iii) the remainder of this Contract shall remain in full force and effect.

18. **Damages.** The Foundation shall not be liable for any loss, damage or other liability otherwise equivalent to, or in the nature of, any indirect, incidental, consequential, exemplary, punitive or special damages arising from performing, or failing to perform, any obligation under or related to this Contract, whether such liability arises in contract (including breach, indemnity or warranty), tort (including fault, negligence or strict liability), or otherwise, including any loss of profits, loss of revenue, loss of opportunity or goodwill.

19. **WAIVER OF JURY TRIAL.** THE PARTIES HEREBY KNOWINGLY, VOLUNTARILY, AND INTENTIONALLY WAIVE ANY RIGHT THAT MAY EXIST TO HAVE A TRIAL BY JURY IN RESPECT OF ANY LITIGATION BASED UPON OR ARISING OUT OF, UNDER, OR IN ANY WAY CONNECTED WITH, THIS CONTRACT.

20. **Clarifications/negotiated points (if any) are:**

- a. "Substantial Completion" for the Services shall mean sixty (60) days from the date of the Notice to Proceed, and shall include completion of all Work, and submittals of all information by Contractor required or necessary for the Professional to submit a signed certificate of completion, to the Division of Environmental Resources Management.
- b. Contractor shall perform the Services promptly and in a manner consistent with the level of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of its profession under similar conditions and industry standards.

- c. Contractor shall provide a draft copy to the Foundation of any documentation prepared by Contractor which Contractor proposes to submit to any governmental authority in connection with the Services. Contractor shall provide the Foundation with a reasonable time to review such documentation and shall in good faith consider comments made by the Foundation.



Expenses are below target primarily due to savings in student centers and buildings, campus life, student government, and student groups and clubs; savings are driven by vacant positions and less temporary personnel, \$2.9M, and other expenses, \$0.6M.

Technology Fee: Revenues -\$0.1M, Expenses \$3.0M

Technology fee revenues are slightly below plan due to lower student credit hour enrollment offset by less bad debt expense and waivers.

Expenses are below target due to delays in projects which are being caused by nationwide delays in shipping of equipment.

Board Approved Fees: Revenues -\$0.1M, Expenses \$0.1M

Revenues are below plan by \$80K or 19%, due to less than anticipated students reaching the new, minimum, eligibility threshold of seventy credit hours to be assessed the Bar Test Prep Fee. The prior minimum threshold was sixty credit hours.

Expenses are \$80K or 19% lower than budget due to payments to third-party test prep vendors which will be paid in the upcoming fiscal year, \$0.1M.

Sponsored Research:

The unfavorable variance in revenues of \$11.1M is mainly associated with reimbursements from the Higher Education Emergency Relief (HEERF) grant which were \$17.1M below projections due to delays in expenditures; offset by higher revenues from other sources of sponsored research, \$4.9M, and unbudgeted reimbursements from the National Forensic Science Technology Center (NSFTC), \$1.0M.

Expenditures are below budget by \$16.6M mainly due to delays in expenditures on the HEERF grant and lost revenue claims and construction expenses reflected as institutional transfers, \$36.0M; offset by higher than expected commitments against Facilities and Administrative (F&A) returns spent by the colleges, units, centers, and researchers, (\$15.0M); and higher expenses on others sources of sponsored projects, (\$4.4M).

\$ 16.6 \$ -

Claims against the HEERF grant in fiscal year 2021-22 of \$38.5M (expenses of \$17.5M and construction and lost revenues transfers of \$21.0M) are \$15.1M below the budgeted expenses of \$53.6M. FIU has received a no-cost extension for the HEERF grant through June 30, 2023.

The majority of the variance is due to delays in reimbursements from Bright Futures (\$2.9M) and Pell Grant awards (\$1.5M); less students eligible for Bright Futures awards, (\$0.3M), and Pell Grant awards, (\$1.7M); lower enrollment and resulting lower tuition differential and base revenues, (\$0.2M); offset by higher than anticipated donor-related scholarships, \$1.4M, and higher Federal Work Study (FWS) revenues due to prior year revenues received in the current year, \$0.3M.

Student financial aid expense is below target by \$2.1M or 1%, driven by less eligible students for Bright Futures awards, \$1.5M, and Pell Grant awards, \$2.9M; lower Financial Aid administration expenses due to vacant positions, \$0.9M; and less than anticipated FWS expenses due to less students, \$0.8M; offset by higher donor-related scholarship expenses, (\$1.8M), Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) scholarships (\$0.8M), institutional aid, (\$0.6M), and other sources of financial aid, (\$0.8M).

The student portion award from the federal Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) grant program of \$101.1M has been fully expended at the end of fiscal year 2021-22.

The negative change in net position of \$3.5M is \$2.9M below target and is due to timing of receipt of reimbursements for Bright Futures, Florida Student Assistance Grant, and HEERF grant awards.

Concessions Variance: Revenues \$0.3M, Expenses \$0.0M

Revenues are \$284K or 46 percent higher than plan mainly due to non-operating lost revenues claimed from the federal Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) Grant program for fiscal year 2021-22, \$316K. Operating revenues are below target, due to lower Housing laundry vending commissions as laundry rooms were closed for repairs and generally lower usage, (\$27K), and lower than anticipated vending commissions due to a prior-year adjustment, (\$5K).

The unfavorable variance against budget of \$24K or 3 percent is mainly due to an unbudgeted work of art in public spaces which was committed in prior years (\$126K); higher than anticipated spending out of Housing laundry commissions on student-related events such as a student housing move-in events, (\$33K); offset by savings across various university events, \$123K, and lower than anticipated vending operations overhead charges, \$12K.

The higher expenses in support to the university are mainly the unbudgeted transfer of the Management and Advanced Research Center (MARC) building cash reserves to the university, (\$2.5M); higher than budgeted scholarship and program expenses, (\$2.5M); offset by lower building funds and operational support expenses, \$1.1M. Higher expenses in Foundation operations are as a result of unbudgeted remediation expenses for the Doral property, (\$1.2M); offset by savings in event and travel expenses, \$0.6M.

Net investment revenues of -\$22.9M are comprised of \$7.7M of investment earnings, -\$28.7M of unrealized losses, and Treasury operating expenses of \$2.2M; and are \$36.7M below plan. Additionally, investment income and unrealized gains in **Contracts & Grants**, related to a National Institutes of Health grant invested as an endowment with the Foundation, are \$1.6M below target; Self-Insurance Program investment returns are \$0.3M below plan.

Foundation investments fiscal year-to-date gains are at -7.2 percent or -\$36.3M, generating an unfavorable variance of \$58.4M. Investment returns for the full fiscal year were budgeted at 6.0 percent, or \$22.1M. Actual fiscal year to date returns of -10.5 percent have been adjusted for private equity returns related to fiscal year 2020-21 but recognized in fiscal year 2021-22, resulting in an accounting fiscal year to date return of -7.2 percent.

HIGHLIGHTS AND NEW SERVICES

The Office of Business Services (OBS) is happy to report that as of August 2022 all food and retail venues were opened. Summer 2022 continued the campus repopulation efforts with off-campus courses, and a phased remote working environment resulting in a noticeable positive shift in on-campus population. OBS continues to compare traffic counts to pre-pandemic levels to promote the opening of additional venues and services and expanding hours of operation. As of June 30, 2022, 32 of 33 dining venues were open.

FIU One Card

The FIU One Card office printed 3500 IDs for new students during summer 2022 orientations through June. Students were encouraged to upload their pictures ahead of time and 75% of students successfully did so and were able to pick up their card without a wait at the end of orientation. In June of 2022, the CBORD system was updated to the newest software version enabling technological advances such as web-based card printing and touchless RFI encoding. These advances will be used for the new door access system in Tamiami Hall coming online Fall 2022. This Fall, residents of Tamiami Hall will be given an FIU One Card with touchless chip technology to gain entry into the building and their rooms.

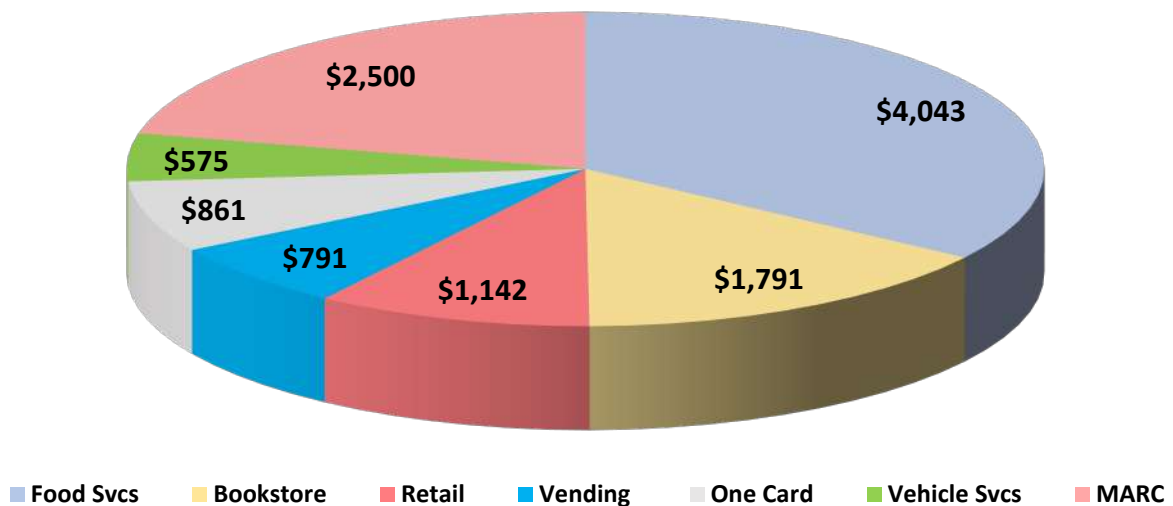
Retail Banking

Negotiations are ongoing to finalize a new five-year agreement for retail banking on campus that includes linking debit accounts to the FIU One Card, ATM locations across the Modesto A. Maidique (MMC) and Biscayne Bay Campus (BBC) and a retail branch located in the Gold parking garage at MMC. OBS and the Office of General Counsel are in the final stages of completing the Financial Wellness Seminars contractual language for each agreement.

OBS oversees 60 food and retail venues, beverage, and snack vending, FIU One Card program, fleet services, multi-use facilities, property management and advertising. shopFIU MARKETING

Orientation Presentation and Engagement Assessment

Each summer, shopFIU along with our bookstore and dining partners deliver a presentation to all incoming students. This summer, we presented to several thousand students. Following each presentation, students were sent a survey to assess comprehension of the information we delivered, as well as satisfaction and engagement with the content and our shopFIU resource fair. The emails had an open rate ranging from 42% to up to 59% (industry standard is 17%).

shopFIU Day

On April 14, 2022, shopFIU and business partners took over the Graham Center lawns and hosted the first ever shopFIU day. The event provided a holistic brand experience where the FIU community was invited to come out and get to know our vendor partners. Targeted marketing was deployed for several days leading up to the event and helped bring out over 200 participants. As a result, shopFIU and our partners were able to make connections and grow contact lists and social media followers. The second shopFIU day is scheduled for October 4, 2022 during homecoming week.

Parent and Family Engagement

Recognizing that parents and families are an important part of student success at FIU, the shopFIU marketing team has been working diligently with the Office of Orientation and Family Programs to continuously identify areas for engagement with this segment. This summer, shopFIU hosted two parent webinars where we presented parent-specific topics of interest such as saving money with a meal plan, a deep dive into the Panther Book Pack and opportunities for financial wellness learning with Wells Fargo and the Office of Financial Wellness.

Hours of Operations Marketing

The most visited page on the shopFIU website is the "hours of operations". Each semester, shopFIU diligently reminds the campus community about this resource. The marketing team has also expanded the footprint of this resource to include a tab inside FIU mobile under "Places and Shops".

At the start of Summer A and Summer B, an email was sent with the new hours for that semester. The emails saw an open rate of 48% and 26%, respectively (industry standard is 17%).

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

OBS broke ground on the Riccardo Silva Stadium kitchen project located at the south end of the stadium. The project is currently underway with a scheduled completion date in January 2023. This kitchen will be used to service game day, concessions, athlete meals and catering operations for the campus.

Additionally, construction began in PG 5 for a new dining concept to replace the vacated retail pizza location that has been closed since 2019. The very first Auntie Anne's/Cinnabon mixed use concept will be open this Fall. The brand is also scheduled to open a kiosk in the Green Library in early Fall.

FOOD SERVICES

Food Services sales of \$20.5M generated \$4.0M in revenue and support to FIU. Chartwells and Preferred Caterer revenue continue to exceed plan, while Vicky Café fell behind plan due to an unbudgeted closure for the months of May through the start of the Fall semester.



National Smoothie Day: On June 21, 2022 Chartwells hosted National Smoothie Day at Jamba Juice with a small tasting of Water Breeze drink. To celebrate this day, every purchase of a medium drink was upgraded to a large for FREE.

Juneteenth 2022: In collaboration with the Division of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and the Black Student Union, we leveraged partnered food trucks for the Juneteenth celebration. MMC hosted 11 food trucks at the event on June 18, 2022. The event was very well attended.



Wellness and Nutrition: With the start of Summer B sessions at FIU, 8th Street Campus Kitchen has returned as well. There was no better way to celebrate this than by creating an educational space. Chartwells' resident dietician, Melissa Lyn, presented snack ideas focused on energy with nutritional facts. In addition, Melissa prepared 200 cups of hummus with chips, celery, and carrots to give away to students.



Grubhub: A constant goal for Panther Dining is to drive awareness of Mobile Ordering. In July, the HR Newsletter and Freshman Orientation announced our GRUBHUB promo code PICKUP7. The promo offered first time users \$7 off a purchase of \$15 dollars or more when pre-ordering through the Grubhub App at any of FIU's retail locations.

BOOKSTORE

Bookstore sales of \$15.7M generated revenue to FIU comprised of \$1.8M in commissions and support.

Barnes & Noble and FIU continue to offer the First Day opt-out program, known as the FIU Panther Book Pack. The rate per credit hour remained at \$20. For more information on the Panther Book Pack program visit <https://shop.fiu.edu/bookpack-2>. The Panther Book Pack translated into savings by semester to participating undergraduate students as follows:

VENDING

Vending sales of \$944K generated revenue and support to FIU of \$791K in commissions and support. Vending sales affect FIU's concession fund which is used for initiatives such as student-sponsored and University-wide events. FIU will be funding a portion of this year's commitments from the accumulated fund balance in the concession fund in an effort to continue university events and student engagement activities. Year to date, vending commissions trailed plan by -1%.

Pepsi Co.

Over 130 machines across MMC, BBC, and the Engineering Center (EC) generated vending sales commissions of \$179K which are ahead of prior year. Annual case volume contractual thresholds were not met last year thereby reducing annual pouring rights by -85%. This fiscal year, while annual case volume improved substantially over the prior year, it nevertheless did not reach the contractual threshold by -36%.

Right Choice

Snack vending sales commissions of \$99K are trailing plan and prior year by -4% and -86%, respectively. There are over 100 snack vending machines across MMC, BBC, and EC. A solicitation for snack vending services was released in the fourth quarter of the fiscal year as the contract term has ended and is on a month-to-month basis until a new agreement is in place.

RETAIL OPERATIONS

OBS manages 18 internal and external tenants across MMC and BBC.

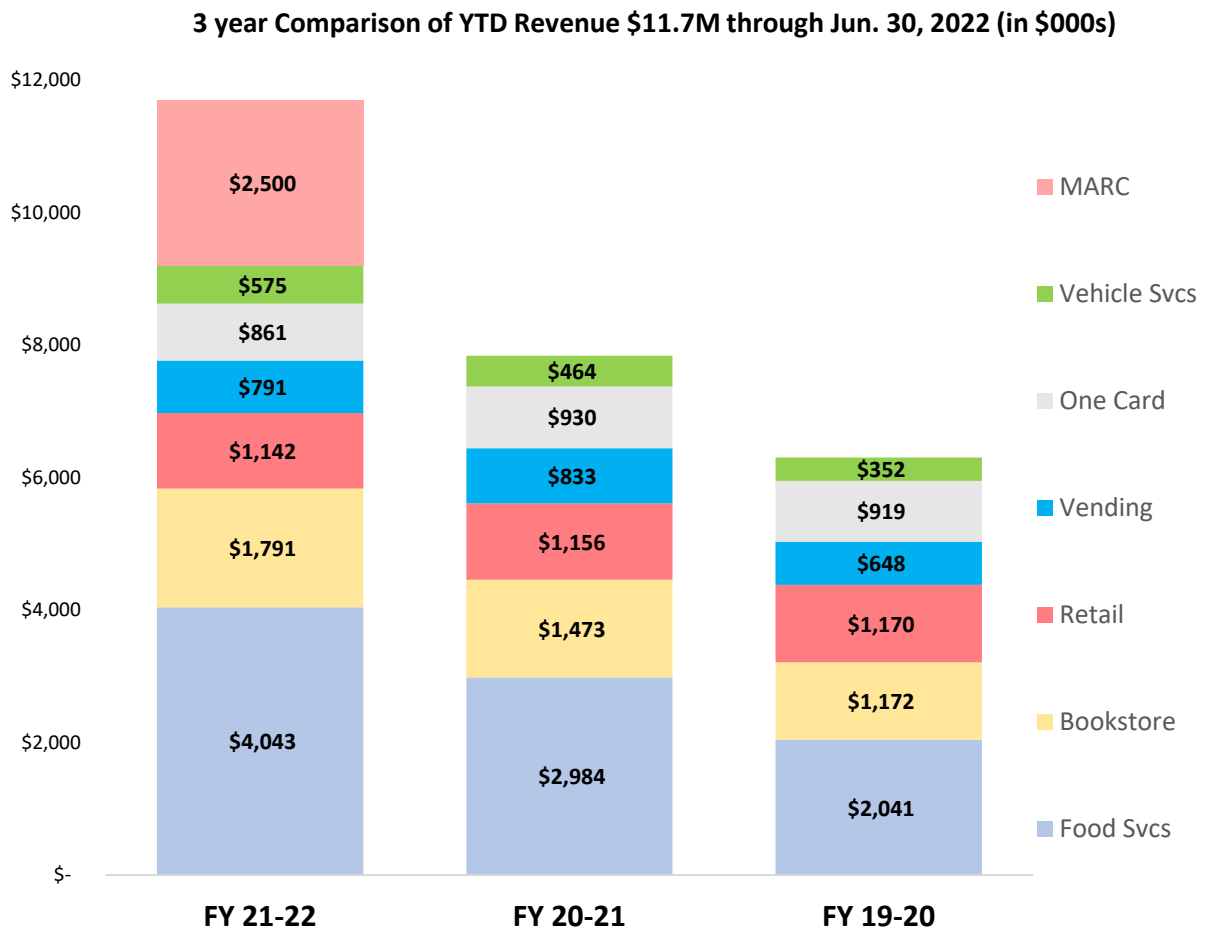
Retail operations sales of \$1.3M generated commissions and rental income of \$1.1M, ahead of plan by 3% and trailing the prior year by -1%. Variances were primarily driven by unbudgeted commissions from commencements of \$42K, and sales commissions exceeding plan by \$27K. This performance is offset slightly by rental income trailing plan by (\$25K) due to contractual amendments mainly to RICOH and Gabor Financial Solutions.

The College Optical was acquired by another entity. The new ownership, Vision Unlimited, is led by Dr. Mario Carcamo, an established optometrist in Miami-Dade with multiple locations.

Another retail tenant, Gabor Financial Solutions, was acquired by a majority owner, Lincoln Investment. The leadership and service teams as well as the services offered remain the same for FIU.

3-YEAR COMPARISON OF YEAR-TO-DATE FIU REVENUE

Through the fourth quarter ended June 30, 2022, \$40.7M in sales generated revenue and support to FIU of \$11.7M.

FACILITIES AND CONSTRUCTION UPDATE AS OF AUGUST 29, 2022

Report *(For Information Only – no action required)*

Projects Completed

None during this reporting period.

Projects under Construction

- **Tamiami Hall (formerly Parkview II Housing) (BT-892)** - \$98.5M project consisting of \$91.6M bond proceeds and Housing Auxiliary funding for the building, \$3.9M Auxiliary Shared Services Fee for road and utility relocation, and \$3.0M in FY21-22 CITF funding allocated to the Promenade. A/E – Perkins+Will (P+W); CM – Moss & Associates. The project constructed a new 697 private bedroom style residence hall (299,530 gsf) on the Modesto A. Maidique campus (MMC). Beneficial occupancy of the building was achieved on June 7, 2022 with substantial completion of the building on July 2, 2022. A Temporary Certificate of Occupancy for the promenade is pending installation of an FPL meter to provide power and final inspection by the State Fire Marshall on August 25, 2022. Punch list work continues throughout the building and promenade and will be completed by September 2, 2022.
- **School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA) Phase II (BT-887)** - \$41.5M project consisting of \$12,701,439 PECO funding, \$15,000,000 private donation, \$5,534,299 FIU Online contribution, \$2M portion of Ferré gift, \$2,298,561 E&G CF, \$250,000 SIPA contribution, and \$1,748,971 E-Sport contributions. The current shortfall is \$1,929,430, after all project contingency is applied. The gap will be raised with additional private donations. This shortfall does not include cost escalation in the construction market. A/E – Harvard Jolly; CM – Thornton Construction. The project includes classrooms, conference facilities, offices, language and technology labs, negotiation and mediation facilities, experimental teaching space for SIPA, student technical support spaces, and E-SPORT Gaming managed by FIU Online. PECO funding for the project was received in June 2017 with the condition that all private funds be expended before any PECO monies. The Green Family Foundation accelerated its \$15M donation,

completing the full amount in December 2018. In February 2021, the Ferré Family Foundation committed to a \$5,500,000 donation to establish the Maurice A. Ferré Institute for Civic Leadership which would include the Maurice A. Ferré Reading Room. \$2.0M of the \$5.5M donation is earmarked for construction. The final program was approved July 24, 2018, for an 84,858 gsf building, encompassing 48,445 gsf of built-out space (57%), including 14,563 gsf for FIU Online, leaving 36,413 gsf of shell space (43%) for future build-out when an additional \$4.95M in private funding is raised. The University then applied \$1,651,752 from project contingency to build out the fifth floor, leaving only 18,207 gsf of shelled space (22%) and a budget shortfall of \$1,929,430 to build out the remaining shelled spaces. To repeat, the shortfall does not include cost escalation in the construction market. Framing, electrical and plumbing rough-in work continues. Outstanding components of the electrical panels and switchgear arrived July 28, 2022 and permanent power, HVAC startup and conditioned air throughout the building was completed at the end of August 2022. Interior drywall work is progressing with doors, flooring, and millwork pending conditioned air to the spaces. Furniture is expected to arrive mid-November. Site drainage and fire lane underground utilities was completed at by the end of August 2022. The \$1.75M build-out of the E-Sport space is in progress and expected to finish in December 2022. Glazing of the connection to SIPA I is in progress on all floors followed by interior finish work between the buildings. Telecommunications equipment has been ordered and will be installed by November 2022. All media equipment has been ordered and projected lead times will push delivery of media equipment to December 2023. Delivery date: December 2022 for the building.

- **International Center for Tropical Botany (ICTB) (BT-914) at The Kampong** - \$6.76M project consisting of \$5.96M in private donations and \$800K in CASE Auxiliary funds. CASE Auxiliary Funds will front \$1.8M to be reimbursed from donations including the \$1.0M Millard gift. A/E - MC Harry; CM - Thornton Construction. The project will construct a new 16,553 gsf facility on a site immediately adjacent to the National Tropical Botanical Garden (NTBG) property in Coconut Grove to house educational, lab, and office spaces. The project was delayed for four (4) years as FIU negotiated with the City of Miami and neighbors on the terms of the warrant application and restrictive covenant agreement. One of the concerns with a four (4) year delay is the cost increase to the project. The final GMP from Thornton was incorporated into the contract via amendment on January 22, 2021 for \$5,490,354, approximately \$800K over the original \$4,769,084 construction budget established in April 2017. The current shortfall is \$380K pending resolution of all change orders. Drywall is complete with interior finish work in progress. Exterior sitework is progressing with the parking lot pavers installed. Electrical panels were delivered in early May 2022 and the building is under permanent power as of July 5, 2022. Façade stonework is complete except for the building skirt in progress. The chiller is in place and providing conditioned air throughout the building as of August 3, 2022. The application for a dig permit, required as part of the MDWASD conveyance package for water service, is with the

City of Miami for approval. Water service to the building is now on the critical path and pushing out substantial completion of the project. Delivery date: September 23, 2022.

Projects in Design

- **CasaCuba (BT-925)** - \$34.3M project (increasing to \$48.8M after including the \$14.5M required endowment to fund ongoing maintenance) from private donations. To date \$6,759,115 has been raised in cash including a \$750K National Endowment for the Humanities grant, and a \$2M Knight Foundation grant (\$1.2M received to date). Pledges total another \$8,294,895. A/E - Rene Gonzalez & Associates (RGA); CM - Thornton Construction. The approved building program consists of a 57,876 gsf facility at the SW 16th Street entrance to MMC, including 40,400 gsf of auditorium and exhibition space; 5,500 gsf of classrooms; and 12,000 gsf of office, computer, and campus support space. The project will create a dynamic center hosting open lectures, academic conferences, digital exhibits and research presentations, engaging museums, historical societies, and other academic and cultural institutions through meaningful partnerships. CasaCuba will help preserve and showcase FIU's wealth of Cuba-related intellectual and cultural resources for the benefit of the community, with a special emphasis on sharing and expanding its notable Cuba Collections. RGA completed advanced schematic design on July 28, 2022 and was authorized to proceed into design development. Thornton Construction provided an advanced schematic design construction cost estimate of \$30,227,554, yielding a total estimated project cost of \$42,298,970 which includes \$617K in design fees for additional exhibition, acoustic, lighting, and other consultants. The project is currently \$8,020,970 over budget. Efforts to bring the project within budget will continue during the design development phase, scheduled to conclude in early November 2022 when RGA presents the 100% design development drawings. The selection process for the exhibition experience design consultant, under the architect, is underway with proposals received on August 5, 2022 and are under review. The selection committee will meet in early September 2022 to evaluate the proposals and begin negotiations with the selected firm. Construction fencing and a rendered project sign to attract more fundraising interest are in progress. Delivery date for 100% Design Development drawings: November 2022.
- **Engineering Building (Phase I) (BT-919)** - \$64,707,641 project consisting of \$38,907,641 in PECO funding, \$14.8M in unrestricted Treasury Auxiliary funds, \$6.7M in auxiliary and sponsored research, and \$4.3M in E&G Carryforward with another \$15M earmarked for future build-out. A/E - Perkins+Will; CM - DPR Construction. The project is interdisciplinary focused on the nexus of engineering, academic health sciences, computer science and robotics. It will construct a new 120,695 gsf engineering building at MMC that includes classrooms, teaching labs,

study space, research labs, offices, and computer and instructional media spaces. The building will have 40% shell space intended to be built-out with private fundraising and sponsored research grant funding. The advanced schematic design submittal was submitted on January 21, 2022. DPR submitted the advanced schematic design cost projection on April 2, 2022 with a projected construction cost of \$51,598,590, which is \$5.5M over the \$46,088,376 construction budget. On June 16, 2022, the BOT approved an additional contribution of \$4.3M in E&G Carryforward to the project budget. The remaining \$1.2M shortfall was addressed through reductions in project contingency and furniture and equipment budget line items. Both A/E and CM have also agreed to forego any additional fees. Amendment 1 to the CM agreement was executed on June 20, 2022 allowing DPR to start construction with initial site work before July 1, 2022, and established the GMP at \$51,598,590 for the project. 50% construction documents were submitted on July 29, 2022 and are under review. Building completion and occupancy: April 2024.

- **University City Prosperity Project (UCPP) (BT-904)** - \$14.9M TIGER Grant project budget; multiple funding sources. A/E - BCC Engineering; Builder - TBD. All work necessary to close the open water and sewer permits is complete with only Department of Health and DERM certifications and a new bacteriological test pending WASD final inspection and close-out. BCC was released to start design of the new bridge on April 7, 2021 and the 60% design submittal was received on March 7, 2022. The 60% design submittal cost estimate was submitted on April 29, 2022 for \$16.4M, roughly \$4.6M over the 30% design estimate primarily due to material cost escalation in the current construction market. The 90% design submittal was received on August 12, 2022 and is under review. FDOT estimates the current probable cost of construction is now \$18M, \$6M over budget. The 90% design probable cost of construction from BCC is anticipated in October 2022. Value engineering efforts are underway to reduce scope and mitigate cost. Construction of the new bridge is projected to start in early 2024 and finish in 2026.
- **Trish and Dan Bell Chapel (BT-927) / East Loop Road Realignment (BT-929)** - \$25.96M combined project budget consisting of \$16.0M in private funds dedicated to the chapel, including an additional \$7M commitment from Trish & Dan Bell. \$2,815,300 in private funds for the chapel have been received to date. FIU Foundation has backed the remaining private funding balance. For the roadway realignment, \$3.44M in unrestricted Treasury Auxiliary Fund balances and \$3.0M in CITF funds have been received to date. FIU is also allocating \$3,519,655 in anticipated FY22-23 Deferred Maintenance funding toward the expansion of the chilled water loop. A/E - Gurri Matute; CM - Moss & Associates. The project will build a multi-faith chapel on MMC on S.W. 14th Street, northwest of the Ronald W. Reagan Presidential House. The chapel will accommodate the plurality of faiths and perspectives at FIU and serve as a multi-faith gathering place for worship, contemplation, spiritual strengthening, and mutual understanding. Initial program requirements are for a 12,659 gsf chapel

to hold up to 250 people and include meeting space for students and leaders in FIU's multi-faith community as well as those teaching spiritual/religious subjects. The road portion of the new, combined project will realign part of the loop road to enhance traffic flow and improve turning radii for large vehicles servicing the Graham Center. This project will create a larger available site area east of the Graham Center Ballrooms for expansion of the Graham Center as well as bus and VIP pick up and drop off access during Graham Center events. The architect is currently in design development for the chapel and is expected to submit drawings in mid-October 2022. The current project cost projection at advance schematic design for the road relocation and a 16,650 gsf building is \$28,545,645 representing a project cost \$2,581,704 over budget. Unrestricted Treasury Auxiliary funds will provide gap funding to be repaid from FIU Foundation funds. A 50% construction document submittal for a sitework, utilities, and road relocation early construction start was received on July 27, 2022 and is under review. Pricing for this deliverable is expected from the CM in mid-September 2022. Early construction start for the road is projected to start October 2022. Monthly progress meetings with the Bells continue, providing the design team with valuable guidance and immediate, actionable feedback. Delivery date: December 2023 (stretch goal).

- **College of Arts, Sciences & Education (CASE) Renovation (BT-931)** - \$7.15M PECO funded project budget, \$5,844,436 authorized from General Revenue funding. A/E - Rodriguez Architects, Inc.; CM - Thornton Construction. The 30-year-old 61,783 square foot Computing, Arts, Science and Education (CASE) building consists of seven (7) classrooms, seven (7) teaching labs, 61 research labs and 144 offices. Recent assessment reports indicate that repair and replacement of deteriorated building enclosure components, windows, doors, and louvers are critically needed. Replacement of the deteriorating central air conditioning system is crucial for a healthy indoor environment and to control energy costs. Replacement of the building's emergency generator system is required so that telecommunications equipment housed in the CASE building and feeding the nearby University Police and Emergency Operation Center can be maintained during and after a hurricane. 50% construction documents from Rodriguez Architects were received August 29, 2022. Separating less critical portions of the HVAC work as alternate scopes of work and funding the generator using Deferred Maintenance funding, the construction manager's preliminary cost estimate for construction at design development is approximately \$350K over the program budget. Options to bring the project within budget and include the full HVAC scope continue to be explored. Delivery date: June 2024.
- **Primera Casa Hardening Project (FM 18-0351)** - \$3,618,929 project consisting of a \$2,714,197 FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant (HMGP) award and \$904,732 BOT E&G Carryforward Reserve funding as cost share. A/E - Salz Michelson Architects; CM - Stobs Brothers Construction. The project will replace 17,350 SF of windows and 200

square feet of doors and louvers at PC with current code-compliant, impact resistant assemblies. The project will also harden the existing roof by replacing 2,450 linear feet of edge nailers and flashing, 2,689 square feet of roofing, doors, and skylights on four (4) stairwell roof enclosures, and replace 2,800 linear feet of lightning protection on the roof parapet. Existing rooftop HVAC equipment will also be reinforced with new tie-down cables. FIU has been awarded the grant and has signed the Federally Funded Subaward and Grant Agreement from the Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM). Requirements of the grant agreement allow for a qualifications-based competitive selection of the architect but require a low-bid competitive selection of the builder. However, federal procurement regulations allow state-entities to use their own procurement processes. FIU's General Counsel has determined FIU is free to follow its qualifications-based competitive selection process for Construction Managers. Stobs Brothers Construction, one of FIU's continuing service construction managers, has been selected as the construction manager. The architect submitted 100% construction documents on July 27, 2022. The GMP was received on August 18, 2022 for \$3,428,400. Though still under review, the project is currently \$254K over the construction budget. The grant and scope of work were established several years before construction cost increases hit the market. This will require re-scoping of the work and discussion with FDEM. Delivery date: Per the FDEM agreement, the project must achieve final completion when the period of performance ends September 30, 2023.

Projects in Planning Stage

- **Hotel, Conference and Alumni Center** – Public-Private Partnership (P3) project. Developer/Operator – Concord Benchmark, LLC; Architect – Rabun Architects; CM – Moss Construction. With the successful finalization of development, operating and sublease agreements and BTITF approval, FIU executed the contractual documents on August 12, 2021 beginning the developer's due diligence period. On October 21, 2021, FIU approved the developer's request to extend the due diligence period until January 10, 2022. The financing period started January 11, 2022 and was scheduled to end on February 9, 2022, to be followed by the design phase. On January 7, 2022, the developer requested another extension of the financing period until June 30, 2022 due to disruptions in financial investor markets and continued construction market volatility. As of July 1, 2022 the developer is progressing through the design and permitting phase and is expected to complete design by the end of calendar year 2022. The developer is also exploring financing options. Delivery date: August 2024.
- **Graham Center Expansion (BT-921)** - \$35.9M CITE funded project. A/E – TBD; CM – TBD. The project initially envisioned a 69,400 gsf expansion, increasing the current ballroom footprint and adding breakout rooms, green rooms, lounges, and storage space. The highlight was to be a new and larger grand ballroom facility to meet

current and projected needs. To date, \$23,900,295 in CITF funding has been received, including the entire FY20-21 CITF funding allocation of \$7,002,807, \$500K of the FY21-22 CITF, and \$96,099 in FY22-23 CITF. The coronavirus pandemic, however, triggered a reconsideration of the program and a reassessment of the most effective use of CITF funds. Delivery date: TBD.

Item #1 NPDES Phase II MS4Stormwater Program Annual Report Submission

Agency: Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP)

On July 22, 2022, EH&S successfully submitted the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Stormwater Permit Cycle 4 Year 2 Annual Report. Per the FDEP, FIU is required to develop and implement six minimum control measures for stormwater management program compliance. Annual reports evaluating the effectiveness of the program must be submitted in years two and four of the permit cycle.

Findings: N/A

Item #2 Industrial Waste Permit Compliance Inspections

Agency: Miami-Dade Regulatory and Economics Resources (RER)

On July 7-8, 2022, Miami-Dade RER performed an inspection of the FIU Industrial Waste permits (IW5) with focus on the following areas: OE, CP, Lakeview South and Towers, AHC1, AHC2, W1, CSC Shop areas, Central Utilities, PC, W2, W3, and Engineering Center.

Findings: Based on the feedback provided by the inspector, no major violations were observed. EH&S will work with users to correct any minor concerns documented by EH&S staff during the time of inspection.

TREASURY REPORT (For quarter ending June 30, 2022)

Report (For Information Only – no action required)

OVERVIEW

The University's total liquidity position of \$514.8 million was 2.7 times the University's debt position of \$187.5 million at the end of FY 2022. Including direct support organization ("DSO") debt, the liquidity to total debt ratio was 2.4 times. These results are higher compared to the end of FY 2021, where the liquidity to university debt and the liquidity to total debt ratios were 2.6 times and 2.3 times, respectively. The ratio was higher due to debt service payments.

LIQUIDITY

Real Days Payable

At the end of FY 2022, \$439.1 million, or 85.2 percent, of the liquidity position was accessible within 5 business days (see *Liquidity Allocation* chart for detail). At the end of FYTD 2022, the University had 82 real days payable¹ ("RDP") versus 78 RDP at the end of FYTD 2021.

Sources

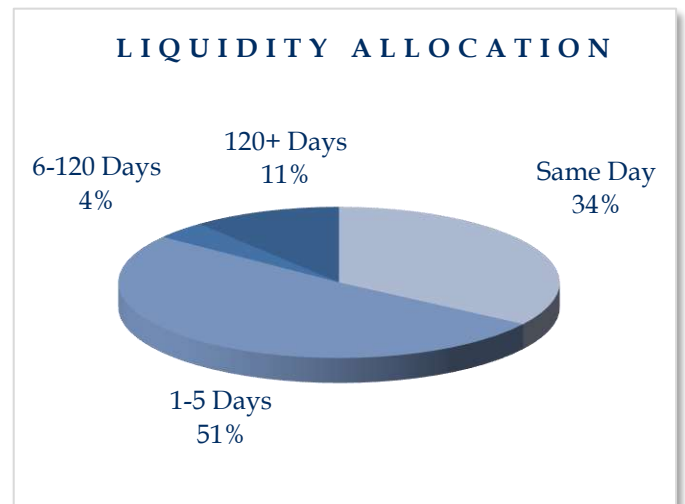
The University started the fiscal year with \$220.3 million in cash balances². Total FY 2022 inflows (state and operational) were \$1,417.1 million as compared to \$1,318.0 Million for FY 2021. On average, \$5.4 million flowed into the University each business day in FY 2022 and \$4.7 million in FY 2021.

Uses

FYTD 2022, the University used \$1,400.3 million as compared to \$1,293.1 million in the same period last fiscal year. The FY 2022 velocity cash outflow was \$5.4 million per day and \$4.7 million in FY 2021. The University ended FY 2022 with \$237.1 million in cash balances.

Stress Tests/Performance Simulations

The University Office of the Treasurer ("Treasury") analyzes the effect of negative market performance on its liquidity position through both value-at-risk (VAR) analysis and Monte Carlo simulation analyses.



¹ Real Days Payable represents the available balance of liquid funds divided by the average cash outflows of the University. The calculation uses the available balance in the University's bank accounts plus the market value of investments that are accessible within 5 business days as its balance of liquid funds.

² Cash includes Working Capital Pool assets and cash balances in the concentration bank account.

VAR analysis, completed quarterly, estimates the maximum potential loss during a specific time period at a given level of confidence. VAR uses the historical behavior of each asset class over various time horizons (five years, ten years, full history). Our VAR analysis predicts that there is a five percent probability that the portfolio (as of the FY 2022 ending balance) could have unrealized losses of up to \$13.7 million and one percent probability of up to \$25.9 million of unrealized losses within a twelve-month period.

The University conducts monthly performance simulations of the portfolio under various market scenarios. At the end of FY 2022, a 100 bps rise in the 10 year Treasury Bond rate would result in a \$4.0 million (0.8 percent) unrealized gain. Liquidity, as measured by 5-day accessibility, would drop to 78.6 percent, or \$411.8 million, of the total current available cash and investment balances. RDP would fall to 77 days based on current fiscal year outflows.

A 25 percent decline in the equity markets would result in a -\$11.3 million (-2.3 percent) unrealized loss. Liquidity, as measured by 5-days accessibility, would decrease to \$436.5 million or 88.5 percent of the total current available cash and investment balances. RDP would drop to 81 days based on fiscal year outflows in this stress scenario.

A scenario similar to the 2013 Federal Reserve “Taper Tantrum” would result in a -\$7.8 million (-1.6 percent) unrealized loss. Liquidity, as measured by 5-day accessibility would drop to \$381.7 million or 76.3 percent of the total current available balances. Furthermore, RDP would drop to 71 days.

Forecast and Budget

Actual balances at the end of FY 2022 were -8.9 percent lower than the rolling forecast, 8.5 percent higher than the budget, and 6.8 percent higher than prior year. For the next quarter, the University should experience a significant increase in the cash and investment balances due to the Fall tuition receipts.

INVESTMENTS

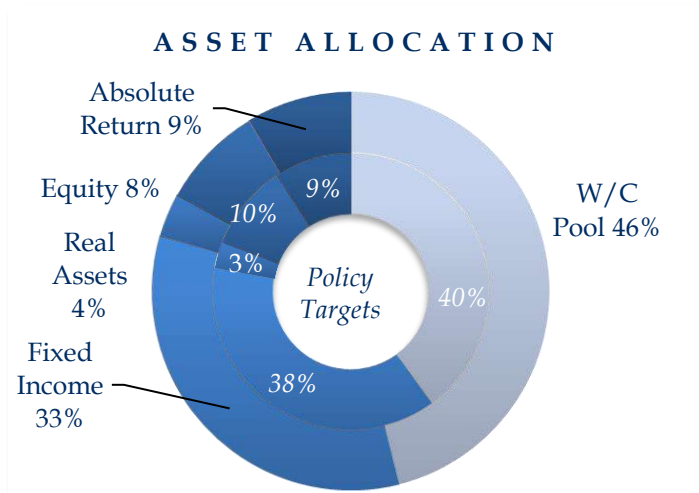
Composition

Asset allocations at the end of FY 2022 remained within policy guidelines (See *Asset Allocation* chart for quarter end detail).

At the end of FY 2022, the market value of the University’s operating funds portfolio and cash was \$515.6 million. This balance reflects a decrease of \$11.8 million or -2.2 percent, from the previous quarter. The decrease reflects the negative return of the portfolio over the period. The total portfolio market value was \$32.7 million higher than the market value at the end of FY 2021. The increase was largely due to HEERF Program lost revenue receipts.

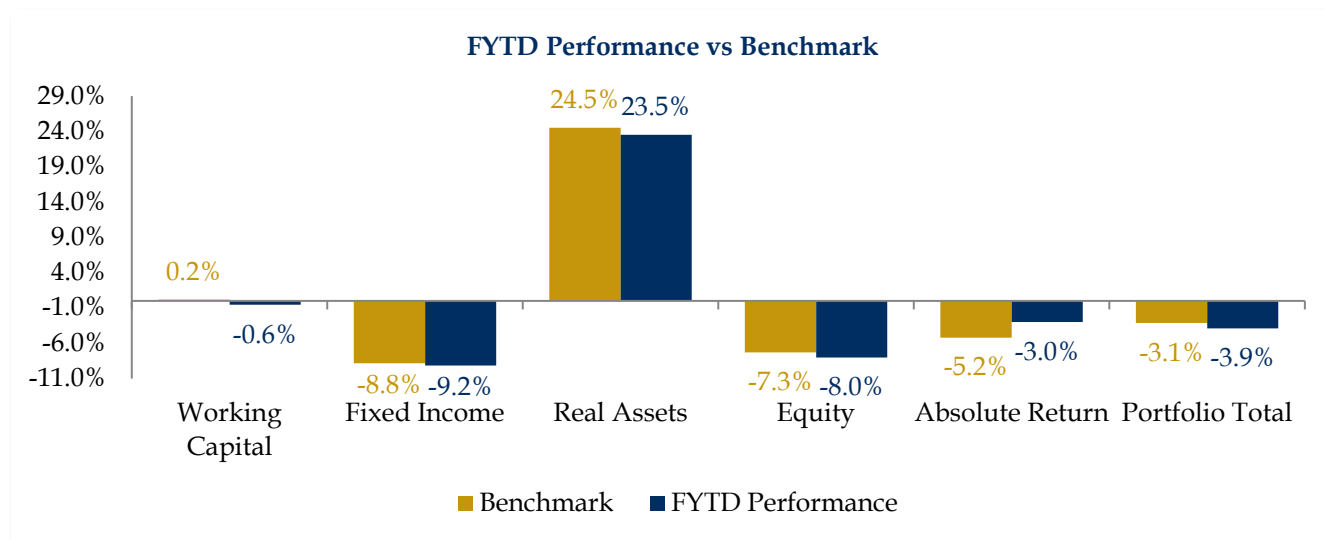
Performance

FIU’s operating portfolio continues to outperform the State Treasury investment pool (“SPIA”), returning 3.9 percent since inception versus the SPIA’s 2.4 percent for the same period. At the end of FY 2022, the portfolio returned -3.9 percent. This compares unfavorably to an 8.3 percent return at the end of FY 2021. The Strategic Capital and Reserve Pools returned -6.4 percent while the Working Capital Pool had returns of -0.6 percent. Returns from the SPIA, excluding the fair value adjustment, totaled 0.9 percent at the end of FY 2022 (see *FY Performance vs.*



Benchmarks chart for additional performance detail by asset class). Negative returns were experienced across the entire portfolio in FY 2022 with the exception of the commodities asset class.

The Portfolio was -0.7% lower than its overall weighted benchmark: Short Term Bonds were lower due to the underweight to US Treasuries and overweight to Investment Grade Bonds; Fixed Income was lower due to overweight to BBB rated securities and an underweight to non-corporate securities in our corporate credit strategy. Equity was lower due to our Biotech private markets manager. We anticipate that the fixed income returns will gradually improve as the individual securities reach their maturities.

The University and DSOs ended FY 2022 with \$207.9 million in outstanding debt versus \$225.7 million at the end of FY 2021. The weighted average interest rate for the University and DSO issuances was 3.7 percent versus 3.8 percent in the same period in the prior year.

MARC Building

The University/Foundation made its final payment on the loan used to build the MARC building in on April 29, 2022. The Foundation transferred the operational activity for the building to the University's Auxiliary Enterprises.

Rating Agencies

The University held an annual surveillance call with Fitch at the end of June and received an affirmation of our rating and outlook in July (Housing A+, Parking A+, Outlook: Stable). S&P and Moody's will conduct their annual rating surveillances for the University's Housing and Parking Systems Bonds in July and August, respectively.

Bond Refunding

The University and the Athletics Finance Corporation (AFC), has refunded/modified all eligible outstanding bond series. The refundings/modification are projected to save the University and AFC \$27.5 million in interest expense over the term of the issuances. As of June 30, 2022, \$6.5 million of interest savings have been realized from the refunding/modification activities. The University and AFC are expected to save \$1.8 million in interest expense in Fiscal Year 2023 and \$8.0 million over the next 5 years.

Highlights since last report: The total above reflects a \$500,000 pledge for a Florida Department of State, Division of Arts and Culture grant.

FACILITIES UPDATE

- The agreement with René González & Associates was executed on October 5, 2020 and program verification was completed on November 5, 2020.
- Thornton Construction was selected and is now under contract.
- Both the Bosch Group and Thornton Construction concluded the conceptual schematic design is over budget, and by Thornton's estimate, up to \$3.55M over the construction budget of \$25,578,299.
- While meetings to discuss strategies to bring the project within budget continue, RGA was authorized to proceed to the advanced schematic design phase on March 10, 2022.
- To attract more fundraising interest, Thornton Construction was authorized to install a project sign showing a rendering of the building and construction fencing around the site.
- The advanced schematic design phase has concluded and RGA has been authorized to proceed to design development.

UNIVERSITY BONUS PLAN

Summary

FIU Bonus Plan that complies with the BOG Regulation 9.015 (& F.S. 1012.978) was implemented upon approval by the Board of Trustees on 9/14/2021 & amended on 3/3/22.

FIU has implemented the following types of bonus plans:

- Employee work performance;
- Recruitment;
- Retention; and
- Delivery of clinical care through a university Faculty Practice Plan.

BOG Regulation 9.015 also authorizes the payment of bonuses included in ratified collective bargaining agreements.

Reporting Period: July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022

Required by the FIU Board of Trustees ("BOT") as part of the President submitting FIU's Bonus Plan Report to the BOT, pursuant to Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 9.015.

Certifies to the best of our professional judgment and knowledge, that the bonuses paid to university employees during the Reporting Period, as described in the attached report, complied with the criteria in the FIU Bonus Plan and were paid from funds contained within the University's budget as approved by the BOT.

UNIVERSITY BONUS REPORT

The Florida International University bonus plan has been designed to comply with Section 1012.978, Florida Statutes, and the Florida Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 9.015. The University has provided incentive bonuses based on work performance, as well as addressed recruitment and retention needs. A bonus is a one-time monetary award given to faculty or staff which is not added to the base salary. The following outlines bonus criteria and type:

General Employee Eligibility Criteria

To be eligible for any type of bonus, the faculty or staff employee must meet all of the following criteria:

1. Regular non-bargaining faculty and staff.
2. Employed at least for six (6) months.
3. To be eligible for a bonus, the employee must generally have a current overall performance rating of "3-Fully Meets Expectations" or higher for staff or an overall performance rating of "Good" or better for faculty evaluations unless otherwise noted below.
4. No disciplinary action on file.

Types of Bonuses and Evaluation Criteria

1. Work-Performance Bonuses

Evaluation Criteria: The evaluation criteria for these bonuses includes, but is not limited to, documented work performance involving increased duties/responsibilities, successful completion of a special project, attainment of established goals, superior performance, or specific achievements or assignments of significance.

Specific Bonuses Falling Within This Category:

A. Performance-Based Bonus

The Performance-Based Bonus is to recognize faculty and staff who have demonstrated continuous outstanding performance or who have made a significant contribution to the department's objectives. To be eligible to receive this bonus, the employee must have a current performance rating of "Consistently Exceeds" or better for staff or "Very Good" or better for faculty evaluations.

B. Project-Based Bonus

The Project-Based Bonus is to recognize faculty and staff upon the successful completion of a special project with pre-determined goals or performance levels in addition to the faculty and staff's regularly assigned duties.

C. Spot Award

The Spot Award is to recognize faculty and staff for superior performance that is not based on a project and is to foster continued improvement or reinforce superior or observable

performance for a specific event or task has been completed. There must be an evaluation on file for the faculty or staff to be eligible for this bonus.

D. Variable Compensation Plan Award

The Variable Compensation Plan (VCP) Award is a pre-approved plan that provides for a lump-sum award based on successful attainment of established goals. A VCP establishes the eligible faculty or staff's contribution to departmental objectives, which typically includes revenue generation, and specific targets to be achieved with a pay-out schedule based on achieving the stated goals within the fiscal year. There must be an evaluation on file for the faculty or staff to be eligible for this bonus.

E. Recognition Awards

Recognition Awards serve to recognize faculty and staff for superior performance or specific achievements in designated categories. The FIU community gathers each year to honor and recognize distinguished staff and faculty members for their outstanding achievements and years of service through the Service and Recognition Awards. Select employees are recognized with an award for significant achievements in their scholarly pursuits (e.g., Employee Service and Recognition Awards and Student Employee of the Year Awards). Faculty excellence awards are presented during the Faculty Convocation and Awards Ceremony in the categories of teaching, gateway teaching, research/creative activities, engagement, service, advising/mentorship and librarianship.

F. Faculty Practice Plan

The Herbert Wertheim College of Medicine (HWCOM) variable compensation plan is applicable to clinical faculty with specialties as defined in the plan document, whose effort is primarily devoted to providing clinical care on behalf of FIU Health. The variable compensation plan provides for a percent of net revenues received by HWCOM from clinical services provided by the faculty.

2. Recruitment (Sign-On) Bonuses

Evaluation Criteria: The evaluation criteria for these bonuses includes, but is not limited to, identification of external candidates with desirable specialized skills and exceptional experience, or where market conditions or departmental structure merit such an award.

3. Retention Bonuses

Evaluation Criteria: The evaluation criteria for these bonuses includes, but it is not limited to, circumstances to address verified offers of competing employment, address market conditions which are significantly higher than the current salary, ameliorate salary compression or inversion, or acknowledge successful completion of career development training, or certification programs that are in the best interests of the University or support the mission of the University. There must be an evaluation on file for the faculty or staff to be eligible for this bonus.

A. Educational Incentive Awards

Educational Incentive Awards are given to encourage staff to acquire a degree, a professional license, or a professional certification from an accredited institution or professional organization. The course of study should be relevant to the position and/or department needs. Educational Incentive Awards are not available for degrees, professional certifications or licenses that are a current job requirement.

Delegations of Authority

The Florida International University Board of Trustees (FIU BOT) delegates authority to the President or the President's designee to establish procedures to implement this bonus plan, including levels of approvals and compensation for specific bonuses described in this bonus plan.

Reporting to the FIU BOT

At this first fall semester FIU BOT meeting, this report is being submitted to the FIU BOT certifying that bonuses paid during the prior fiscal year have complied with the criteria in this bonus plan and that the bonuses were within the University's budget as approved by the FIU BOT. This report includes the BOT-required certification and provides the total amount of funds paid for performance, recruitment, and retention bonuses.






